

The *Saint Frédéric* having been complimented in the name of the *Sainte de la Sainte Marie*, *Cromwell*, and *Astræus*, is gone hence with great satisfaction of the late weare of his good services, and the intention there is to know where they *ultimately* intend. In order to which, those men are appointed to keep the records that shall be made, and some of the principal Officers of the French Society.

The *French* hope the people here have had of late, will be better informed than them of your intentions to be come over to a *Peace at Paris*, which is now yearly expected, by a Letter lately arrived from *Berck*; though the *Dukes* have informed us of *Gravesend*, that had been agreed to, and among other things, we have of *Admiral* as well the *Spanish*, as *Swedish Minister* in *Paris*, were very anxious to make that Negotiation early.

Our greatest care is to get well off of the French Society; for which end, a negotiation hath been held in the Council of State with *Prince Maurice*, about the terms and time for their march homewards; in which, he is directed to speak to the *Elector of Brandenburg*, upon whose *Duchy of Cleve* they must necessarily pass in their passage. Their first Rendezvous will be at *Maastricht*, but this is not perfectly resolved. In the mean time they march very great distances where they are, having in two days killed five Dutch Soldiers in *Berck*, among the other Nations that serve in *Garrison* there, were ready to have taken down all the French, but that the *Government* there is of that Nation. They are certainly so weak in this as vice, though they force every creature into the Fleet, as far as *Bruges*, that the Four Companies of French Foot in *Rheesbergh* do not make forty men.

The List of the Thirteen Companies to be sent to *Coët-Frique* is made, but the Commanders yet named.

The *Elector of Brandenburg* is arrived here *Yesterdays*, having notified by his Minister here, that he comes to be sent to his *Session*, and that all *Coronary* and *Complements* of *Reception*, and *Treatment* may be annexed. In which it was thought best to make no formal Resolution, but to pass it by. To morrow is his to be *introduced* to the *Textel*, to see the Fleet, being invited to dinner at the *Saint Falckenburgh* at his house of *Bergen en Egge*.

Duisburg, May 4. The *Elector* intended to go this day towards the Fleet, but seeing the *Sainte de Wittenberg*, and the *Council of State* had waited on him in a Body, the *States General* have denied liberty to do the like. Whereupon the *Sainte Wittenberg*, *Mersic*, *de Witte*, *Reigerberg*, *Resewerd*, *Adine*, *Pillatz*, and *Nieuwe*, have been to complete him this morning. So as his journey to the Fleet is deferred till to morrow. And it is not certain, whether with intention to return hither, though it is believed he may, and to carry the *Prince's Dowager* with him to *Cleve*.

Our last news from the Frontiers tell us, the *Blücher* continues still to hold *Berck* and *Oosterscheld*, under presence of some effects of contribution, which the *Commodity* yet owes him.

Hamburg, April 28. The *Swedish Levies* for *Horne*, are still concealed in these parts, and amongst others, a Lieutenant Colonel, *Souvenirs* belonging to *Lubec*, has offered him 600 Harsf well appointed. The new raised *Yellow Regiment* is likewise completed and mustered: There is also a sum of money come from *Sweden* for continuing the Levies; and yet the certainty of their design not discovered.

The *Commissioners* for the *City of Bremen* were very scrupulous in advertising themselves to *Sweden* to treat with the *Swedes*, without full assurance of *Feldis Wrangels* being present; and 'tis said, they have received an Express Intimation from the *Emperor*, not to enter into any further Treaty.

May 8. Letters from *Marseille*, May 4. S. N. tell us, That the French Fleet under the command of *Duke de Beaufort* went to Sea from *Thoulon* on the 29 of April. That 13 Gallions are to follow them, having appointed the Rendezvous at the Straights mouth; whether afterward intended, is not yet known.

Bristol, May 5. This day arrived here a Vessel from *Cork*, who informs us that the *Sainte Fregat* hath brought into *Castletown* four Prizes, two of them Ships of burden, the other two Gallions or *Hoyes*: leaving her Prizes secure,

She again went south. Camping all night *Man of War*, from whom she was parted by *L. Venner*, and fell open two hours *Barca Man of War*, each of a crew carrying forty Guns, whom she engaged with much gallantry and gallantry saving honour. Her very considerable share of that Engagement, and reward'd with very little hurt to *Wing*, etc.

London, May 5. Yesterday we observed from hence a Fleet of forty or fifty Sail of Ships, out from the Creek, and *Prizes* received from *Wing*; some were laden, others a hundred and fifty S.^ts, some of which we suppose for the Straights, though the rest of them prove in our *Fleet* - *Losses*.

Weymouth, May 5. The *Weymouth* calling upon the Coasts, during her way between *Portsmouth*, and the *Isle of Wight*, a *Frigate* to a green flag, was unfortunately run upon the ledge of a Rock, so whom the Captain sent out his boat, to go aboard them, who found her to be a *Swedes* ship with *Wines* from *Berck*, bound for *London*; but with much care and industry, using the name of the *Wines*, and by disguising her, they got her off without much damage, and brought her safe into the *Isle of Wight*.

Flyford, May 4. Some small Vessels were on Monday last taken into Flyd, by two French Ships, and the same day another French Ship seized on two small Vessels before *Dartmouth*, but the Town immediately pursued our Boats, and gave to each a shot to the French, that they recovered the Vessels.

Devon, May 6. On Thursday last the *Liffy* brought into *Margaret-Rose* a Flemish *Fluyt* of twenty Ton, a new Vessel laden with Brandy. Yesterday came into the same Road an *Olden Mid of War*, bringing with him eighty three English Seamen, whom his Master has redeemed. These small French *Mid of War* are said to have attempted the *Passover-Boat*, which was designed to have transported them; several of their Masters were taken in the *Charity*, and extremely suffered the carriage of their Captain in the last year's fight. They are as long stories of the great difficulties the Dutch are in the Seamen's twenty or thirty Captains, Lieutenants, Masters, etc. having been sent in chains to prison, for refusing to go to Sea.

Bay of the Nore, May 5. On Thursday the third Infantry, and Council of War bear the Royal *Charles*, a *Troy* was held for and concerning the behaviour of Captain *Ridder Minors*, formerly Lieutenant of His Majesties ship the *Old James*, under the command of the late Earl of *Marlborough*, where the said Captain *Minors* was found Not Guilty of any marriage, through want of Courage, or other non-performance of Duty in the Engagement with the Dutch, the third day of *June* last: and it was further found upon proof, that *Opfer* was blown up, before the Earl of *Marlborough* was killed.

Plymouth, May 6. Yesterday arrived here the *Tiger* Fregat who brought in with her a prize, being a ship of *Rotterdam*, of 250 Tuns and 5 Guns, laden with *Wine*, *Brandy*, and *Prunes*. The next day after the taking of this Vessel, she met with a *Zealand Caper* of 40 Guns well manned, with whom she fought three hours, Captain *Pet*, Commander of the *Tiger*, being unluckily shot at the first Broad-side: Notwithstanding his loss, the *Fregat* maintained the fight with much gallantry and resolution, which forc'd the *Caper* to tract rather to his Sails than *Guns*, and ran for it; the *Fregat* pursuing five or six hours; but their Sails and Tackles having received much damage, the *Caper* got away, and the *Tiger* returned with her Prize, having received in her Hull 52 shot, 5 men besides the Captain slain, and about 20 wounded.

Haz, May 6. We have news from *Ojend*, that three ships of that Town who came lately from these parts, are seized by a French ship, and carried into *Flushing*.

Weymouth, May 7. Yesterday the *Parades Fregat* brought into this Real, a French Vessel laden with *Wines*, which she took off from the West of *Portland*.

Portsmouth, May 8. On Sunday left the *Mary Rose* came into *Spit-Head*, bringing with her a pretended *Swede*, which she sent into *Cowes* where the *Prize Office* is.
