Hanover, February 7. *N. S.* The Troops of his Electoral Highness that were recalled some time ago from the Low Countries, have received Orders to halt near Deventer, that they may be in a readiness either to return into Flanders, or to march towards the Elbe, as Occasion shall require. Major-General Hamerstein, who was sent by this Court to inform himself whether Count Steinbock had power to treat of Peace, came back two Days ago with this Answer, That the Count was ready to enter into a Treaty of Peace upon the Foot of that of Traverdahl; and that if in the Course of the Negotiation, any new Matter should arise, which he was not instructed to determine, the Points in dispute should be left undecided till the King of Sweden's return Letters of the second from the Confederate Army in Holstein bring Advice, that the Swedes had assembled their Forces at Seisted, and entrenched themselves there, having but a small Extent of Country to furnish them with Subsistence, and being press'd on all sides by the Troops of the Confederates: Upon their being denied Entrance into Tommingen, they march'd to Frederickstadt, but could not fortifie it for want of the necessary Materials. The same Advices add, that the King of Denmark was gone from Fredericia to the Czar's Army, where it was resolv'd in a Council of War to attack the Swedes.

Hamburg, February 10. *N. S.* It was given out here for some time, that General Stackelberg had abandoned Frederickstadt, but we are now assur'd of the contrary, and have received further Advice, that General Bauditz, who was to command the Attack of that Place, could not pursue his Design, by reason of the Thaw, which had made the Roads impassable; and besides the Swedes had cut down a Bank, and laid the Country about that Town under Water. The General having informed the Czar and the King of Denmark of this, the former went thither in Person, and having found it impossible to approach the Town, he order'd a Retreat. On the sixth a Council of War was held in Presence of their Majesty's, to consider of some way to reduce that Place, which is of great Importance to the Allies: And it was resolv'd, that the Army should march to Bredstandt, and from thence to Husum, in order to attack Frederickstadt on that side. The next Day they decamp'd, and it is thought they are now arriv'd at Husum. In the mean time Count Sponneck with Fifteen hundred Men is order'd to watch the Motions of General Steinbock, and to cut down the Banks of Dismarse, in case he attempts to pass the Eyder on that side. The Administrato

Administrator of Holstein hath given fresh Directions to the Commandant of Tonningen, not to surrender that Place to any Body what ever, upon pain of forfeiting his Life, Honour and Estate. The term prescribed by the Polish Diet expiring on the twenty fifth of January, the Nuntii had great Debates that Day, after which the Marechal, by their Order, desired the King, who was present on the Throne, to enlarge their time, which his Majesty granted.

Berlin, Febr. 11. N. S. The Queen having been indisposed for some time, is gone to Rebenitz, a Palace four Leagues from hence, by the Advice of her Physicians, who are of Opinion, that change of Air will contribute to her recovery. Some Days ago the Prince of Anhalt Dessau set out from hence in order to return to his own Dominions. Monsieur Nariski, Minister of the Czar, is gone by this Place in his way from Vienna to the Muscovite Army. Brigadier Eofander and Monsieur Brunel, the Swedish Secretary, arrived here on the 9th from Bender, having left that Place on the 25th of last December. They confirm the Advices we had receiv'd before, that the Grand Signior had declared War against the Czar, and that the King of Sweden intended to march from Bender about the beginning of this Month, with a considerable Body of Turks and Tartars in order to enter Poland. Yesterday Monsieur Eofander gave his Majesty an account of his Journey, and delivered the Letters he had to him from the King of Sweden. Advices from Warsaw say, that a Body of Muscovites, which was encamped near Smolensko, had received Orders to march into Livonia, and that General Czeremetoff was gone with another Body to Kiow on the Nieper.

Utrecht, February 18. N. S. Yesterday being Her Majesty's Birth-day, was celebrated with great magnificence by the British Plenipotentiaries, most of the Ministers with their Ladies, the English Gentlemen, and others Persons of Quality din'd at the Lord Privy Seal's House. In the Evening the Earl of Strafford gave a splendid Ball and Masquerade, at which were present above Five hundred Persons of Distinction, who were afterwards entertained by his Excellency at Supper, and the Diversions lasted till Five of the Clock this Morning. On the 11th Instant the Abbot Polignac, one of the Plenipotentiaries of France, set out for Paris, in pursuance of Orders he had received some Days before from that Court. Messieurs Buys and Vander-dussen, with the other Ministers of the States-General who went lately to the Hague, are returned from thence. On Tuesday Morning the Plenipotentiaries of Great Britain and France had a long Conference at the Lord Privy Seal's House, where they dined together, and afterwards those of the States came in, upon which they continued their Conference till late in the Evening. The next Day the French Ministers were again with their Lordships, who this Afternoon had two several Conferences with the Imperialists and the Dutch, at the Lord Privy Seal's House, as they have likewise had within a few Days, with most of the other Ministers of the Allies. The Plenipotentiaries of France have lately demanded Passports of the Dutch for the admission of those of Spain to the Congress, and it is said those Passports are accordingly granted.

London, February 13. Yesterday morning the Lord Viscount Cornbury died of a Fever. He was only Son and Heir apparent of the Earl of Clarendon, and Baron Clifton in Right of his Mother.
