A PROCLAMATION,

For Seizing and Apprehending George Maccartney, Esq; commonly called Lieutenant General Maccartney.

ANNE R.

Whereas on Saturday the fifteenth Day of this Instant November, James Duke of Hamilton and Duke of Brandon, and Charles Lord Mohun, in high Contempt and open Defiance of our Laws, pursuing their private Animosties, fought a Duel in Hyde-Park; and John Hamilton, Esq; was Second to the said Duke, and the said George Maccartney was Second to the said Lord Mohun; and the said Duke and Lord Mohun were killed: And, whereas by an Inquisition taken the seventeenth Day of this Instant November, before Charles Low, Gent. Coroner of the Liberty of the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter of Westminster, of the City, Borough, and Town of Westminster, on the View of the dead Body of the said Duke, it is found, That the said Charles Lord Mohun, on the said fifteenth Day of November, did Murder the said Duke, and that the said George Maccartney and John Hamilton, at that time were Present, Aiding, Abetting, Assisting, and Maintaining the said Lord Mohun to commit the said Murder; and that the said George Maccartney is fled for the same: And by another Inquisition taken before the said Coroner, on the View of the dead Body of the said Lord Mohun, it is found, That the said Duke did Murder the said Lord Mohun, and that the said George Maccartney and John Hamilton were Present at, Aiding, Abetting, Assisting and Maintaining the said Duke to commit the said Murder; but the said John Hamilton hath voluntarily surrendered himself, in order to his Tryal: We desiring to manifest Our utmost Displeasure against such horrid and impious Practices, and to deter all others from committing the like for the future, and that the said George Maccartney may be brought to speedy Justice, do, by the Advice of our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby commanding and requiring all Our Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers, and other Our Loving Subjects, That they do use their utmost diligence, in their several Places and Capacities, to Discover, Seize, and Apprehend the said George Maccartney, and, being Apprehended, to carry him forthwith before the next Justice of the Peace, whom We do hereby require to commit him to the Goal of the County, where he shall be so taken, charg'd with the Murder of the said Duke, and to give immediate Notice thereof to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, And We do hereby Promise and Declare, That whatsoever shall Discover and Apprehend the said George Maccartney, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace, shall have and receive the Reward of Five Hundred Pounds for so doing, whereof Our High Treasurer is hereby Authorized and Required to make Payment. And We do hereby Publish and Declare, That if any Person or Persons, after the issuing of this Our Royal Proclamation shall, directly or indirectly, Conceal, Harbour, Keep or Maintain the said George Maccartney, or shall be Aiding or Assisting to him in making his Escape, or prevent

ing his being Taken or Arrested, such Person or Persons so Offending, shall be Prosecuted for the same with the utmost Severity of the Law.

A PROCLAMATION, ANNE R.

Whereas James Duke of Hamilton was duly Elected and Returned to be One of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to Sit in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and was after, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, created Duke of Brandon, and is since deceased: In order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to Sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to Assemble and Meet at Holy-Rood-House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of January next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to Nominate and Choose another Peer of Scotland, to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said Duke of Hamilton and Brandon deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly Signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being Qualified according to Law; And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to Officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to Administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly Examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so Elected, and Sign and Attest the same in the presence of the said Peers, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And We strictly Charge and Command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly Published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Florence, Nov. 15. N. S. The Palace of Salviani is fitting up for the Reception of the Electoral Prince of Saxony, who is expected here very soon. Since the arrival of the last letters from Vienna, we begin to entertain great Hopes that this State will be exempted from giving Quarters to the Imperial Forces.

Berlin, Nov. 26. N. S. The Czar is expected here every Day from Dresden in his way to Pomorania. The last Advices from thole Parts bring an Account, that the Muscovites had taken Possession of Gultrow and Buzow, two Towns in the Country of Mecklenburg. The Imperial Commission that hath been held for some Years past at Hamburg being now at an end, all the Troops thit were plac'd

there upon that occasion are retir'd, except some Companies of Pruffians: Whereupon the Town hath sent two Deputies to this Court, to desire that his Majesty's Forces may likewise be ordered to withdraw.

Hamburg, Nov. 29. N. S. The Danish Infantry that for some time hath been encamp'd about this Town, march'd on the 27th towards Oldeslo. We have receiv'd advice, that Count Steinbock hath sent all his Baggage and sick Soldiers to Wismar. The Swedish Army is still encamp'd between that Place and Rostock, from whence they have drawn out their Garrison, in order to Attack the Muscovites before the Danes can come up to their Assistance. Monsieur Frizerdorff and Count Brahe, have desir'd the King of Prussia, in a very pressing manner, to grant the Swedish Forces a Passage through his Territories into Poland, but there is no probability that his Majesty will comply with their Request, since he foresees they would soon be followed by their Enemies, and by that means his Country would suffer by both Parties. Besides, that Prince expresses great Dissatisfaction at the Ravages and Devastations Count Steinbock hath made in Mecklenburg, to the Succession of which Dutchy the King of Prussia hath some Pretensions. The King of Denmark is expected very soon at Altena, and several Houses are preparing there for his Reception, and that of the Elector of Hanover, who intends to have an Interview with his Majesty at that Place. The Danes begin to confiscate the Estates of the Gentlemen of Bremen, who have refused to take the Oaths of Fidelity to their King. Letters from Dantzick inform us, that the Garrison of that Town hath driven the Poles out of their Territory, and oblig'd General Kibinski to repass the Vistula. Our last Accounts from Constantinople say, that the Turkish Army which was encamp'd near Bender is separated, and all those Troops are gone into their Winter Quarters.

Whereas by the Treaties between Her Majesty and the Crowns of Sweden and Denmark, it is Provided, That in Time of War between those two Crowns, the Ships of Her Majesty's Subjects Trading to the Baltick Sea, or the Places on the Coasts of Sweden or Denmark should, pursuant to the Treaty with Sweden, be furnished with Passports from the Chief Magistrates of the Towns from whence the Ships are bound, and pursuant to the Treaty with Denmark, that such Ships should have Certificates from the said Magistrates, and also Passes Signed by Her Majesty, the Forms of which Passes and Certificates are prescribed by the said Treaties, and have been communicated to the Chief Magistrates of several Towns and Places in Her Majesty's Dominions, from whence a Trade is usually carry'd on to the Northern Seas. And Her Majesty being informed that several of Her Subjects Trading to those Parts, neglect to provide themselves with the Passes and Certificates required by the aforesaid Treaties, whereby great Inconveniencies have arisen; These are therefore to give Notice to all Persons Trading to the Seas and Coasts abovementioned, that they do take Care to furnish themselves with the proper Passes and Certificates for the better Security of their Navigation.

The Persons appointed by the Rt.
