HAVING had frequent Occasions, through the whole Course of Your happy and auspicious Reign, to Address Your Majesty for many glorious Victories obtained, which by GOD's Blessing have opened a Way to gain the great End You so piously aim'd at, the Establishment of a safe and honourable Peace, we now humbly beg leave, with Hearts full of Joy, to express our thankful Acknowledgments for the accomplishment of that great Work.

The Difficulties and Oppositions that have attended the Negotiations, do only serve to add the greater Lustre and Glory to the wise and steady Conduct of Your Majesty, and Your Ministers in this important Affair.

The good Understanding that is between Your Majesty and the House of Hanover, and the Care that is taken in securing the Protestant Succession in that illustrious Family, (notwithstanding the pernicious Attempts of ill-designing Men, who have been equally industrious to misrepresent Your good and upright Intentions to that Court, and to distract the Minds of Your own Subjects, by instilling groundless Fears and Jealousies) gives us a welcome Prospect of the continuance of our present happy Constitution in Church and State to latest Posterity.

The essential Provision that is made to preserve the Balance of Power, by separating for ever the Two Crowns of France and Spain, which is done in as strong and ample manner, as humane Wisdom can contrive, deserves the unanimous Applause of the present Age; and will be a lasting Blessing to future Generations.

In a grateful Sense of these, and all other Advantages procur'd for us; we shall use our utmost Endeavours to cultivate the Arts of Peace, by discouraging and suppressing (as much as in us lies) all the base Principles and vile Practices of Faction and Sedition; and as we sincerely wish, that Your Majesty's Reign may be long, peaceable and happy, so by the Grace of GOD we shall be always forward to pay that Honour and Fidelity, that inviolable Loyalty and Affection which is justly due to the best of QUEENS.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously;

Madrid, June 12. 1713. On the 10th Instant the Cortes met at the Palace; and

the King having thank'd them for their Zeal and Dispatch in finishing the Affairs for which they were summoned, dissolved them. The Treaty of Peace with Great Britain, agreed to by the Marquis de Monteleone hath been laid before the Council of State, and the Ratification is ordered to be prepared for his Catholick Majesty to Sign. Monsieur Orry has had several Conferences with the most eminent Merchants of this Town, in order to engage them to establish a Company for furnishing the King with Money, as his Occasions require, and Count Bergeick has approv'd of this Project. The Council of the Indies have represented to his Majesty, that it would be very much for his Service, and for the Advantage of Trade, to have a Squadron sent to New Spain; but it is not yet known what will be done in that Matter. A few Days ago the Minister of France, delivered a Memorial in behalf of the Merchants of that Nation in Andalusia, upon occasion of the Indulto laid on the Effects of the last Flota; and the King was pleas'd to refer the same to the Council, who have declar'd their Opinion, that the French have no Cause of Complaint upon that Account, but ought to be punish'd according to the Laws, which forbid any Strangers from Trading to the Spanish West Indies. The Duke de Popoli continued at Belchile on the 6th, and the Troops under his command in their Cantonments. Letters from Cadiz bring an account, that Her Majesty's Ships the Northumberland and Dartmouth, arrived there on the 2d, and were preparing to sail for Great Britain. They left Sir John Jennings, with his Squadron, cleaning at Port Mahon, in order to go to Barcelona to convoy Count Staremberg and the German Troops from thence to Italy. The Commanders of those Ships gave an account, that the Algerines were very numerous at Sea, that they had landed in the Island of Minorca, and carried off some of the Inhabitants. Admiral Jennings had notice of it, and was preparing to resent it.

Hamburg, June 27. N. S. Count Flemming, in Imitation of the Muscovites, having form'd some Pretensions on this City, the Magistrates have agreed with him for the Sum of One hundred thousand Livres. The Saxons are still encamp'd near Oldesloe, and are not to march from thence till the return of their General, who is expected here in a day or two from Gottorp. Prince Menzikoff still continues, with the Troops under his Command, round about Lubec, and hath demanded One hundred thousand Crowns of that City. The Senate hath offer'd to pay him Thirty thousand, with which

which he is not content, but he has already abated something of his Pretensions. The other part of the Muscovite Army is advanced as far as Plawe, in the Dutchy of Guftrow, where they observe very good Discipline. Monsieur Wulfrath, a Swedish Colonel, is arrived at Lubec, from Stockholm, with Bills of Exchange, to pay the Ransom of Count Steinbock, and the Men that surrender'd themselves with him at Tonningen. The Court of Berlin seems resolv'd to use all sorts of Means to oblige the King of Denmark to evacuate Holstein. His Prussian Majesty hath already writ to the Powers that are Guarantees of the Treaty of Travandal, to desire they will take proper Measures for that purpose, and in case they don't think fit to engage in it, it is said he will himself demand Satisfaction of the King of Denmark, for all the Losses of the Inhabitants of Holstein, and at the same time press him to quit that Dutchy. It is not known what regard the Danes will have to his Instances: Those of several other Princes have hitherto been without any effect, and his Danish Majesty is preparing to maintain himself there against all Opposition, till the Conclusion of a Peace. The King of Prussia hath sent Orders to his Troops that were marching towards the Upper Rhine, not to proceed any further. This is attributed to some Expressions in a Letter he received from Prince Eugene of Savoy, which his Majesty resents.

Brussels, June 29. N. S. Last Night Count Tilly, Commander in chief of the Dutch Forces, received an Express from Lieutenant-General Coliar with Advice, that the Troops appointed to be in Garrison at Luxembourg had taken Possession of that Fortrefs on the 26th; General Tilly being only ordered to stay here till he had an Account of the Evacuation of that Place by the French, went this Morning towards Mastricht. To Morrow the Earl of Orrery intends to set out for Great Britain.

Utrecht, June 30. N. S. On the 27th Count Tarouca, first Plenipotentiary of Portugal, set out from hence towards the Hague. Mr. Wich, Her Majesty's Envoy-Extraordinary in the Lower-Saxony, is arrived here in his way to Great Britain. This Morning Count Maffey, Minister of the Duke of Savoy, was in Conference with the Lord Privy Seal, as was likewise soon after Monsieur Buys, one of the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General.

Hague, July 1. N. S. The States are come to a Resolution to pay off all the hired Troops to the first of July, at which time they are to be discharged from their Ser-

vice. Count Tarouca, Plenipotentiary of Portugal, arrived here from Utrecht on the 28th, and was the same Day in Conference with the Earl of Strafford, and the Day after with the Deputies of the States-General. The Earl of Strafford, since his return hither, has had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States and the Grand Pensionary, as likewise with Monsieur d'Ahlfeldt, Minister of the King of Denmark, in relation to the Affairs of the North. Yesterday Morning the States received an Account, that their Troops under the Command of General Coliar had taken Possession of Luxembourg. Advice is come from Paris, that the Trenches before Landau were opened on the 22d Instant, but the Letters from Germany make no mention of it.

Whitehall, June 26. Her Majesty has been pleased to constitute the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Plymouth, Lord Lieutenant of the County Palatine of Chester.

The Commissioners appointed to take in Tickets and deliver out standing Orders in lieu thereof in the Class Lottery for the Year 1712, give Notice, That they will deliver out Orders for all Tickets which have been entred before them for Orders in the said Class Lottery to the 31st of May last inclusive, on Monday the 29th Instant, at 9 in the Forenoon; and that they will continue the Work of giving out such Orders daily and ev'ry Day, till Saturday the 4th of July next inclusive: Therefore all Persons having Tickets by them, not yet entred for Orders, either in the Class or the 101. Lottery for the Year 1712, are desired to hasten the Entry of their said Tickets, before the Work of delivering out Orders begins, because that Work being begun, it will not admit of any other Business to interfere in that Week.

Whereas the Rt. Hon. the Lord High Treasurer hath received a Letter signed G. L. dated the 22d of this Instant June; these are to give Notice, That if the Person who wrote the same will attend his Lordship at the Treasury Chambers in Whitehall, about the Matter therein mentioned, he shall be kindly received.
