THE following Address from the Burgh of *Inverbervie*, was presented to Her Majesty by *William Levingston*, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

To the *QUEEN*'s most Excellent Majesty,

The most humble and dutiful Address of the Magistrates, and Town Council of the Burgh of *Inverbervie*, within the County of *Rincairdin*, in *North Britain*.

May it please Your most Gracious Majesty,

WE do, in the most profound Humility, and with Hearts full of Joy, presume, among the rest of Your Majesty's good Subjects, to approach Your Royal Presence, both to acknowledge, with the utmost Gratitude, Your unparalleled Goodness and Condescension, in communicating to Your Parliament and People, the Conditions on which an honourable and happy Peace may be obtain'd: As also to congratulate Your Majesty on the near and promising View we have of the same, which, under God, we attribute allenarly to the Wisdom of Your happy Reign, and the Conduct of Your successful Negotiations.

Since nothing is so necessary and essential to the Quiet and Happiness of Your good Subjects, after so long, expensive, and a bloody War, as a safe and glorious Peace, and a flourishing Trade; we therefore intirely rely on Your Princely Care and Sacred Wisdom for both: And seeing, by the special Blessing of Heaven, You have got Your Self and Your People disengaged from the War, and has the Balance of *Europe* put in Your Hands; We pray, that the Almighty may so far prosper Your Royal Endeavours, as Your Majesty may be made the happy Instrument, not only of giving Peace to Your own Dominions, but likewise to all Christendom.

And as we are fully persuaded that Your Majesty never had any Interest, separate from that of Your People, and that all our Religious and Civil Rights are absolutely secure in Your Hands, who never used Your Prerogative, but to do us good; so we do with the greatest cheerfulness in every thing else, place an intire Confidence in Your Royal Wisdom; and particularly pray, that when *Britain* shall be so unhappy as to be deprived of Your benign Government, and when it shall please the great King of Kings to exchange Your Temporal for an Eternal Crown, You may be directed to let Your Scepter, like ripe Fruit, drop into the Hands of a Legal and Rightful Successor, who succeeding by Your Care, may govern after Your Example, that so the Glory of Your most auspicious Reign may be celebrated by all Foreign Nations abroad, and the happy Fruits thereof, ever enjoyed by Your Loyal Subjects at home, in a perpetual and just Subjection.

At the same time we humbly beg leave to offer Your Majesty our most humble and hearty Thanks, for granting the Royal Assent to a gracious Toleration to those of the Episcopal Communion in *North Britain*, who have been long persecuted and oppressed; and to another Act, restoring to the Patrons their just and ancient Rights, graciously by the first giving ease to tender Consciences, and by the second delivering a great many of Your good Subjects from Oppression.

That Your Majesty may long, long Reign over us, to be a Blessing to Your People, and to enjoy the happy Effects of Your Pious Cares and Endeavours here, and the Eternal Rewards of blessed Peace-makers hereafter, are, and ever shall be, the zealous, sincere, and hearty Prayers of Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

Turin, *Octob.* 26. *N. S.* The Duke, with the rest of the Court, continues still at the *Venerie*. The Garrisons of *Alexandria* and *Susa*, have lately been reinforced with four Battalions from *Coni*, and a Detachment of Horse from the Camp at *Carmagnole*. His Royal Highness's Troops, and most of those of the other Confederates in this Country, are gone into their respective Winter Quarters. They writ from *Milan*, that the Mortality of Cattle is very much abated in those Parts.

Dantzick, *Novemb.* 2. *N. S.* On the 30th past, Monsieur *Kibinski*, who commands a Body of Polish Troops in *Prussia*, sent a Detachment into the Territories of this City with Orders, to use Military Execution for the recovery of some Money, which the General of the Crown pretends hath been due, for several Years, from the Town of *Danzink* to the Army. These Demands are founded upon their having neglected to pay the Annual Quota impos'd on them by the Diet of *Lublin*. But the Magistrates alledge, that the Taxes laid on them, were contrary to their Privileges, which have ever been to be exempted from all impositions, but what are consented to by the particular Diet of the Province of *Prussia*, of which their Town is a Member. They have also declared, that they will maintain their Liberties to the utmost; in order to which, they have sent out Twelve hundred Men of the Garrison with some Pieces of Artillery, and have given positive Directions to the Commanding Officer, to endeavour to drive the Poles out of their Country by force, if they refuse to leave it quietly. The Muscovites have evacuated the City of *Elbing*, and the Saxon Troops have taken possession of it.

Hambourg, *October* 8. *N. S.* We have received Advice, that King *Augustus*, upon the repeated Instances of his States, hath sent for the Electoral Prince his Son out of *Italy*. He is to reside in *Saxony*, with liberty to exercise the Protestant Religion, and his Roman Catholic Servants are dismissed, which hath very much quieted the Minds of his Majesty's Subjects. The 18th past, the City of *Staden*, and the Peasants of the Dutchy of *Bremen* took the Oaths of Fidelity to the King of *Denmark*, but most of the Gentlemen desired to be excused, and very few of them appeared upon that Occasion. A Swedish Officer lately arrived here from *Calmar*, reports, that Five thousand Men of the Troops of his Nation, are embarked, and wait only for a fair Wind to set sail for *Wismar*. The Turkish Agents in *Poland* hold frequent Conferences with the General of the Crown, relating to a Pardon which they demand for the Partisans of the King of *Sweden*. By Letters from *Constantinople* we are informed, that his Swedish Majesty intends to continue all this Winter at *Bender*; and that the Turkish Forces, which were assembled there, are to separate immediately; from whence it is concluded, that the Grand Signior is resolved to observe his Intere with the Muscovites.
