HE Senate hath order'd a Manifelto to be publish'd, to justifie their Conduct towards the Pope, in relation to the Business of the Friar Granelli. Signor Grinaldi is gone to Rome, with Instructions from the Republick, to sente their Differences with that See about Ecclesiastical Jurisdictions. They write from Porta Spetia, that the Queen's Ships the Colchester, Dartmouth, Lion and Ormond were gothe from thence to Leghorn, in order to take on Board the Provisions that were got tendy there for Her Majesty's Fleet. We have received Advice from Barcelona, that General Staremberg had fent his Army into Winter Quarters.

Venice, February 10. N. S. Several finall Ships are come in here from the Levant. They bring an

Account, that the Turks make great Preparations for War. We have received Advice from Rome, that on the thirtieth past a Consistory was held there, and the Pope created four new Cardinals, Monsignor Erba Odescalchi, Archbishop of Milan; the Archbishop of Seville; the Bishop of Barcelona; and the Abbot Polignac. The Marquis de Prie and Monfignor Molinos, have protested against this Promotion, and made no Rejoicings upon it. One Hat remains still vacant, which it is thought is reserved for some Person to be recommended by King Augustus. The Pope found himself very much incommoded by the Fatigue he underwent that Day, and his Asthma is now return'd upon him with as much Violence as ever. The Marquis de Susa was arriv'd at Rome, and the Electoral Prince of Saxony is expected there in a few Days. They write from Naples, that four hundred Soldiers had been imbark'd on Board several Tartans, and sailed Westward, without publishing to what Place they are defigned.

Dresden, February 7. N. S. Yesterday Baron Lewendael, Great Marshal of this Court, set out from hence towards Poland, by which it is thought that the King our Elector intends to continue for some time in that Country. Letters from Warfaw bring an Account, that the Diet had come to a Re-folution, that the Army of the Crown should con-sist of Thirty six thousand effective Men, but they seem'd unwilling to enter upon Ways and Means for maintaining them, till the Great Treasurer had

standing the great Necessity we have for Mohey, This hath obliged the Government to lay some new Taxes on the People. On the 8th Inftant two Meti of War fail'd from hence to the North Sea, and they are to be follow'd very foon by two more, which with two or three Frights that are there already, are thought to be sufficient to keep the Swedish Squadron at Gottenburg from venturing to Sea. The 9th being the Anniversary of raising the Siege of this Place, it was celebrated here as usual. Advice is come from Jutland, that the Transport Ships which for some time have been expected from Norway, were at last arrived; but as we have had several Reports before to the same effect, which afterwards prov'd false, we don't jet give an entire Credit to this Account.

Utrecht, February 24. N. S. Yesterday the Imperial and French Plenipotentiaries were together in Conference with those of Her Majesty, upon the Subject of evacuating Catalonia, and this Day those Ministers were separately with their Lordships upon the same Affair, and afterwards the French and Prussians were with them about the Interests of their respect ctive Masters. Westminster, February 17. This Day the Parliament met, and was further Prorogu'd to Tuesday the 3d of March.
