*Milan, February 4. N. S.* The Difficulties that for some time have retarded the March of the *Prussian* Troops, are at length adjusted, and on the 31<sup>st</sup> past, they left their Quarters, in order to return into *Germany*. They are to be follow'd in a few Days by the *Swiss* Regiment of *Dispach*, which could not march at the same time with them, for want of Subsistence, which would be found with Difficulty on the Roads of *Tyrol*. The Count de *Castelbarco*, Envoy Extraordinary from the late Emperor to the Dukes of *Savoy*, is arriv'd here in his way to *Vienna*. He is succeeded at the Court of *Turin* by the Marquis d'*Onubria*, who hath resid'd there for some Years, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain*. Three Deputies from *Naples* are come to this Place. They wait for the arrival of a Fourth, in order to pursue their Journey to *Vienna*, being sent by the *Neapolitans* with the Title of Ambassadors to his Imperial Majesty, to desire a Confirmation of their Priviledges, the Province of *Cesmona* having suffer'd very much, as well by the mortality of Cattle, as by other pressures, and themselves under an incapacity of paying their Taxes in

Money; whereupon the Government hath agreed to take what is due from them in Corn.

*Frankfort, Feb. 16. N. S.* On the 13<sup>th</sup> Prince *Charles* of *Nieubourg* arriv'd here, and the next Day he pursu'd his Journey to *Inspruck*. The *Emperour* continues to make great Preparations in *Alsatia* for an early Campaign. They have already fill'd all their Magazines, and have sent Orders to their Officers to have their Companies compleat by the 2<sup>d</sup> of next Month, upon pain of being broke. We have receiv'd advice, that on the 6<sup>th</sup> Instanc a Detachment of five hundred *French*, defeated the *Guard* at *Keyserlauteren*, a little Town belonging to the *Elector Palatin*, after which they pillag'd the Place, and then retired.

*Berlin, February 18. N. S.* The King of *Prussia* hath been very much out of order for some time, with an Indisposition in his Stomach. Upon his first Illness, he sent for the Prince Royal from *Wasserhausen*, where he was gone to enjoy the Divertions of the Country. On the 13<sup>th</sup> his Majesty's Distemper grew so violent, that his Life was despair'd of, and he thought himself so near his End, that he took leave of his Family and Ministers. The next Day he continu'd very ill, but on the 15<sup>th</sup> he found himself better, and hath been upon the recovery ever since, that at present he is thought to be quite out of danger. The Queen is still indisposed at *Perbenitz*, from whence she intends, as soon as she is able, to proceed to *Grabow*, where the *Dutchess Dowager* of *Mecklenburg*, her Mother, resides. This Court hath resolv'd to disband as many Companies out of each Regiment of Foot as will amount to Five thousand Men.

*Hanover, February 21. N. S.* Count *Schonborn*, the Emperor's Minister, arriv'd here a few Days ago. He hath had an Audience of his Electoral Highness, and this Morning he went away, in order to return to *Brunswick*. The Bishop of *Spiga*, Director of the *Catholics* in the Circle of *Lower Saxony*, who keeps his Residence here, is gone to pass some time at *Munster*. The Officers of the *Elector's* Troops have not yet received Money for raising Reeruits, and it is still uncertain whether they are to raise any. The Resident of *Denmark* being sent for by the King his Master, set out from hence two Days ago towards *Holstein*. Count *Vehlen* General of the Imperial Troops, who was here for some time, is gone back to his Command in the Diocess of *Hildesheim*. A Gentleman of the King of *Sweden's* Household, who had been two Years at *Bender*, pass'd through this Place Yesterday in his way to *Hamburg*, where he is going to confer with Count *Welling*, and from thence he is to carry some Orders from his Majesty to the Senate at *Stockholm*. He brings an Account, that when he came away, the King of *Sweden* was preparing to return through *Poland* into his own Dominions with a sufficient Guard, and that the *Port* had declared War against the *Czar*, without shewing any regard to the opposition of those who were for preserving the Peace. The Letters we receiv'd Yesterday from *Holstein* bring advice, that General *Steinbock* had sent Four thousand Men into *Tonningen*, by Virtue of an Order directed to the Governour, and sign'd at *Stockholm* by the Duke of *Holstein Gottorp*, who hath been declared of Age, tho' he is not quite thirteen Years Old. Baron *Goertz*, first Minister of the Administrator of the *Dutchy*, is arriv'd here from *Hamburg*.
