Medrid, August-28. N. S. The Court being informed that some Genoese Ships had carried Provisions into Barcelona, have given notice to the Republick, that it should be look'd upon as an Act of Hostility, if they continued such Proceedings. We have receiv'd advice from Catalonia, that Four or five thousand of the Garrison of Barcelona had Sally'd out of the Town, but being warmly received by the Spanish Artillery, they retired with great precipitation: However, the Duke de Popoli had thought proper to remove his Camp to a greater distance from the Place, by reason of a Battery rais'd at a Convent of Capuchins, which play'd upon his Army with some Success. The Miquelets had taken Possession of the Passes of the Mountains, and made it very difficult to bring Provisions for the Army. Brigadier Ordegno had summoned the lsle of Majorca to submit to the King, but the Governor answer'd, He would not surrender till the Castilians had conquer'd the whole Province of Cataa Reinforcement of Troops, which will accordingly Treaty of Peace between the King of Spain and be fent him very speedily. The Cities of Martaro, his Royal Highness, and the Marquis de Bourg, be feat him very speedily.

Urgell, and Cardona have made their Submilion id his Majesty, but the Citadel of the latter Place is preparing for a Defence, in case they should be be-sieg'd. Hanover, Sept. 1. N.S. Monsieur de Mardeseit, Pfivy Councellor to the King of Prussa, and Baron Goertz, Minister of Gottorp, arrived here a few Days ago, and have been several times in Conference with the Elector's Ministers, in relation to the Affairs of Holstein. A Courier from Petersbourg is lately passed through this Place in his way to the Hague, where he is going with Instructions from the Czar to Prince Kurakin his Ambastador. He brings an account, that his Czarish Majesty was at Petersbourg when he came away. We have receiv'd ad-vice from Holstein, that Monsieur Platen, Commissary General of War to the King of Denmark, was arrested and sent to Prison by his Majusty's command, but it is not yet known what Crime he is accus'd of. They write from Dresden, that the Electoral Prince of Saxony was expected there from Italy, and it was thought King Augustus, his Fas

ther, would likewise return in a short time.

Hamburg, Sept. 7. N. S. The Danish Troops designed for Pomerania had passed the Trave, but are now returned, upon pretence that fince the Saxons have abandoned that Province, they shall not be able to undertake any Enterprize alone. This sudden and unexpected return has raifed a Jealousie in the neighbouring Princes, that the King of Denmark may have fome Intention to make an Attempt upon this City, and the Elector of Hanover has writ very pressingly to the Danish General to with-draw his Troops from our Territories. His Danish Majesty has order'd Monsieur Platen, his Commisfary-General, to be fent Prisoner to the Castle of His Crime is not yet known, but it is supposed to be very great, since all the Ministers are forbid to intercede in his Behalf, and his Estate is likewise seized. The Governor of Tonningen has found means to fend an Express to the Administrator of Holitein, to acquaint him that the Danes had formest a Design to take the Place by Surprize, whereupon he had lain the flat Country under Water, to render their access more difficult; and that he had made such a disposition for their Reception, that he was in hopes their Attempt would miscarry, The Saxon Artillery is arrived before Stetin, and that of Denmark is expected very foon before Stralfund, tho' it is thought the Allies will hardly be in a Condition to carry on those two Sieges at the same time, for want of a greater number of Foots Count Welling has received an Account from Stocks holm, that General Arenfeld had gained an Advantage over the Muscovite Army, and obliged them to retire to Helfingfos; that they were making great Preparations in Sweden to fit out a Squadron of twelve Men of War, in order to engage the Czar's Fleet in Finland.
