*Warsaw, May 17. N. S.* The Emperor's Minister hath had an Audience of King Augustus, in which he delivered some Proposals in Writing, to engage him to assist his Imperial Majesty against France. It is said a new Diet of the Kingdom will be held in a short time, to consider of the present posture of Affairs. The Staroste Bobruiski is arrived in the neighbourhood of this Place, and waits for leave to come into the Town, that he may throw himself at the King's Feet, in order to obtain his Pardon. The Turkish and Tartarian Envoys went from hence a few Days ago towards their own Countries, and at the same time the King sent an Officer with Presents to the Grand Vizir, consisting chiefly of Saxon Manufactures. Letters from Camniec bring an Account, that the Vizir had been in Conference with the Muscovite Ministers, who were arrived at Adrianople; and it is said they had made a new Treaty to confirm the Peace between the Grand Signior and the Czar.

*Hamburg, June 2. N. S.* We have received Advice, That Prince Menzikoff is at last resolved to take the Route which the King of Denmark sent him by Commissary General Platen; notwithstanding which, the Inhabitants of Krempermarche were obliged to pay that Prince a considerable Sum of Money for not passing through their Lands. His Danish Majesty hath sent Expresses to the Czar and King Augustus, with Complaints against their Generals; and it

is said Count Flemming hath already received a severe Reprimand from the King his Master. Monsieur Seestedt and Monsieur Crabbe are come from Copenhagen, together with Monsieur Wilbe, to compose the King of Denmark's Privy-Council. The Administrator of Holstein's Family is order'd to remove from the Castle of Gottorp, his Majesty being resolved to reside there himself this Summer, and he hath already named the Ministers who are to be Regents of that Dutchy. The Blockade of Tonnigen is still continued, and that Fortrefs is now shut up more closely than it had been hitherto. An Edict hath likewise been publish'd, forbidding all Persons from carrying Provisions into the Town, upon pain of Death. We are informed that Prince Eugene of Savoy set out from Vienna on the 18th past, and on the 25th he arrived at the Army on the Rhine. Letters from Berlin bring an account, that Count Schonborn had left that Court, without having obtained from the King of Prussia more Force than his Contingent, which amounts to Six thousand Men.

*Paris, June 3. N. S.* On the 23d past, Marechal Villars set out towards Strasburg; where they are preparing a Train of Artillery of above One hundred Pieces of Cannon, and Bridges are building, that it may be carry'd over the Rhine, with the Army that is to act on the other side of that River. The Germans are likewise making great Preparations, and give out, that they shall have an hundred thousand Men in the Field, the Diet of the Circles assembled at Hailborn, having resolved to continue the War in conjunction with the Emperor, whom they will assist to the utmost of their Power. On the 28th, Te Deum was Sung for the Peace in the Abby of St. Germain's des Prez. Cardinal d'Etree, who commonly resides there, assisted at it, and at Night he gave a Firework, an Entertainment and a Ball to several Persons of Quality. The Duke of Shrewsbury is to make his Publick Entry on Trinity Sunday the 11th Instant, and on the 13th he is to have his Audience of the King at Versailles. Marechal d'Harcourt is almost recovered of his Indisposition, and intends in a short time to go to the Waters of Bourbon.

*Utrecht, June 6. N. S.* On the 4th Instant the Marquis de Monteleone, one of the Plenipotentiaries of his Catholick Majesty, arrived here from Great Britain, and the next Morning he notified his Arrival to the Queens Ministers, who went afterwards to visit and complement him upon it. The same Day Baron Honthaim, that

who resided here on the Part of the Elector Palatine, left this Place in order to return to his Court, pursuant to Orders he received from thence to that Purpose. This Morning the Plenipotentiaries of the States General were in Conference with those of Her Majesty, upon the Subject of Trade in the Spanish Netherlands.
