T is faid their Imperial Majesties will remove foon to Ebersdorff, to avoid the Contagious Distemper which continues still in this City. The Envoy of Poland is often in Conference with our Ministers, and frequent Dispatches pass between him and his Court. It is thought these Conferences relate as well to the Deligns of the Turks against Poland, as to the Congress that is to be formed at Brunswick, to establish the Repose of the Circle of Lower-Saxony. Letters from Adrianople bring an Account, that the Turks continue to make great Preparations for War, and it is thought they will either attempt to reflore King Stanislaus to the Crown of Poland, or at least endeavour to procure some Advantages from King Augustus, to make them desist from their Design. The same Advices add, that the King of Sweden was dangerously Sick of a Fever.

Berlin, September 9. N. S. Yesterday the Queen went to meet the King at Weysterhausen, where his Majesty intends to Celebrate the Anniversary of the Battle of Malplaquet, at which he was prefent in 1 erson. Count Flemming returned hither from Pomerania on the 3d, and on the 7th he set but for Poland. We have received Advice, that Fifteen hundred of the Garrison of Stetin sallied out of the Town a few Days ago, nailed up two Pieces of the Besiegers Cannon, and killed two Officers and One hundred Men, after which they retired with the Loss of about Twenty Men. Trenches were not then opened before that Place.

Hamburgh, September 12. N. S. The Danish Mi-

nister residing here, has declared to all the other Ministers, by Order of the King his Master, that his Majesty had been inform'd of a false Report that was spread, as if he had a design to make an Attempt upon this City, which was only a Calumny invented by his Enemies to raise a Jealousie in the neighbouring Princes, and that to remove all Suspicion, he had sent Orders to General Scholten to withdraw his Forces from our Territories. It is faid the Emperor has agreed with the King of Den mark for a Body of Eight thousand Men to serve against France. The Barons Goertz and Mardefeldt are gone towards Gottorp, where its thought they are now arriv'd, and in a few Days we expect to hear of the Issue of their Negotiations. Monsteur Bassewitz, Minister of Holstein, is return'd from Sterin to Berlin. The most important Points he had to treat with Prince Menzikoff were, the sub-jects of putting a Garrison of the Troops of some Neutral Prince into Tonningen, and the evacuations County of Somerfet, Sir William Wyndham, Barof Holstein: To which the Prince answer'd him plainly, That his last Instructions, relating to those Affars, were very different from what he had formerly, and that the Duke of Holstein would do well to accommodate Matters amicably with the King of Denmark. The Muscovites have made themselyes Masters of Malchin, a Town in Jomerania, and fent out the Garrison, consisting of some Troops of Militia. General Buck is gone to the Court of Mecklenburg with One thousand Dragoens to demand Rostock, Butzow, or Gustrow of the Duke, for a Place of Arms for the Muscovite Magazines. From whence it is thought that Na-tion has a defign to Winter in Mecklenburg, Po-merania not being sufficient to subsist them. They write from Warfaw, that King Augustus had re-ceived Letters from his Ambassador as Adrianople,

with an account, that the Port had yet return'd no Answer to the last Proposals he had made them; no Day had been fix'd on for his Audience, tho' he was treated with great Civility. The Grand Signior perfisted in his Design of Fortifying Cotchin, which is said to be contrary to the Treaty concluded with the Republick. The King of Sweden continued ist of a Fever, and had resus d both the Advice of the Phylician, and the Medicines the Grand Signior had fent him.
