Molt Gracious Sovereign,

W E bumlly beg leave to Congratulate Tour Majesty with the greatest Joy, upon the happy Couclusion of a Peace, and the Securing of the Pro-testant Succession, whereof we have the fullest As-furances from that perfect Friendship which there is between Your Majesty and the Illustrious House of Hanover, which we bope no Artifices will ever be able to impair.

If the conquering Difficulties increases Glory, bow many has Your Majefty met withal in this im-portant Affair, fuch as nothing but Your unalterable Defire of the Good of Your Kingdoms, and the Happiness of Europe could have overcome? With what Courage, Constancy and Condust have Your able and faithful Ministry press'd through all Oppo-sition, to finish a Work so advantageous to Your People, and fo agreeable to Your Generous and Compeffionate Nature.

Coire, April 11: N. S. The Swifs Regiment of Diesbach, confifting at prefent of about Six hundred Men, pais'd lately through this Place in their way from the Milanefe to the Low Countries.

Paffage was granted at the Defire of the States-General, tho' it had been refolved here to let none of the Emperor's Troops march through our Territories, till the States had received Satisfaction in relation to the Treaty of Paffage. The Baron de Grenth, his Imperial Majefty's Envoy to this Republick, is gone to Milan, to pay his Duty to the Empters as She paffes through that City in her return to Vi-enna. They write from Bern, that the French are buying great Numbers of Horfes in those Parts, and that they have Commissions to procure above Four thousand.

Berlin, April 22. N. S. On the 16th Monfieur Viereck arrived here with the Treaty of Peace, and on the 18th he fet out again, in order to return to Utrecht with the King's Ratification. The next Day his Majefty went to Wyfterhaufen, and is ex-pected in Town this Evening. Count Denhoff, Under-Chamberlain of Lithuania, is arrived here from King Augustus, to Compliment his Majestv upon the Death of his Father, and his own Accel-fion to the Crown, and to Morrow he is to have an Audience. A great many of the Nobility, as alfo the Deputies of the Towns in this Province, are come hither to take the Oath of Allegiance, and to

affift at the late King's Funeral. Hanover, April 28. N. S. The Emperor's Troops in the Diocefs of Hildesheim, that were commanded to the Low Countries, are now ordered to March towards the Rhine. It is reported here, that his Imperial Majesty is refolved to continue the War, and that feveral Princes of the Empire have offer'd to affift him with Troops. The Princels of Bevern intended to have met the Empress, her Sister, before fhe arrived at Vienna, but as fhe is big with Child, the Duke of Wolfenbuttel hath diffuaded her from fo great a Journey. Letters from Hulum bring an Account, that the Milunderstanding encreases between the Danes and the Mulcovites. The Muscovites complain that the Danes let them have no Share in the Contributions they raife, and the Danes thew great diffatisfaction at the Diforders committed by the Muscovites. These Differences add very much to the Obstacles the Allies meet with in attacking the Entrenchments of the Swedes. Baron Goertz, Minister of the Administrator of Holstein, hath been negotiating a Treaty between the Two Parties, and it was proposed, that Count Steinbock should be transported to Sweden, with the Forces under his Command, but the Confederates infit that they should, leave their Arms and Horses behind when they embark, fo that it is not yet known whe-

ther they will come to any Agreement. Hague, May 2. N. S. On the 27th path, the States of Holland and Well Frielland allembled, and on the part of their Province, ratify'd the Treaty of Peace fign'd by the Dutch Plenipoten-tiaries at Utrecht. They ordered their Confent to be communicated to the States General, defiring at the fame time, that the general Ratification of the Seven Provinces fliould be exchanged as foon as poffible, the other Six having already transmitted It is thought the States will continue their theirs. Seffion for some time longer, in order to reduce the Troops in their Pay, to make another Lottery for raifing ten Millions of Guilders, and to regulate other Affairs of the Province. The Earl of Strafford came hither fome Days ago, and hath had fe-veral Conferences with the Grand Penfionary, and This other Deputies of the States General. The Imperial Forces,



Forces, confifting of Sixteen thousand Men, which were Cantoning in Brabant, have received Orders to retire from that Country, and to march towards the Upper Rhine to join the Army the Emperor intends to gather there. Letters from St. Malo fay, that Monfieur Caffart, with the Squadron under his Command, had made himfelf Mafter of Curacao, an Island in the West Indies, belonging to the Dutch.

Utrecht, May 5. N. S. On the 3d Inftant Baron Kirchner, Plenipotentiary of his Imperial Majefty, was in Conference with the Lord Privy Seal. The fame Day Count Grofs, who had been difpatch'd to Turin with the Treaty of Peace between France and Savoy, returned from thence with his Royal Highness's Ratification. Yesterday the Commissioners of the Queen, and the States General, for fettling the Trade in the Spanish Netherlands, had a Meeting on the Subject of their Commission at the Lord Privy Seal's Houfe, and the Dutch Ministers were likewife prefent. Monfieur Spanbrock, whom the Province of Zeland hath nam'd for their Plenipotentiary, in the room of Monsieur Mirmont, deceas'd, hath this Day made a formal notification of his arrival to all the Ministers.
