The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT having been represented to Her Majesty in Council, That the Lucretia Bark, Joseph Anbler, Master, Burthen about Twenty five Tons, laden with Two hundred and seventy two Barrels of Powder, bound from Plymouth to Her Majesty's Magazine below Greenwich, being on Saturday the 29th of August last at an Anchor in the Downs, about Six a-Clock in the Evening, there came on Board the said Bark Seven Men in a Deal-Yawl, and after having Imprisoned the Master and his Crew, Plunder'd her of about One hundred and fifty Barrels of the said Powder, and put the same on Board a Collier they had Seiz'd, and Sail'd away therewith, putting the Master and Men thereof on Board the said Bark. Her Majesty for the Discovery of the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is graciously pleased to promise, that a Reward of Two hundred Pounds shall be paid to the Person or Persons who shall first discover the said Robbers, or any one or more of them, so as he or they shall be apprehended and brought to Justice for the same. And Her Majesty is further pleased to promise, That if any One of the Persons concerned in the said Robbery shall make such Discovery, he shall not only have the said Reward, but shall likewise have Her Majesty's most gracious Pardon for the said Offence. And the Right Hon. the Lord High Treasurer of Great Britain is hereby required to cause Payment to be made of the said Reward of Two hundred Pounds to the Person or Persons making such Discovery upon the Conviction of any one or more of the said Robbers.

Her Majesty in Council was this Day graciously pleased to declare his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

This Day, by Her Majesty's Command, the Right Hon. John Earl of Mar was Sworn one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Warsaw, September 4. N. S. King Augustus has fixed on the 19th of this Month for his Journey to Sendomir, where he is to review his Saxon Troops, and it is thought at the same time he will hold a general Council of War. Monsieur Buzenval, the French Minister, arrived here from Dantzig a few Days ago, and has had an Audience of the King, but he has not yet taken any Character upon him, and it is not known how long he intends to stay. They write from Stockholm, that the People of that City were in a great Consternation upon a Report that the Army commanded by General Lubecker in Finland had been defeated by the Muscovites, and Sixty or Seventy of the Swedish Officers taken Prisoners. We have received Advice from Adrianople, that the King of Sweden was seized of a Fever, that none of his Ministers had been permitted to see him for several Days before, and his Life was despair'd of when those Letters came away.

Hamburg, September 15. N. S. The Administrator of Holstein intending to go from hence to Brunswick, has desired a Passport of the Elector of Hanover to go through his Dominions, which has been granted him, with this Restriction, that his Retinue is to set out eight Days before him, in order to perform a Quarentine. Monsieur Bassewitz, Envoy of Holstein at Berlin, has demanded that the Articles of the Treaty concluded with the Duke his Master may be performed, upon which he has had some warm Disputes with the Ministers of that Court, and it is judged from some Incidents which have lately happened, that the King of Prussia will use no other means than his bare Request in behalf of the Duke of Holstein. Count Flemming is gone from Berlin to Saxony, where he intends to stay but a little while, and then to set out for Poland. He is very much discontented at the King of Denmark's recalling his Troops that were upon their March towards Pomerania, since by that means, it's probable, the Siege of Stralsund must be deferred till the next Campaign. King Augustus has already sent away some of his Domesticks to Sendomir, and intends very soon to set out himself towards the same Place. The Admiralty of Sweden has fitted out Twenty Gallies, to carry a Reinforcement of Troops to General Lubecker in Finland. Monsieur Live, who was named by the Senate to Command them, has refused to go, unless he is declared General in Chief.

Hague, Sept. 19. N. S. Monsieur de Chareau-neuf, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Most Christian King to the States General, arrived here Yesterday. The Marquis de Bourg, who has resided at this Place several Years as Minister of the Duke of Savoy, had this Morning an Audience of Leave of the States General. The Earl of Strafford went from hence a few Days ago to Utrecht, and is expected back very soon.

Utrecht, Sept. 20. N. S. Since the arrival of the Earl of Strafford from the Hague, the Ministers of Spain and Portugal have had frequent Conferences in the Presence of those of Her Majesty, in order to adjust the remaining Difficulties in the Treaty of Peace between those two Crowns. To Morrow the Ministers of Great Britain and Spain are to begin their Conferences to settle a Treaty of Commerce between the two Nations, which it is believ'd will be concluded in a few Days.
