Madrid, June 19. N. S. On the 12th Monsieur Orry set out in great haste towards Arragon, with the Prince de Chalais, the Marquis de Crèveceur, and the Count de Soupat, but the Occasion of this Journey is not yet known. Before he went away, he had establish'd a Company of the most considerable Merchants for the Management of the Rents called General. They have hitherto been farmed by private Persons, who immediately complained to Count Bergeick of the Injustice of dispossessing them before they have received Satisfaction for the Money they have already advanced for the King's use; upon which the Count hath put a stop to this Project till Monsieur Orry's return. Some Days ago a Courier arrived from the Duke d'Osuna with Advice, that the Term allow'd for the Emperor to agree to the Plan of Peace stipulated for him being expired, his Majesty's Plenipotentiaries were gone from Utrecht. The Marquis de Gibelline is expected here very soon from Palermo, being deputed by the Sicilians with a Commission, as is said, to desire his Majesty, that if he is resolved to abandon them, they may have liberty to chuse a King for themselves. We have received Advice from Catalonia, that General Staremberg had signified to Sennor Grimaldo, that he had named a German Commissary, who would be at Cervera on the 13th of this Month, to treat with him about the Evacuation of that Province.

Hamburg, July 4. N. S. The King of Prussia is to take the Dutchy of Holstein into Sequestration, in pursuance of the Treaty concluded between his Ministers and those of Sweden and Gottorp; and

it is agreed, that two Battalions of his Majesty's Troops shall be added to the Swedish Garrison at Wismar, and two more to that at Stetin: But we are informed, that General Meyerfeldt hath declared that he will not let the Prussians enter into the latter of these Places, and that he will defend it against any Foreign Power whatever. Count Welling is very much concerned at this Declaration, lest it should alter the Measures his Prussian Majesty had resolv'd to take for the Preservation of Holstein and Pomerania, when he sees how ill Matters are concert'd between the Swedish Generals. The Danish Minister residing here hath been with Prince Menzikoff, by order of the King his Master, to acquaint him that his Majesty will never agree to the Sequestration projected by the Court of Berlin, and that he hopes the Czar will not give his consent to it, desiring him to acquaint the King of Prussia with this Resolution. It is said the Prince hath thereupon assured Monsieur Hagedorn, that he will make such Proposals to his Prussian Majesty, as will engage him to enter into the Interests of the Allies, or at least to observe an exact Neutrality. On the 15th Instant King Augustus received Letters from the Ambassador of the Republick at Adrianople, dated the 20th of May, and containing in Substance, that the Grand Vizir had prevail'd on the Port to declare War against the Czar with the usual Solemnities: But the Day after this was done the Grand Signior discovered that the Vizir had formed a Party at Constantinople to dethrone him, and set up Ibrahim his Nephew in his stead. Whereupon he caus'd him to be Arrested, and then order'd him to be Strangled, and his Body thrown into the River. After this Execution the Directions that had been already given to the Janissaries were revok'd, and it was resolv'd in a Divan to observe the Treaty of Carlowitz with Poland, to confirm the Peace made at Pruth with the Muscovites, to send the King of Sweden home through Poland or by Sea, in pursuance of the Treaty concluded with the Ambassador of the Republick. King Augustus hath since received Advice, that his Swedish Majesty persists in refusing the Proposals that have been made to him for returning into his own Dominions, and for that reason he is detain'd in a Village near Adrianople. The Turks will advance him no more Money, and he has been oblig'd to borrow Twenty thousand Ducats of the Jews at Forty per Cent. Isuf Bassa, who concluded the Treaty of Peace at Pruth, was recalled from his Banishment, and constituted Grand Vizir.

Utrecht, July 7. N. S. On the 5th Instant the Deputies of Flanders, together with the Ministers of the States, were in Conference with the Lord Privy Seal; and the provisional Settlement of Trade in the Netherlands, as agreed to between Her Majesty's Ministers and those of the States, was communicated to them, with which they seem'd to be very well satisfied. This Day his Lordship was in Conference with the Plenipotentiaries of Spain, in order to prepare Matters for the speedy Signing the Treaty of Peace between Her Majesty and the Catholick King.

Hague, July 8. N. S. On the 5th the several Ministers of the Empire met at Baron Heem's House, to deliberate upon the present Situation of Affairs in Germany. Yesterday the Earl of Strafford, together with Prince Curakim, Ambassador from the Czar, and the Ministers of Denmark and Poland, had a Conference with the Deputies of the States-General on the Subject of the War in

the

the North. Monsieur Palmquist, Envoy of Sweden, was afterwards with the Deputies on the same Subject. Count Tarouca, who came hither to solicit for the Arrears due to the King of Portugal his Master, is returned to Utrecht. Two Days ago Mr. Wich, Her Majesty's Envoy in the Lower Saxony, went to Rotterdam, in order to embark for Great Britain.

London, July 3. On the 1st Instant, the Duke d'Aumont, Ambassador Extraordinary from the most Christian King, made his publick Entry. He was received at Greenwich by the Earl of Scarfsdale, and Sir Clement Cotterell, Master of the Ceremonies, accompanied by six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber. From thence he was brought by Water, together with all his Train, in Her Majesty's Barges to the Tower. At his Landing he was met and complimented by the Earl of Northampton, Constable of the Tower, and the Guard being drawn out upon the Wharf, saluted his Excellency as he passed by. The Royal Standard was display'd upon this occasion, and the Guns were fix'd as he went away. From thence he proceeded to Somerset-house, in the following manner. The Earl of Scarfsdale's Coach, thirty of the Ambassador's Footmen walking two by two: Four Swisses, Twelve Pages, two Gentlemen of the Horse, two Governors of the Pages, all mounted on Horseback. Then came the Queen's Coach of State, in which were the Ambassador, the Earl of Scarfsdale, the Master of the Ceremonies, and the Secretary of the Embassy. This was follow'd by another of the Queen's Coaches, in which were the six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber. Afterwards came five of his Excellency's Coaches drawn by eight Horses each, with four others drawn by six, which were follow'd by a numerous Train of Coaches of the Nobility and Gentry, with six Horses each. When they arrived at Somerset-house, which was the Place appointed by Her Majesty for his Entertainment, the Earl of Scarfsdale put him into Possession of the House, and took his leave; after which, the Lord Windsor came and made him a Compliment in Her Majesty's Name.

On Wednesday Night the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Kingston, only Son of the Marquis of Dorchester, died of the Small-Pox.
