Most Gracious Sovereign!

W E of Your Majesty's ancient, dutiful and loyal City of York, do humbly beg leave, with the barliest of Your Subjects, to congratulate Tour Majesty upon the happy conclusion of a Peace, which Your Majesty, by Your own Royal Care, wife and pradent Management, bath at length, after a long expensive War obtained; a Peace, which as it is an addition to all the other great Successes and Glories of Your Rign, so 'tu the greatest and most desirable Bleffing Your Subjects can enjoy. And as we must always gratefully acknowledge, and for ever be sensible of the many Advantages Tour Majesty bath obtained for us, in point of Trade, so, Madam, we remember with the highest Gratitude to Your Majesty, what You have done for securing the Protestant Succession; and it is with as great Plea-fure as Security, that we call to mind the perfest Friendship, declared from the Throne, to be between Tour Majesty and the Illustrious House of Hanover.

We beg leave to assure Your Majesty, that we have the deepest Sense of Your Majesty's extraordinary Goodness, Prudence and Wisdom, and the very many great and glorious Things You have, during the course of Your Reign, done for us. MADAM,

W E were as defirous as any of Tour Maj sty's Subjects, to have long since publickly acknow ledged Your Goodness, in communicating to Tur Parliament the Terms of a General Peace; and a concern'd that our Corporation could be fo far . duc'd, as to be Silent on that Occasion.

Be pleased to permit us, Dread Sovereign declare, That we are not of that Number, woo ad bere to those that delight in War.

And we beg leave to take the first Opportunity of returning our humble and hearty Thanks to God and Your Majesty, for giving Your People so honou rable a Peace; a Peace by which the Church of England, and the Succession in the Illustrious House of Hanover, is secured to Us and Our Posterity t A Peace so highly advantageous to Your Own Sub-jests, and just to Your Allies, that it even exceeds all the Glories of Your Reign; having thereby so bappily effected that great and difficult Work, of sixing a real Ballance of Power in Europe on such Terms as execute themselves.

May Your Reign be long and peaceable, always bl-st with such a wife and faithful Ministry, as now, intirely British, constantly pursuing the true Interest

of their Country.

And that all our Fellow-Subjects may, like us, be truly sensible of the Happiness of Your Majesty's Government, and the Rieslings of Peace, shall be the Prayers of, Madam, Your Majesty's most dutiful and obedient Subjects.

Milan, April 25. N. S. The Dispositions are making for her Imperial Majesty's Journey to Vienna, and it is thought she will be ready to ser out in ten Days. The Emperor hath given Directions that the should pass through Italy incognito, and receive no Ambassadors, which will spare the Italian Princes a good-barble Emperor and Italian Princes. lian Princes a considerable Expence they would otherwise, have been put to upon that Occasion. Mareschal Daun, who is appointed to be Vice-Roy of Naples, is expected here this Evening. Three Imperial Regiments are to be fent from hence very foon into Bavaria. Admiral Jennings went from hence fome Days ago towards Turin: When he took leave of the Empress, she made him a Present of her Picture set with Diamonds, of a considerable Value. Since the Report of the Plague's being at Vienna encreases, and that this State can't break off a Correspondence with their Sovereign, Genoa and Parma,

notwithstanding which the Emperor thought proper to remove Yesterday with the whole Court to Laxembourg, and it is reported he will go to Frankfort soon after the arrival of the Empress. His Imperial Majesty, by a solemn Act, hath declared the Arch Dutchesses, Daughters of the late Emperor Joseph, Successors to his Hereditary Dominions, in case he should happen to die without Children. On the 18th Count Schembeck, Bishop of Livonia, Plenipotentiary of King Augustus and the Republick of Poland, had his first Audience with the usual Formalities. It is said, Count Palsi, Master of the Horse to the Empress Eleanora, will be made Palatin of Hungary. Letters from Turkey bring Palatin of Hungary. Letters from Turkey bring an Account, that the King of Sweden was at Demir-Tocca, within eight Leagues of Adrianople, and that the Grand Signior had deposed some Ministers who were concern'd in the Infult committed against his Majesty at Bender.

Berlin, April 29. N. S. On the 2th the Ceremony of taking the Oath of Allegiance was performed upon the Esplanade before the Castle, during which time the King appear'd in a Balcony. fieur Printz made a Speech in his Majesty's Name to the Nobility and Deputies, and was answered by Monsieur Schluten the Burgermaster of this City. They were afterwards entertain'd at Dinner at the Castle by Order of the King, who went the same Day into the Country. Count Schonborn arrived here Yesterday from Hamburg, with a Commission from the Emperor. The late King's Funeral is put off to the 2d of May, and as it is to be performed with great Magnificence, feveral Strangers are come

hither to fee it.

Brussels, May 8. N.S. Monsieur Vandenberg, the Dutch Deputy residing at this Place, hath been fent for by the States General to the Hague, in order to be present at their Deliberations upon several Affairs relating to these Provinces; and accordingly he fet out from hence two Days ago. On the 5th, Baron Malkneche, the Elector of Bavaria's Secretary, and his Minister to the Congress at Utrecht, passed through this Place on his way thither. Baron Kargg, who hath the same Character from the Elector of Cologn, is likewise gone from Namur to Utrecht. The Dutch Troops cantoned in this Neighbourhood, remain in their former Stations, it having been found impracticable to distribute the Horse to graze in the Meadows, as was proposed, by reason of the backwardness of the Season.
