To the QUEEN's moſt Excellent Maſteſty,

The humble Adreſs of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the Shire of Perth, in Scotland.

**G**IVE us leave (moſt gracious Sovereign) amidſt the general Voice of Joy and Congratulation for the happy concluſion of the Peace, to expreſs the Senſe we have of that inſteſtimable Bleſſing, and offer our moſt humble Thanks for it. 'Tis a Bleſſing (next to Almighty G O D) we owe to Your Maſteſty's wiſe Conduſt, and tender Concern for Your People; ſupported by the Prudence and indefatigable Pains of Your faithful Miniſtry: And our Ingratitude would be beyond Excuse, if ſuch an Inſtance of Goodneſs did not engage us to all poſſible Returns of Duty.

Providence has at laſt bleſt Your Endeavours to make Your People happy in a Peace: The Oppoſition it has met with from ill-deſigning Men, has ſerved only to render Your Conduſt the more conſpicuous, and 'tis with the greateſt Joy we behold Your Maſteſty, by Your Wiſdom, ſuperior to all their Artiſices, and the Glory they envied You increas'd, by their vain Endeavours to obſtruſt it.

You have, Madam, by a Felicity common to few Princes, added to the Triumphs of War, the Honour of giving Peace; and joined in Your Perſon, the two moſt glorious Titles of Peaceful and Victorious; but from Your Subjects You deſerve a Title ſtill more illuſtrious and Uncommon, That of a moſt gracious Queen, and Mother of Your People.

May Your Maſteſty's Reign be very long and proſperous, and may there now in time of Peace, be no other Contentions amongſt Your People, but who ſhall ſbew themſelves moſt dutiful and grateful to Your Maſteſty.

Venice, Auguſt 11. N. S. The Great Chancellor Signor Pietro Buſinello, dy'd Yeſterday, after a very ſhort Indiſpoſition, and the Senate have elected Signor Nicolosi, one of the chief Secretaries, to ſucceed him in that Employment. The Procurator Ruzzini, Ambaſſador from the Republick to the States General, is recall'd. The Imperial Troops deſigned for the Rhine, are paſſ'd quite through the Veroneſe; and thoſe that came lately into the Mantuan from Final, are now upon their March towards Tirol. Letters from Rome bring an Account, that the Congregation of Health had made ſeveral ſtrict Orders to prevent the Plague, which is ſaid to be at Vienná, from ſpreading into the Eccleſiaſtical Territories. A ſecond Monitorio had been poſted up againſt the Miniſters of the Duke of Savoy, in which the Cenſures of the firſt are confirm'd, the Secular Power condemn'd, and thoſe who have offended againſt the Eccleſiaſtical Immunities, are threatned to be proceeded againſt by a formal Excommunication, according to the Cartons, without any regard to Perſons of the higheſt Rank or Dignity. As the Ediſt of the Court of Turin, declaring the firſt Monitorio to be of no force, is ſign'd by his Royal Highneſs, who has alſo rejected the Propoſals that have been made for an Accommodation, it is thought this Affair will produce very great Conſequences. The Diſputes with the Republick of Genoa likewiſe grow much warmer, and the Pope inſiſts that the Friar Granelli ſhould come to Rome, and ſubmit to his Mercy. A Congregation had been held upon the Differences between the Biſhop of Lecce, and the Civil Power of Naples, and the Biſhop's Conduſt was diſapproved of.

Vienna, Auguſt 12. N. S. Some Days ago it was reſolved at a Meeting of the Imperial Miniſters, to forbid all Communication between Auſtria and other Parts of his Maſteſty's Dominions that are free from any Infection, and to appoint Places on the Frontiers, where all Paſſengers ſhould perform a Quarantine. This Reſolution was approved by the Emperor, and notice has been given for thoſe who have a mind to withdraw from hence to do it within three Days, after which the Paſſages will be ſhut up. It is thought their Imperial Maſteſties will go very ſoon to the Caſtle of Eberſdorff, in order to reſide there, while the Contagious Diſtempers continue in this City. Letters from Conſtantinople bring an Account, that a Fire had broke out there, which had burnt down a great number of Houſes.

Copenhagen, Auguſt 19. N. S. We have received Advice from Stockholm, that Intelligence being



being brought to the Swedish Army in Finland, that the Czar had recalled some of his Troops from Borgo, they immediately march'd towards that Place, and took Post on a River near it, with a design to hinder the Muscovites from making any further Irruption into the Country. But it appear'd that the Czar, instead of having withdrawn any Troops, had considerably reinforce'd his Army, which soon after advanced towards the Swedes, and they Cannonaded each other for two Days; when the Swedes, finding themselves unable to maintain their Ground, retired two or three Miles to another strong Post, where they waited for the Attack of their Enemies. But the Muscovites having gained a free Passage to Helsingos, follow'd them no further, pursued their way to the Town, whilst their whole Fleet sailed after the Army within the Islands, which are very numerous on that Coast. Upon their arrival they found the Swedish Squadron in that Bay, and Bombarding it both from their Gallies and from the Shore, forced it to Sea. By which means nothing can now hinder the Muscovites from approaching Abo by Sea and Land; and as it a Place entirely Defenceless, it is thought they will soon make themselves Masters of it. In the mean time the Swedish Army was marching with all possible Expedition to the North-side of the Dutchy of Finland, for fear of being entirely cut off from a Communication with the rest of the Kingdom.

Hague, August 26. N. S. On the 24th the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General were in Conference with those of Spain, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace between his Catholick Majesty and this State. Yesterday being the Birth-day of the Prince of Asturias, the Duke d'Osuna gave a Comedy and a Ball in the Playhouse, which he had hired for that purpose, to all the Publick Ministers and their Ladies. They were invited by the Countess of Strafford, whom the Duke had desired to do the Honours of his Ball. This Morning the Marquis de Monteleone and Monsieur Daubigny were in Conference with the Earl of Strafford. The States of Holland, which have been assembled for some Days, are separated.

Dover, August 24. The Duke and Dutchess of Shrewsbury embark'd at Calais last Night about Eleven of the Clock, on Board Her Majesty's Yacht the Peregrine, and landed here at Six this Morning.
