Venice, January 6. N. S. The Magistrates of Health continue to use all possible diligence to prevent the Plague from spreading into the Dominions of the Republick. The Marquis of Susa having seen all that is Curious in this Place, set out a few Days ago for Ferrara, from whence he intends to go to Rome. They write from thence, that the Pope is something better, but not yet out of Danger: The Cardinals Negroni and Tomasi, are past hopes of Recovery. The Papal Gallies are at length arriv'd at Civita Vecchia, after having suffered several Storms, Signor Marefoschi hath begun to give Audience, in quality of Auditor of the Pope. Upon the Receipt of several Letters from China, and other Countries in the East Indies, an extraordinary Congregation hath been held, to consider of the Disputes between the Jesuits and Secular Priests.

Madrid, January 9. N. S. Marshal Staremberg is march'd with a considerable Body of Men to take Possession of the Passes near Gitome, in order to hinder the Duke of Berwick from relieving it. So that it is generally thought that Place will be oblig'd to surrender for want of Provisions. The rest of his Army is encamp'd on the Plains of Terragona. On the 31st inst, a Portuguese Officer pass through this City on his way from Barcelona to Lisbon, where he is going to solicit for the Payment of what Money is necessary for the Subsistence of the Troops of his Nation, who are to go to the

Kingdoms of Arragon and Castile in their return homewards. He brings an Account, that the Celebration of Arms was published in Catalonia; in pursuance of which, his Master's Forces have received Orders to leave that Country.

Hamburg, January 29. N. S. On the Fourteenth the Czar arriv'd here, accompanied by Prince Menzikof and several other General Officers. The next day he visited the Fortifications of the Town, and at his return he was Complimented by several Magistrates appointed to wait on him in the Name of the City. On the Sixteenth he went to see the Ruins of Altens, which seem'd to affect him extremely. He distributed a considerable Sum of Money amongst the Inhabitants, and promised them large Privileges in their Trade to Archangel, to make them some Reparation for their Losses. The same Day his Majesty left this Place, and having changed his Resolution of going to Petersberg, he join'd his Army, which he is resolv'd to Command in Person, in order to remove all Jealousies from the several Generals who scrupled to obey Prince Menzikof. Yesterday that Prince decamp'd, and it was believed would march without any Interruption as far as Rendsbourg, where he is to be join'd by Lieutenant-General Legard with 10 Battalions and 15 Squadrons. The King of Denmark continues still at Fredericia, from whence he intends to go to the Army as soon as they come near enough for him to do it with Safety. His Majesty is in Treaty with Huguetan, a French Banker, whom he hath created Baron d'Odyke, to advance the Sum of Eight hundred thousand Crowns, to pay for the Victuals and Forage of all the Forces belonging to the Northern Allies. Count Steinbock is at present encamp'd with his Army between Husain and Bredlar, the Van reaching to Flensburg; and Monsieur Bassewitz hath tax'd that City at Fourteen thousand Crowns, without including the Bailiage. Some Swedish Officers have taken two Muscovite Couriers, and they pretend they have met some Letters of Consequence, which have been delivered to Count Welling.

London, January 27. Yesterday the Duke d'Aumont's House in Ormond-street was unhappily burnt down, tho' all possible Diligence was us'd to extinguish the Fire.
