Venice, August 11. N. S. The Great Chancellor Signor Pietro Businello, dy'd Yesterday, after a very short Indisposition, and the Senate have elected Signor Nicolosi, one of the chief Secretaries, to succeed him in that Employment. The Procurator Ruzzini, Ambassador from the Republick to the States General, is recall'd. The Imperial Troops designed for the Rhine, are pass'd quite through the Veronese; and those that came lately into the Mantuan from Final, are now upon their March towards Tirol. Letters from Rome bring an Account, that the Congregation of Health had made several strict Orders to prevent the Plague, which is faid to be at Vienna, from spreading into the Ecclefiastical Territories. A fecond Monitorio had been posted up against the Ministers of the Duke of Sa; voy, in which the Censures of the first are confirm'd, the Secular Power condemn'd, and those who have offended against the Ecclesiastical Immunities, are threatned to be proceeded against by a formal Excommunication, according to the Cartons, without any regard to Persons of the highest Rank or Dignity. As the Edist of the Court of Turin, declaring the first Monitorio to be of no sorce, is sign'd by his Royal Highness, who has also rejected the Proposals that have been made for an Accommodation, it is thought this Affair will produce very great Confequences. The Disputes produce very great Confequences. with the Republick of Genoa likewise grow much warmer, and the Pope infifts that the Friar Granelli flould come to Rome, and submit to his Mercy. A Congregation had been held upon the Differences between the Bishop of Lece, and the Civil Power of Naples, and the Bishop's Conduct was disapprov'd of.

Vienna, August 12. N. S. Some Day's ago it was resolved at a Meeting of the Imperial Ministers, to forbid all Communication between Austria and other Parts of his Majesty's Dominions that are free from any Infection, and to appoint Places on the Frontiers, where all Passengers should perform a Quarentine. This Resolution was approved by the Emperor, and notice has been given for those who have a mind to withdraw from hence to do it within three Days, after which the Passages will be thut up. It is thought their Imperial Majesties will go very soon to the Castle of Ebersdorff, in order to reside there, while the Contagious Distempers continue in this City. Letters from Constantinople bring an Account, that a Fire had broke, out there, which had burnt down a great number of Houses.

Place, and took Post on a River near it, with a de-fign to hinder the Muscovites from making any, further Irruption into the Country. But it appear'd that the Czar, instead of having withdrawn any Troops, had confiderably reinforc'd his Army, which foon after advanced towards the Swedes, and they Cannonaded each other for two Days; when the Swedes, finding themselves unable to maintain their Ground, retired two or three Miles to another strong Post, where they waited for the Attack of their Enemies. But the Muscovites having gained a free Passage to Helfingsos, follow'd them no further, pursued their way to the Town, whilst their whole Fleet sailed after the Army within the Islands, which are very numerous on that Coast. Upon their arrival they found the Swedish Squadron in that Bay, and Bombarding it both from their Galleys and from the Shore, forced it to Sea. By which means nothing can now hinder the Muscovites from approaching Abo by Sea and Land; and as it a Place entirely Defenceless, it is thought they will foon make themselves Masters of it. the mean time the Swedish Army was marching with all possible Expedition to the North-side of the Dutchy of Finland, for fear of being entirely cut off from a Communication with the rest of the Kingdom.

· Hague, August 26. N. S. On the 24th the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General were in Conference with those of Spain, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace between his Catholick Majesty and this State. Yesterday being the Birth day of the Prince of Asturias, the Duke d'Ossuna gave a Comedy and a Ball in the Playhouse, which he had hired for that purpose, to all the Publick Ministers and their Ladies. They were invited by the Countess of Strafford, whom the Duke had desired to do the Honours of his Ball. This Morning the Marquis de Monteleone and Monfour Daubigni were in Conference with the Earl of Strafford. The States of Holland, which have been affembled for fome Days, are separated.
