For Seizing and Apprehending George Maccartney, Esq; commonly called Lieutenant General Maccartney.

AN'NE R.

Hereas on Saturday the fifteenth Day of this Instant November, James Duke of Hamilton and Duke of Brandon, and Charles Lord Mohun, in high Contempt and open Defiance of our Laws, pur-faing their private Animosities, fought a Duel in Hyde-Park; and John Hamilton, Esq; was Second to the said Duke, and the said George Maccartrey was Second to the faid Lord Mohun; and the faid Duke and Lord Mohun were killed: And, whereas by an Inquisition taken the seventeenth Day of this Instant November, before Charles Lowe, Gent. Coroner of the Liberty of the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter of Westminster, of the City, Borough, and Town of Westminster, on the View of the dead Body of the faid Duke, it is found, That the said Charles Lord Mohun, on the said fifeenth Day of November, did Murder the said Duke, and that the said George Maccartney and John Hamilton, at that time were Prefent, Aiding, Abetting, Assisting, and Maintaining the said Lord Mohun to commit the said Murder; and that the said George Maccartney is sted for the same: And by another Inquisition taken before the said Coroner, on the View of the dead Body of the said Lord Mohun, it is found, That the said Duke did Murder the faid Lord Mohun, and that the faid George Maccartney and John Hamilton were Present at, Aiding, Abetting, Assisting and Maintaining the said Duke to commit the said Murder; but the said Duke to commit the said Murder; but the said John Hamilton bath voluntarily surrendred bimself, in order to bis Tryal: We desiring to manifest Our utmost Displeasure against such borrid and impious Pratices, and to deter all others from committing the like for the future, and that the faid George Maccartney may be brought to speedy Justice, do, by the Advice of sur Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby commanding and organizing all Our Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers, and other Our Loving Sabjests, That then do use their utmost dilivence, in their seother Uur Uffieers, and other our Lowing Success, That they do use their atmost diligence, in their seweral Places and Capacities, to Discover, Seize, and Apprehend the said George Maccartney, and, being Apprehended, to carry him forthwith before the next fusice of the Peter, whom We do hereby require to commit him to the Goal of the County, where the thinks to the county where be shall be so taken, charg'd with the Murden of the Jaid Duke, and to give immediate Notive thereof to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State. And We do hereby Promife and Declare, That who fower spall Discover and Apprehend the said George Mac-cartney, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace, shall have and receive the Reward of Five Hundred Pounds for so Authorized and Required to make Payment. And We do bereby Publish and Deslare, That if any Person or Persons, after the issuing of this Our Royal Proclamation shall, directly or indirectly, Concoal, Harbour, Keep or Maintain the faid George Maccartney, or shall be Aiding or Assisting to him in making his Escape, or prevents

ing his being Taken or Arrested, such Person or Persons so Offending, shall be Prosecuted for the same with the utmost Severity of the Law.

Whereas James Duke of Hamilton was duly
Elected and Returned to be One of the Sixteen
Peers of Scotland, to Sit in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great Britain, and was after, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, created Duke of Brandon, and is since deceased: In order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to Sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, iffue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to Assemble and Meet at Holy-Rood-House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of January next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Iwo in the Afternoon, to Nominate and Chuse another Peer of Scotland, to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the Room of the said Duke of Hamilton and Brandon deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that flall he then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly Signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being Qualified according to Law: And the Lord Cterk Register, or sach I wo of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to Officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to Administer the Gaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly Examined, to certifie the Name of the Peer so Ele-Hed, and Sign and Attest the same in the presence of the said Peers, and retrive same in not presence of the said Peers, and retrine sach Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly Charge and Command. That this Out Royal Proclamation be duly Published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the Gounty Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the time bereby appointed for the Meeting of the Coid Peers to proceed to Such Flotting. said Peers to proceed to such Election.

The last Advices from those Parts bring an Account, that the Muscovites had taken Possessing of Gustrow and Buzow, two Towns in the Country of Mecklenburg. The Imperial Commission that hath been held for some Years past at Hamburgy being now at an end, all the Troops that were placed

there upon that occasion are retir'd, except some Companies of Prusiants: Whereupon the Town hath sent two Deputies this Court, to desire that his Majesty's Forces may like-

Hamburgh, Nov. 291 N.S. The Danish Infantry that for ome time bath been encathped about this Town, march'd bn the 2th towards Oldello. We have receiv'd advice; that Count Steinbock hath fent all his Baggage and fick Soldiers to Wifmar. The Swedish Army is still encamped between that Place and Rostock, from whence they have drawn out their Garrison, in order to Attack the Muscovites before the Danes can come up to their Allistance. Monsieur Frizendorff and Count Brahe, have defir'd the King of Prussa, it
a very pressing manner, to grant the Swedish Forces a Passage through his Territories into Poland, but there is no
probability that his Majesty will comply with their Request,

Letters from Dantzick inform us, that the Garrison of that Town hath driven the Poles out of their Territory, and obliged General Kibinski to repass the Vistula. Our last Accounts from Constantinople say, that the Turkish Army which was encamped near Bender is separated, and all those Troops are gone into their Winter Quarters.
