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London, Octob. 9.

**O**N Friday last the Right Honourable the Earl of *Offory*, with several Persons of Quality, and Officers of his Majesties Diet, went hence to Embark upon the Yachts appointed to pass into *Holland*, to attend His Highness the Prince of *Orange*, and to Conduct him into *England*.

*Rome, Sept. 20.* The Popes relations are much allarm'd by a great fit of the Gout which lately surpris'd his Holiness, and has confin'd him for several days to his bed.

Two Turks who at the siege of *Candia*, deserted the Grand Vissers Army, and were since brought hither, got into the acquaintance of an Armenian Merchant, and supposing him to be rich, watched their opportunity to kill the Merchant, intending to have seiz'd upon his wealth, and afterwards to make their escape, but upon the murder, were detected, and committed to prison, from whence they endeavour'd to free themselves, and in the attempt killed the Goaler, and hurt several of the Guards; but finding themselves over-pow'd, they for some time defended a room in the prison, which they thought to have made good; but this refuge being also forced from them, one of them stabbed himself with a knife, but was taken away halfe dead, and publicly executed at the Gate of the prison, the other being committed to safe custody in order to his sentence.

*Venice, Sept. 27.* Several ships lately arriv'g from the *Levant* inform us, that the Grand Signior taking notice of some little disturbance or insurrection of the people in *Morea*, sent immediately to the Bassa of that place, to proceed rigorously against those that were found to be principal actors in the disturbance, and to raise some Forts in such places, as should be most convenient for the future security of the peace in those parts.

The Vissier has endeavour'd as much as possible, by all the Methods of Moderation and Sweetness, to work upon the Sultans and the Janisaries, but hitherto has not succeeded in his design, but the common people who are grown poor by the long absence of the Court, seem very desirous of the return of the Grand Signior amongst them.

Chevalier *Molino* having made use of the Interest he has with the Grand Vissier, for the benefit of many Christians who sheltered themselves under his protection, is gone by his place of Residence at *Bera* near *Constantinople*.

The Vissier in a familiar conference which he had with Chevalier *Molino*, is said to have told him, that in his younger dayes he had in the disguise of a Greek, spent six years in his studies at *Padua*, and for proof thereof, produced a *Diploma* which was there given him for his degree of Doctor.

This week the Senate received a Brief from the Pope, authorising them to proceed in the sale of the Estates belonging to the Religious houses which were suppressed, the moneys thence arising having been design'd to Reimburse them for their great expences during the late war with the Turks. The

Nuncio has lately sollicit'd the Senate, to take care for the suppression of the Corsairs of *Dulcigno*, who have much disturb'd the Trade of the *Gulfe*; whereupon the Senate has order'd 12 Galeots to be fitted up for this service, besides the usual number of Gallies, with whom are to be joynd several armed Barks belonging to the Ecclesiastical Estate.

His Excellency my Lord *Faloonberg* was by some indisposition of body forced to continue several dayes at *Padoua* beyond his expectation; the 21. he was visit'd by the two Governours there, viz. the *Podesta*, and the *Capitano Grande* with a Train of about 30. Coaches, and all the Nobles, and Complimented, and afterwards presented with Wines, Flesh, Fish, and Comfitures in the name of the Senate; His Excellency return'd the Visits the next day, and intend'd the day following, to depart thence on his way for *England*.

*Vienna, Sept. 28.* The Emperor has had many Consultations with his Ministers of State, about the affairs of *Lorraine*, at whose present condition the Princes and Electors his Neighbors seem much concern'd, as at a fire broaken out in the next houses to them; It is thought convenient at the present, to send an Ambassador to his most Christian Majesty in the name of the Emperor and Empire, to inquire what farther reasons induc'd him to this sudden invasion, besides those already alleadg'd by the *Sieur de Gremonville*.

The Prince of *Lorraine* and the Baron *de Risincourt*, the Duke of *Lorraines* Envoy Extraordinary in this Court press hard for assistance, urging it as an Incumbency upon the Emperor and the whole Empire to protect the Duke who is a Member thereof, who is ready upon the producing any just Charge against him by his Most Christian Majesty, to make him all reasonable satisfaction, and to refer all to the judgement of the General Assembly of the Estates General of the Empire. to the States of the United Provinces, or any other indifferent arbitration.

'Tis said the Emperor expects a general Deputation from the whole Empire upon this affair.

The Empress still continues indispos'd, upon which account, the Emperor has put off for some time his intended journey of diversion to *Ebersdorfe*.

The Count *Nadasdi* has been often examin'd about the late Rebellion in *Hungary*, but cannot be brought to make confession of his own Guilt, in the matters of which he stands accus'd; he is now fallen into some distemper of body, for which, two able Physicians are appointed to take care of him, and a Diet is allow'd him out of the Emperors Kitching, which is diligently inspect'd, lest the Count should by poyson, prevent such farther Inquisition as is to be made concerning his Crime.

The Count *Serini* and Marquis *de Frangipani* are still at *Nieustadt*, under a constant Guard of 40. souldiers.

On the 20th instant was held a great Council about the affairs of *Hungary*, where were present, the Archbishop of *Gran*, and some others of the Principal Nobility of that Kingdom; after all they believed it will be concluded necessary for some time,

at least, to keep strong Garrisons in *Upper Hungary*, which must be maintained at the Expences of the several Counties and Commonalties there, besides what shall be advanced upon that account, out of Estates which are under Confiscation.

The Emperor is raising fresh Souldiers for the forming of some new Regiments, and the increasing the old Army to the number of 20000. foot and 10000. horse, beside the Garrisons, in which are employed about 20000. more.

The King of *Poland* having fixed a day for the solemn Coronation of the Queen at *Warsaw*, has sent hither a Gentleman of his Chamber, one *Westel*, son to the late Palatin of *Plosco*, to invite their Imperial Majesties to that solemnity. The Count *de Schafgotz* who is now in *Silesia*, is made choice of by the Emperor to assist there in his room, and has sent him his Commission for that purpose.

We are here in expectation of the arrival of an Envoy extraordinary from *Michael Abassi* Prince of *Transylvania*.

*Hambourg*, Octob. 7. From *Reuel* we are told, that General *Wrangle* was at his arrival there honourably received and saluted by all their Canon, as he was afterwards in the visit he made round the place to view the Fortifications. The Second past he was Treated by the Citizens in the Town-house with much liberality, and the noise of all the Artillery; the Sixth of the same moneth he was entertained by the black Fraternity, amongst whom he was pleased to enter his name, according to the example of King *Gustaphus Adolphus*, and the next day departed thence on his return for *Sweden*.

The Heer *Heinhus*, late Envoye from the States-General of the *United Provinces* to the Czar of *Muscovy*, is lately arrived at *Stockholme*, much indisposed by reason of his long travel.

The Court was there expected the 5th instant, but the Council arrived some days before with the Chancellor, to whom the French Resident made his addressees, to inform him, that the most Christian King his master was sending thither the Marquis *d'Angeau*, with the Character of his Ambassador to that Crown.

Notice being given, that many of the Swedish Seamen had been entertained at *Gottenbourg* with intention to send them into *France*, Orders were immediately dispatched thither to put a stop to the designe, and prevent them from embarking.

All our *Greenland* Fisher-ships are returned home except one which was cast away.

The Magistrates of this City are dispatching Two of their Deputies into *England*, to endeavor to compound for the satisfaction of those persons which were concerned in the loss of the ships in the *Elve*, during the late war.

From *Erford* we are told, that the Two *Lorrain* Regiments of Horse which were there, intended in few days to march thence towards *Hombourg*, there to attend the Commands of the Duke their Master.

From several parts of *Poland* we are informed, that the Army was indeed confederated, but their designe was only for preservation of the honour of their General, and not at all to act any thing against the interest of the King.

The Comte *de Hernin Nunez*, Envoye Extraordinary from the Court of *Spain*, is arrived at *Warsaw*, as is also the Heer *de Wit*, Ambassador from the States of the *United Provinces*. The Diet proceeds very temperately and mildly against the Grand Treasurer and other persons. The Primare is fully reconcil'd to the Court, and the Diet generally inclined to act heartily for the interest of the King and Kingdom.

The Clergy of *Poland* have prevailed with the King to send a Commission into *Prussia* to in-

quire upon what account the Anabaptists are permitted and countenanced in that Country: this Commission is like to take place in the Countrey, but those of that sect, inhabitants of *Dantzic*, have made their applications to their Magistrates, and perswaded them to protest against the Commission, thinking themselves obliged to protect their own Citizens.

*Hague*, Octob. 14. On Saturday the 4th instant the States of *Holland* adjourned themselves till the 4th of *November* next ensueing, without fixing upon any way of raising moneys for their new intended Leavies, and the Fleet which they designe to put out to sea the next Spring, which is to consist of 48 of their best men of war, 16 lighter Fregats, and 12 Fire-ships.

The Bishop of *Strasbourg* has been lately at *Macstricht*, where he complained to the Rhinegrave of the entertainment he met with from his Excellency the Count *de Monterey*, who refused to give him a particular Audience, without leave from the Court at *Madrid*, and that in the conference he had with him in the Church of *Nostre Dame du Lac*, he refused to discourse with him upon any affairs of great concernment.

His Highness the Prince of *Orange* having received the compliments of the States-General, and those of *Holland* upon his intended passage into *England*, expects the arrival of the Yachts, designed for his transportation, designing to embark about the 20th instant.

The Heer *Beverning* has at the last accepted of the employment as Ambassador from the States-General to the Court of *Spain*, and is preparing for his journey, which he intends to begin in few weeks.

The States have thought fit to send to the Heer *de Groot*, their Ambassador at the Court of *France*, to enter speedily upon the execution of what is given him in charge, by vertue of his Commission; and in case of the continuance of his indisposition of body, to commit the care of it to Secretary *Romps*, who is orderd to continue for a year longer at *Paris*.
