THIS Evening the Baron de Grote, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elektor of Hanover, had his first private Audience of Her Majesty, being introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Viscount Bolingbroke, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies,

Constantinople, November 5. Some Days ago Achmet Aga returned from Poland, where he had been sent with a Commission to examine how far the Muscovites had perform'd the Articles of their late Treaty with the Grand Signior. He hath made a Report, that the Czar's Troops were still in Garrison in several Places of that Kingdom; and Representations to the same effect are since come from other Hands. On this Occasion the Sultan hath expressed great Resentment, and in a Council held at the Seraglio, the last of October, it was resolv'd to declare War against the Czar, for not having fulfilled his Engagements. The same Evening the Muscovite Ambassadors were sent Prisoners to the Seven Towers. And the next Day the Vizir Azem was deposed, and banish'd to Mitylene. General Goltz, Envoy Extraordinary from King Augustus, is sent to Adrianople, and Orders are given to secure the Palatin of Mazovia at the same Place. The Port is now employ'd in preparing Instructions for the Tartar Han, and sending Supplies of Money to him and the King of Sweden.

Lisbon, December 24. N. S. On the fifth Instant arrived here a Courier, who brought a Treaty for a Suspension of Arms between the Crowns of Portugal, France and Spain. The Marquis de Bay hath taken Possession of Valencia d'Alcantara, a strong Town on the River Savar, and of some Villages near it. This hath occasion'd some Dispute between this Court and the Marquis, notwithstanding which the Truce hath been proclaim'd here, and it is thought the Differences which have risen upon that account will be amicably adjust'd. A solemn Procession and great Devotions have been lately made here, for obtaining long Life and Prosperity to the young Prince of Brazil. On the Twenty first Sir Nicholas Trevanian, with the Squadron under his Command, arrived in this Harbour from Newfoundland, and Yesterday came in Her Majesty's Ship the Greenwich, the Lord Forbes Commander. As she was coming up the River she was carried a-shore by the Violence of the Freshes, but great Diligence being immediately used to get her off again, she seems now to be out of all Danger.

Hamburg, Decemb. 30. N. S. Yesterday the King of Denmark left Oldesloe, and went in great haste towards Jutland. Lieutenant General Dewitz, who was reported to have been killed in the late Battle near Gadebusch, is found to be alive, and continues encamped at Ratzebourg with the Danish Army, consisting of thirty Squadrons, which it is said are to join the Muscovites, in order to try a second Engagement with Count Steinbock. The Czar is still at Swerin, and his Army is advanced to Stenberg, where they are order'd to halt till the arrival of the Danes and Saxons. On the 24th King Augustus pass'd through Lansberg on his way to Warlaw. Two Swedish Regiments under the

Command of Major General Schommer have pass'd the Trave, and sent to desire Passage through the City of Lubec, but the Senate excus'd themselves from granting it, because they have resolv'd to observe an exact Neutrality. Major General Morner, a Danish Prisoner, is come hither upon his Parole, and seems extremely pleas'd with the Treatment he received from Count Steinbock.

Utrecht Jan. 3. N. S. On the one and thirtieth past, the Ministers of the States General who went lately to the Hague returned hither, and soon after their arrival, they desired a Conference with the British Plenipotentiaries, in which they acquainted their Lordships, that the States their Masters, were come to an unanimous Resolution to concur with Her Majesty's Measures for procuring a General Peace, and at the same time assur'd them of the deep Sense their High Mightinesses have of the repeated Instances of Friendship Her Majesty hath shewn for their Republick during this whole Transaction. On Sunday and this Morning, the said Ministers were again in Conference with their Lordships, who have likewise had frequent Conferences of late with the Plenipotentiaries of France, Savoy, and the associated Circles of Germany. Yesterday Morning those of the Allies met in the Town-house, as usual. Count Sinzendorf is returned hither from the Hague. Monsieur Mellarede, one of the Duke of Savoy's Ministers, is also come from the same Place, where he stay'd a Day or two on his way from England.

Dover, Decemb. 27. Yesterday his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury embark'd on board the William and Mary Yacht, and at Seven a-Clock in the Evening set Sail with a fair Wind for Calais, where it is hoped he is now arriv'd, the Wind having continued favourable ever since.

Whitehall, December 29. Her Majesty hath been graciously pleas'd to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon William Lewen, Esq; Alderman, and one of the present Sheriffs of the City of London.
