*Warsaw, August 20. N. S.* King Augustus has sent repeated Orders to his Troops that are on their way hither from Flanders and Saxony, to hasten their March into this Kingdom, and it is supposed they will arrive in Ten or Twelve Days. We have receiv'd an account from our Ambassador at Adrianople, that he continued his Conferences with the Turkish Commissioners, who assured him, that the Ottoman Troops had received Orders not to commit any Act of Hostility against Poland, till it was known whether the Republick did really desire to maintain King Augustus on the Throne, and that the Port would in a short time send Commissioners to make an Enquiry to that purpose. We are since inform'd, that the Ottoman Troops, to the number of Sixty or Seventy thousand Men, are pass'd by Czeczora, and are upon their March towards Corchin; that the Han of Tartary had declared in favour of King Stanislaus, but that most of the Officers had refus'd to follow him, and several of them were retired from the Army, and gone to Adrianople to complain to the Grand Signior, that the Han would make War against Poland, without his Orders. The same Letters add, that the King of Sweden was dangerously Ill of a Fever.

*Venice, August 25. N. S.* The Senatè has order'd Books to be opened to take in Subscriptions for a Lottery, by which they will gain Forty Thousand Ducats. They write from Rome, that an Edict had been posted up, condemning the Decree of the Senate of Casal, which was made to annul the Excommunication pronounc'd by the Bishop of that Diocess against several of the Nobility. This Proceeding has very much exasperated the Duke of Savoy, who had some Difference before with the Court of Rome. The Pope is likewise at variance with the Emperor, France, Spain, Genoa, and this Republick. Upon all these Disputes, he holds frequent Congregations. A great number of black Cattle died suddenly last Week at the Market in Rome.

They write from Naples, that several Persons who went from thence to Paussilippo for their Divercion, and return'd in good Health, were found dead in their Beds the next Morning. The Arch-Bishop of Messina was arriv'd there, having been banish'd Sicily by the King of Spain, for excommunicating Baron Ficarazzi and Major General Rosa, concern'd in the Disputes between his Catholick Majesty and the Bishop of Catania.

*Berlin, Sept. 2. N. S.* The King has sent Monsieur Mardefeldt to the Court of Denmark, with a Commission in the behalf of the House of Holstein Gottorp. He is order'd to stop at Hanover, to desire the Elector to join his Intercession to that of his Majesty. Monsieur Krant is appointed to be Director of the Manufactures, and it has been propos'd to the Court to raise the Duties upon Foreign Goods to 25 per Cent. in order to improve the Value of those wrought here. Some Days ago a Courier arriv'd from Adrianople, but he was not admitted into the Town, having pass'd through the Emperor's Hereditary Countries, which are infected with the Plague, and he deliver'd the Letters he had for this Court, and for the Swedish Minister, at the Gates of the Town, after which he pursu'd his way to Hamburg. We expect every Day to hear that the Trenches are opened before Stetin, part of the Artillery designed for that Siege being already arriv'd.

*Hague, Sept. 13. N. S.* On the 11th Instant the Duke d'Orfuna and the Marquis de Monteleone, Plenipotentiaries of Spain, set out from hence towards Utrecht, in order to finish the Treaty of Peace between that Crown and Portugal. The same Day the Earl of Strafford receiv'd an Express from Great Britain, and was afterwards in Conference with the Deputies of the States General and the Grand Pensionary, on the Subject of those Dispatches. This Morning his Excellency and the Deputies of the States General had a Conference in the Chamber of Treves with Baron Heems the Emperor's Minister, and with the several Ministers of the Empire residing here.

*Windsor, September 6.* This Day the Cavalier Giraldi, who has resid'd here several Years with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of Tuscany, being recalled by his Master, had a private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty, to which he was introduced by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Bolingbroke, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
