THE following Address from the Borough of *Haslemere*, was presented to Her Majesty by *George Woodroffe, Thomas Heath* and *John Fullham*, Esqrs; late Members of the said Borough, in the Absence of the present Ones.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please Your Majesty,

YOUR ancient Borough of *Haslemere*, in Your County of *Surry*, humbly craves leave to present their due Acknowledgements for Your prudent and glorious Administration, illustrious in the whole Course of Your most auspicious Reign, but especially conspicuous in the Steps You are making to an honourable Peace, peculiarly Advantageous to the Commerce of *Great Britain*, in proportion to the unequal Burden of the War.

This invaluable Blessing was more early sought and sincerely desired by Your Sacred Majesty, but secretly obstructed by the Artifices of that Party that opposes it now, being by Principle such Enemies to Monarchy, that the most endearing Condescensions of the Best of Princes, cannot reduce them to a modest and mannerly Deportment to the Throne.

Of such Consequence was the reasonable alteration of Your Ministry, and such is the Lustre of Your consummate Conduct, that the greatest Man on Earth resigns the Acquisitions of his former Arms, and lays all his Lawrels at Your Royal Feet.

The Honour he has lately done Your Majesty, by an intire Confidence in Your Justice, and by putting into Your Hands the Key of his Kingdom, and the Pride of all his Forts, is intended by Providence, as a Ballance for those surprizing Indignities which some of Your Allies, and even in Your own Pay, have had the inexcusable Ingratitude to offer.

May You long enjoy the Fruits of that Peace You are giving to *Europe*, and in the lasting Remembrances of a preserved, happy, and thankful People. *O Queen! live for ever.*

Antegoa, August 25. O. S. On the 24th of June, Sir *Hovenden Walker* arrived here with the Fleet under his Convoy. He sailed for *Jamaica* on the 28th, and left Orders for Capt. *Hamilton*, Commander of the *Woolwich*, to come down from *Barbadoes* with all Her Majesty's Ships there, upon the first notice of an Invasion from the Enemy. On Friday the 4th of July we were alarm'd by a Squadron from *Thoulon*, consisting of seven Men of War, besides a great many Sloops and small Boats, under the Command of Monsieur *Cassart*. On the 6th in the Morning they endeavour'd to land at *Willoughby Bay* and the *Mamora*, but perceiving some Horse and Foot in a readiness to receive them, they stood off again, having lost some Boats in that Attempt.

Berlin, Octob. 29. N. S. Count *Alexander Dhona* and the other Commissioners appointed to examine into the present State of Affairs in *Prussia*, have given his Majesty an Account of the Damages that Country hath sustained, together with their Opinions of the proper Methods of repairing them; but as they differ very much in their Sentiments, the King is resolv'd to go there himself in the beginning of the Year, that he may the better judge what Measures

to take for the Relief of the Country, which hath been very much depopulated by infectious Distempers. Monsieur *Brant*, Treasurer of War, hath been for some time indisposed, and there being now small hopes of his Recovery, his Majesty hath order'd his Office to be executed by three Commissioners.

Copenhagen, November 1. N. S. The Danish Fleet is still in the Gulph of *Kiog*. Several Masters of Ships have brought Advice here, that the Swedes use all possible Diligence to make a second Transport, and to that end they are preparing great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition. His Majesty's Troops before *Wisnar*, are to be reinforced with three Regiments of Horse; and Lieutenant-General *Denitz* is to have the Command in chief of the whole Body, which King *Augustus* has desired may advance towards *Damgard*, in order to hinder the Swedes from coming into *Mecklenburg*, as it is supposed they will do, if they don't meet with Opposition to prevent them.

Hanover, November 4. N. S. The Court continues to take the Diversion of Hunting at *Gohre*. The Duchess of *Zell* is arrived there from *Lunenbourg*, the usual Place of her Residence. Letters from *Pomerania* bring advice, that the Swedes finding it was impossible to force their Enemies Entrenchments without exposing their Troops too much, and also endangering *Stralsund*, General *Steinbock* had sent Five thousand Horse to bring Provisions from *Mecklenburg*. They write from the Danish Army near *Hamburg*, that the Troops had been dispersed in several Country Houses belonging to the Magistrates and rich Merchants, and that the City had been obliged to provide Subsistence for the Danes, for fear of having their Houses and Lands destroy'd.

Gand, Novemb. 6. N. S. The Duke of *Ormond* having obtain'd Leave of Her Majesty to go over to *Great Britain*, intends to set out from hence, in a few Days. Lieutenant General *Withers*, who was lately sent by his Grace to that Kingdom, about the Affairs of the Army, left London on the 30th past, and arriv'd here on the 1st. The Council of State hath order'd the Fiscal of *Flanders* to prosecute the News-writer of this Place, for his Insolence, in having published several scandalous Falsities relating to the Affairs of *England*.

Utrecht, Novemb. 8. N. S. The Ministers of the Protestant Princes met at the Lord Privy Seal's House on Thursday and Saturday last, and Yesterday all those of the Allies held a Conference in the Town-house, as usual. The French Plenipotentiaries have had several Meetings of late with those of *Portugal*, at all which the Lord Privy Seal assisted, at the request of both Parties, and this Morning the former dispatch'd a Courier to their Court, as the Portuguese will do in the Evening to theirs.

Whitehall, Novemb. 3. His Grace the Duke of *Ormond* arrived here, this Evening, from *Flanders*.
