To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Chiefs of the Loyal Clans of the Highlands of Scotland, under-subscribing in behalf of themselves and their Followers.

May it please Your Majesty,

**T**O accept this humble Address (tho' late) from us, who humbly hope shall always be found in the first Rank of Your Majesty's Subjects for Loyalty.

It was with Horror we heard that it had been attempted to Arraign the Hereditary Rights in Your Royal Presence, and that even by the Encouragement of these very Persons, whose Duty it was to have suppressed all such factious Designs, had not their Antimonarchical Principles, and their own private Interests, led them into vain hopes of introducing a General for Life, and perpetuating an expensive War.

It is with great Joy that we Congratulate Your Majesty's consummate Prudence and discerning Judgment in the Choice of such Ministers, as have faithfully executed Your Majesty's Orders in retrieving the Nation from these eminent Dangers: And it is with Pleasure that we find Your Majesty hath so far surmounted an incorrigible Faction, as has obtain'd the most honourable Terms for a General Peace, and have brought it so far towards a Conclusion, that Your Majesty's Troops are now in the actual Possession of the most important Fortresses in Europe, as a Pledge for the performance of the advantageous Conditions offered to Your Majesty for the future Welfare of Your People, and the Honour of Great Britain.

Tho' the Trade does not so much concern us, we cannot but gratefully observe the Regard Your Majesty hath had to the British Commerce, by providing for the Safety of what we have heretofore enjoyed, and improving it in other Parts of the World where as yet we have had no Traffick: And as our Trade is extended to the South Sea, and a Provision made for a Fishery, so we doubt not but it will have a happy Influence on our Northern Coasts, that Your Majesty's Goodness may equal the Extent of Your Dominions; and that such a Branch of Your Royal Prerogative may not be invaded by any Neighbouring Nation, to far as to take these Advantages which properly belong to Your own Subjects.

Our Ancestors under a long Succession of an Hundred and eleven Sovereigns, Your Royal Progenitors, have always been Zealous for Monarchy and, since Christianity was planted among them, for Episcopal Government; and the tender Care Your Majesty hath lately shew'd to the Episcopal Clergy in these Parts, requires our utmost Thanks, which we humbly offer Your Majesty, with Hearts full of Gratitude and Sincerity:

And will be always ready to expose our Lives and Fortunes for Your Majesty, against all Factious and Rebellious Contrivances, *Sword in Hand.*

Great Princess!

**W**HEN Your Majesty's most Dutiful and most Obedient among the rest of Your Loyal Subjects, beg leave to return our humble and hearty Thanks for Your great Condescension, in communicating to the Parliament the Terms on which a general Peace might be had. Every Person (not otherwise bias'd) may not only plainly understand, but in some measure partake of the Blessings You thereby intended Your People. We are sensible, tho' sorry that Your Majesty meets with Opposition, not only from Your Foreign Competitors for Trade, but also from some of Your own Subjects, who (though through Your great Liberality they have, from small Beginnings, risen to what they do do oppose, Your making an honourable Peace, because they delight in War. We entirely depend on Your Majesty's Care for the preservation of Your Subjects, by the Advice

of the present Ministry, whom God, in our great Necessity, raised up for us; to whom with Your Majesty, that God may long continue a happy Government to a happy People, in the Prayers of Your Dutiful Subjects and Loyal Cornish-men, Which Addresses Her Majesty received very gratefully.

*Lisbon, November 8 N. S.* This Day Admiral Baker intends to sail for England with the Squadron under his Command, Major-General Pearce having proclaimed the Cessation of Arms agreed on between Her Majesty and the Crowns of France and Spain, ordered the British Troops into Winter Quarters, and arrived here on the 6th. They write from Campo Mayor, that on the 4th the Brigadier Silva sallied out of the Town with four hundred Grenadiers, and killed a great Number of the Enemy's Match-Troops, with the Loss of only Seventeen of his Men. On the 7th the Spaniards made an Assault on the Place, and being three times repulsed by the Garrison, they retired in some Disorder. Immediately after this Action Major-General Quinsana brought a Reinforcement of Seven hundred Portuguese into the Town, whereupon the Spaniards sent away their Artillery to Badajoz on the 10th and 11th, and afterwards retired homewards with all their Forces.

*Vienna, November 9 N. S.* The Emperor has named the Prince of Lowestein to be his first Commissioner at the Diet of Ratisbonne, in the room of Cardinal Lamberg lately deceased. That Prelate has left a great Estate to his Nephew the Count of the same Name. Yesterday the States of Austria paid their Homage to his Imperial Majesty with the usual Solemnity, and the Ceremony was performed with great Magnificence.

*Brussels, November 12 N. S.* The Duke of Ormond having received Her Majesty's leave to return home, set out from Gand on the 9th instant, under a triple Discharge of the Artillery of the Place, and the same Night his Grace arrived at Bruges. The Day before his Departure the High Bailiff with the Magistracy of Gand waited upon him, to thank him in the Name of their City and District, for the exact Order and Discipline he had caused to be observed by the Army under his Command, and for the great care taken to preserve the Quietude during the encampment of the British Forces in that Neighbourhood. They also desired him to recommend them to Her Majesty's Protection. The Deputies of the States of Flanders, and the Magistrates of Bruges, made the same Request to his Grace, and commended him at his arrival in that City, and when he went away.

*Utrecht, Nov. 25. N. S.* On the 18th at Night Monsieur Consruck, one of the Plenipotentiaries of his Imperial Majesty, dy'd in this Town, and on the 19th his Death was formally notify'd to the several Ministers residing here. Seven Deputies of the States of Brabant and Flanders came hither some Days ago, and after having several Conferences with the Lord Privy Seal, and the Plenipotentiaries of the States General, they set out for the Hague, where they intend to wait for the arrival of the Bats of Stratford and Orery. Count Denhoff and Monsieur Marhal de Bieberstein, two of the Prussian Ministers, are likewise gone to the Hague, in Expectation of meeting the Earl of Stratford and several others are preparing to go thither upon the same Account, his Excellency's Equipage being order'd to wait there for him. Yesterday Prince Eugene arriv'd hither being accompany'd by Count Sincendorff, and others of Distinction, and it is said, to Morrow he will proceed on his Journey to Vienna. We have receiv'd Advice, that on the 3th a Body of Prussian Troops under the Command of the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, surpriz'd the Castle of Meyers, in the Possession of the States General. The two Parties are since come to such an accommodation, that they are very easie to one another.

*London, Nov. 17.* On Saturday last, at Seven in the Morning, the Duke of Hamilton and the Lord Mohun fought a Duck in Hyde-Park, where the latter was kill'd upon the Spot, and his Grace dy'd of his Wounds as his Servants were carrying him to his Coach. James Duke of Hamilton and Brandon had been Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to King Charles II. and Envoy Extraordinary from that Prince to the Court of France. He was created Duke of Brandon by Her Majesty in the Year 1711. Upon the Death of the late Earl Rivers he was constituted Master General of Her Majesty's Ordnance, and in a Chapter lately held at Windsor, was elected Knight Companion of the most Noble Order of the Garter. He marry'd Anne, the Daughter of the late Lord Gerard of Bromley, by whom he hath had several Children, and is succeeded in Honour and Estate by his eldest Son the Marq. of Chiffinch, an Infant of twelve Years old.
