**O**N Friday last the Right Honourable the Earl of *Offory*, with several Persons of Quality, and Officers of his Majesties Diet, went hence to Embark upon the Yachts appointed to pass into *Holland*, to attend His Highness the Prince of *Orange*, and to Conduct him into *England*.

*Rome, Sept. 20.* The Popes relations are much allarumd by a great fit of the Gout which lately surpris'd his Holiness, and has confined him for several days to his bed.

Two Turks who at the siege of *Candia*, deserted the Grand Vissers Army, and were since brought hither, got into the acquaintance of an Armenian Merchant, and supposing him to be rich, watched their opportunity to kill the Merchant, intending to have scis'd upon his wealth, and afterwards to make their escape, but upon the murther, were detected, and committed to prison, from whence they endeavoured to free themselves, and in the attempt killed the Goaler, and hurt several of the Guards; but finding themselves over-powred, they for some time defended a room in the prison, which they thought to have made good; but this refuge being also forced from them, one of them stabbed himself with a knife, but was taken away halfe dead, and publicly executed at the Gate of the prison, the other being committed to safe custody in order to his sentence.

*Venice, Sept. 27.* Several ships lately arriving from the *Levant* inform us, that the Grand Signior taking notice of some little disturbance or insurrection of the people in *Morea*, sent immediately to the Bassa of that place, to proceed rigorously against those that were found to be principal actors in the disturbance, and to raise some Forts in such places, as should be most convenient for the future security of the peace in those parts.

The Vissier has endeavoured as much as possible, by all the Methods of Moderation and Sweetness, to work upon the Sultans and the Janisaries, but hitherto has not succeeded in his design, but the common people who are grown poor by the long absence of the Court, seem very desirous of the return of the Grand Signior amongst them.

Chevalier *Molino* having made use of the Interest he has with the Grand Vissier, for the benefit of many Christians who sheltered themselves under his protection, is gone by his place of Residence at *Bera* near *Constantinople*.

The Vissier in a familiar conference which he had with Chevalier *Molino*, is said to have told him, that in his younger dayes he had in the disguise of a Greek, spent six years in his studies at *Padua*, and for proof thereof, produced a *Diploma* which was there given him for his degree of Doctor.

This week the Senate received a Brief from the Pope, authorising them to proceed in the sale of the Estates belonging to the Religious houses which were suppressed, the moneys thence arising having been designed to Reimburse them for their great expences during the late war with the Turks. The

Nuncio has lately sollicit'd the Senate, to take care for the suppression of the Corsairs of *Dulcigno*, who have much disturbed the Trade of the *Gulfe*; whereupon the Senate has ordered 12 Galeots to be fitted up for this service, besides the usual number of Gallies, with whom are to be joynd several armed Barks belonging to the Ecclesiastical Estate.

His Excellency my Lord *Faloonberg* was by some indisposition of body forced to continue several dayes at *Padoua* beyond his expectation; the 21. he was visited by the two Governours there, viz. the *Podesta*, and the *Capitano Grande* with a Train of about 30. Coaches, and all the Nobles, and Complimented, and afterwards presented with Wines, Flesh, Fish, and Comfitures in the name of the Senate; His Excellency returned the Visits the next day, and intended the day following, to depart thence on his way for *England*.

*Vienna, Sept. 28.* The Emperor has had many Consultations with his Ministers of State, about the affairs of *Lorraine*, at whose present condition the Princes and Electors his Neighbors seem much concerned, as at a fire broaken out in the next houses to them; It is thought convenient at the present, to send an Ambassador to his most Christian Majesty in the name of the Emperor and Empire, to inquire what farther reasons induced him to this sudden invasion, besides those already alleadged by the *Sieur de Gremonville*.

The Prince of *Lorraine* and the Baron *de Risincourt*, the Duke of *Lorraines* Envoy Extraordinary in this Court press hard for assistance, urging it as an Incumbency upon the Emperor and the whole Empire to protect the Duke who is a Member thereof, who is ready upon the producing any just Charge against him by his Most Christian Majesty, to make him all reasonable satisfaction, and to refer all to the judgement of the General Assembly of the Estates General of the Empire. to the States of the United Provinces, or any other indifferent arbitration.

Tis said the Emperor expects a general Deputation from the whole Empire upon this affair.

The Empress still continues indisposed, upon which account, the Emperor has put off for some time his intended journey of diversion to *Ebersdorfe*.

The Count *Nadasdi* has been often examined about the late Rebellion in *Hungary*, but cannot be brought to make confession of his own Guilt, in the matters of which he stands accused; he is now fallen into some distemper of body, for which, two able Physicians are appointed to take care of him, and a Diet is allowed him out of the Emperors Kitching, which is diligently inspected, lest the Count should by poyson, prevent such farther Inquisition as is to be made concerning his Crime.

The Count *Serini* and Marquis *de Frangipani* are still at *Nieustadt*, under a constant Guard of 40. souldiers.

On the 20th instant was held a great Council about the affairs of *Hungary*, where were present, the Archbishop of *Gran*, and some others of the Principal Nobility of that Kingdom; after all they believed it will be concluded necessary for some time,
