Madrid, September 11. N. S.

E have received Advice from the Camp before Barcelona, that the Catalans had begun to build another Fort at the Foot of Montjoue, and to raile a Battery there, which would have very much annoy'd the King's Army, but the Duke de Popoli fent a Body of Infantry to attack the Place, and after a long refistance they inade themfelves Mafters of it, and raz'd all the Works thereabouts. Monfieur Bracamonte, who was fe t with a Detachment of Three thousand Men In purfult of General Nebot, overtook and got the better of him in two Encounters, after which the Inhabitants of Vick and the Plains made their Submission to his Majesty, and defired fome Troops to protect them from the Infults of the Enemy, which has been granted them. Some Days ago three of the King's Galleys attack'd two Catalan Ships, one of I wenty four, and the other of Eighteen Guns, and after a fharp Fight took them both. They have likewife burnt above Forty fmall Boats that were carrying Provisions into Barcelona.

Turin, September 16. N.S. The Duke has been indifposed for fome Days, which has obliged him to put off his Journey to Alexandria. The Marquis de Courtance is returned from Sicily, with an Account, that the Vice-Roy had received Or-ders to put his Royal Highnels into Possession of that Kingdom, and Deputies from their Nobility and Senate are expected very foon at this Court. A Gentleman is arrived here from Admiral Jen-nings, in order to fettle the Embarkation, and it is agreed that the Duke's whole Train, confifting of Four hundred and fifty Perfons, fhall go on Board the Men of War. His Royal Highnefs has ap-pointed the 27th for his departure, and the Government is to be committed to the Prince of Piedmont during his absence. Mr. Chetwynd, Her Majesty's Envoy at this Court, had his Au-Mr. Chetwynd, dience of Leave fome Days ago, and is gone to Paris, in his way to Great Britain. Yesterday the Marquis de Doria arrived here in Quality of Envey Extraordinary from the Republick of Genoa.

Frankfort, September 23. N. S. The greatest part of the French Army having passed the Rhine at Strasburg and Brifac, on the 20th Mareschal Villars attack'd and forc'd the Imperial Lines on the Black Forest, where the Franconian Regiment of Jaxtheim fuffered very much. Of twelve Battalions that attempted to get into Fribourg, the two last were to broken, that few of them could get into the I lace. General Vaubonne, who com-manded in the Lines, perceiving the Strength of his Enemies, thought proper to retire to Hohen-Graven, Prince Eugene has fent a Detachment of ten Battalions, four Regiments of Imperial Horfe, and two of Huffars, to iustain that General. It is now thought the French delign to make an Attempt, upon Villengen, in which cafe they must be

find it very difficult to fubfilt there. A contagious Distemper is lately broke out in Bavaria and the Upper Palatinate, upon which the Moth Christian King has forbid all Correspondence between Strat bourg and the rest of the Empire.

Hamburgh, Sept. 26. N. S. The Contagious Diftemper encreafes very much in this City, notwith-ftunding the great Diligence that is us'd by the Magiftrates of Health to prevent it from foread-The Conferences between Baron Goertz and ing. the Danish Ministers have been discontinued for fome time, and we are affur'd the King of Denmark will not confent to raife the Blockade of Tonningen, till after the conclusion of a Treaty between him and the House of Gottorp. His Majesty still infists upon having Satisfaction made hins for the Swedes being admitted into that Place, and propoles fome other Conditions that the Ad-ministrator cannot grant, during the minority of the Duke. Since the Court of Mecklenbourg has refus'd the Muscovites Demands, they have com-mitted great Diforders in that Country, and have carried away feveral of the principal Inhabitanes to their Camp before Stetin. They have at last opened the Trenches before that Place, which was done with great Confusion. The Workmen were terrify'd with the Shot from the Town, and could hardly be brought back to finish what they had begun. On the other fide, the Swedes imagining they had a Design to Storm the Town, posted the Garrison on the Counterscarp, and the Citizens on the Ramparts, but they not being train'd to Arms, fir'd on pheir own Men, and kill'd more of them than of the Enemy. The Czar was in great danger of being cast away by a Storm in his Passage to Finland : His Fleet was separated, some of the Ships Iplit against the Rocks, and his Majesty was forced to fave himfelf in a Shallop. The Swedish Fleet lies at Anchor at Alandshaff nexts Also, in order to prevent any more of the Mulco-vite Troops from being transported into the Kingdom. The Czar has been advancing with his Ar. my ever fince the 14th of August, and the Swedes must either yeild up the Country, or hazard a Battle, which they seek all means to avoid, by reafon of the fuperior Strength of their Enemies, The Imprisonment of King Stanislaus and the Pa-latin of Kiovia is confirm'd by Letters from Warfaw of the 16th; however, the Turks continued their March towards the Frontiers of Poland, and were but at three Leagues distance from Caminiec when the last Accounts came from thence.
