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Madrid, March 13. N. S.

THE Prince of Asturias, who for some time was indisposed of a Cold, attended with a Fever, is now perfectly recovered. The Queen hath declared, that she is three Months gone with Child, which hath occasioned great Joy here, and the Principal Nobility have complimented her Majesty upon that occasion. The Suspension of Arms with the Crown of Portugal is renewed for Four Months, and a Correspondence is again settled with that Kingdom. We have received advice from Catalonia, that a Squadron of British Ships was come into the Port of Barcelona, and that immediately after their arrival, the Empress had declared to the Deputies and Magistrates of the City, that his Imperial Majesty being obliged by the Treaty of Peace, to renounce his Pretensions to the Crown of Spain, and consequently to evacuate Catalonia, she intended to embark for Italy as soon as the Wind would permit. It is thought the States of the Province upon this Declaration, will send Deputies to the King to acknowledge him for their lawful Sovereign. A Courier from Carthage hath brought an Account, that the Persons who went from thence on the 2d of February last, to redeem the Captives at Algiers, were returned on the 6th Instant, with Two hundred and eight Slaves, among whom are Fifty Officers, and Eleven Children.

Vienna, March 22. N. S. On the 19th, the Court went into Mourning for the Death of the late King of Prussia. The next Day the Emperor declared Count Schlick, Chancellor of Bohemia, and it is thought he will be succeeded in his Post of Commissary-General of the Council of War, either by Count Thierheim or Count Althann. Prince Eugene hath already sent away his Equipage to the Low-Countries, intending to follow himself in three or four Days. Marshal Daun, who is constituted Vice-Roy of Naples, will set out about the same time for that Kingdom. Monsieur Bartholdi, the Prussian Minister, is recalled by the King his Master, who hath ordered his Secretary here to transact his Affairs at this Court. The Ministers of the Duke of Guastalla have received Investiture in his Name of the States he holds from the Emperor. Last Night two Expresses dispatched by the British and Holstein Ministers at Bender, arrived here. They bring a particular Account of the late Action between the Swedes and the Turks, as also a Confirmation of the King of Sweden's being carry'd away Prisoner to Adrianople. Notwithstanding which, our last Advices from Turkey inform us, that the Grand Signior continues to make great Preparations for a War, which he is resolv'd to push on with Vigour against the Muscovites, and it is said he intends to lead his Army in Person.

Berlin, March 25. N. S. The King went this Morning to Charlottenburg, and it is said he will go soon to Hall, and from thence to Magdeburg, to review the Troops that have served lately in Italy. His Majesty hath been pleas'd to remit to his Subjects the usual Present they make to their new Sovereign, which amounts to a very considerable Sum. The number of Employments, as well Civil as Military, is lessened every Day, and the King intends not to have a much larger Court than he had when he was Prince-Royal. Baron Dinkelmann, who was first Minister in the late Reign, came hither from Cobus a few Days ago. He was

above an Hour in private with his Majesty, who received him very graciously. Monsieur Haneroth is restored to his Employment of Privy-Counsellor. The Effects of Liebman's, the Jew, which were lately seized to answer the Crown's Demands upon her, are found to amount to One hundred thousand Crowns. It is said the King is inclin'd to accept of a Composition from her. Major-General Hamerstein, who came to this Court with a Compliment of Condolence from the Elector of Hanover, had an Audience of Leave on the 23d, and this Day he set out from hence, in order to return home. The Body of the late King having lain in State for some time, during which he was attended by the Privy-Counsellors, and the Officers of the Army, and the Household, as if he had been still alive, was deposited a few Days ago in the Chapel till the Day of his Funeral, which is appointed to be on the first of May.

Hanover, March 31. N. S. Monsieur Fabrice, who was formerly Envoy from his Electoral Highness to the Czar and to King Augustus, is made a Privy-Counsellor; and at the same time the Elector constituted three new Chamberlains. Orders are sent to Monsieur Puckler, Secretary of this Court at Copenhagen, to go to the King of Denmark at Husum in Holstein; and upon his arrival there, Monsieur Schulemburg is to take Leave of his Majesty, in order to return hither. We have received Advice, that Prince Menzikoff sent an Aid de Camp with a Letter to Count Steinhock, acquainting him with the Misfortune that have happened to the King his Master in Turkey. The Swedish General writ him a very civil Answer, in which he thanks him for communicating to him the Account he had received, but declares at the same time, that he can't look upon it to be Authentick.

Utrecht, April 11. N. S. The Plenipotentiaries of the States General, who went lately to the Hague to receive the last Instructions of their Masters, in relation to the Peace, being returned from thence, had a Conference yesterday Morning with the Queen's Plenipotentiaries, and another in the Afternoon with those of France in their Lordships Presence, in which they went through and settled their Treaties of Peace and Commerce. This Morning the Ministers of the Protestant Allies met at the Town-house and drew up a Representation in favour of the French Protestants, which was delivered by their Lordships to the Plenipotentiaries of that Nation. They went afterwards to Count Zinzendorf, told him they were going to sign the Queen's Peace, and shew'd him the Plan they had negotiated with the French for the Emperor and the Empire till the First of June. They proceeded from thence to the Houses of the other Ministers of the Allies, and notified the same thing to them. At two in the Afternoon the Ministers of France came to the Lord Privy Seal's House, and Her Majesty's Treaties of Peace and Commerce were signed there; soon after the Duke of Savoy's Ministers came likewise, and signed their Master's Peace. They all dined at the Earl of Strafford's, where the Treaties of Portugal, Prussia, and the States-General were also signed, to the mutual Satisfaction of all the Parties concerned.
