Palermo, October 11. N. S. Yesterday in the Evening the British Squadron, with the King and Queen on Board, arrived in this Harbour after eight Days Sail. The Marquis de Balbaces, our Vice-Roy, together with the Archbishop of this City, and most of the Nobility of the Kingdom, went out in Gallies to meet them. On the Shore there was a vast concourse of People of all Ranks, who, by repeated Acclamations, express'd their Joy for their Majesty's safe arrival. They continued on Ship-board till this Day, and upon their Landing were complimented by the Magistrates in a Body. After which they proceeded directly to the Cathedral Church, to give Thanks for their prosperous Voyage. A great part of the Troops that came with them are already disembark'd, and the remainder are to set Sail for Messina, in order to take Possession of the Places on that side of the Country, which, upon their arrival, are to be evacuated by the Spanish Garrisons.

Venice, October 20. N. S. On the 16th the Electoral Prince of Saxony set out for Padoua in his way to Germany. The Pope's Nuntio has had a Publick Audience of Leave of this Republick, and intends in a few Days to go to his Archbishoprick of Fermo. Count Galefch, Ambassador from his Imperial Majesty to the Pope, and Monsignor Piazza late Nuntio at Vienna, are arrived at Verona, from whence they intend to proceed together on their Journey to Rome. We are inform'd from thence, that an Excommunication had been Posted up in the publick Places against the Marquis de Balbaces, Vice-Roy of Sicily, for banishing the Bishops of Messina and Giurgento. An Express was come from the Governor of Benevento, with an account, that Four hundred German Soldiers had been there to demand a Criminal fled from Naples, and kept in Prison at that Place. The Governor told them he knew of no such Person, and if there was any, he could not deliver him up without Orders from the Pope. But the Soldiers not satisfied with this Answer, broke open all the Prisons, and committed great Disorders - Upon which, the Townsmen took up Arms to engage them, and after the Loss

of a few Men on each side, the Germans retired. The Pope, immediately after he receiv'd this account, sent for the Emperor's Ambassador, who continued with him above Three Hours. They write from Naples, that Her Majesty's Ships the *Colchester* and the *Bristol*, were sail'd from thence for Palermo, to join the Squadron under the command of Admiral Jennings.

Hamburg, October 31. N. S. The Number of those that died here last Week amounts to Four hundred forty five. We have received Advice, that the King of Denmark's Equipage had been order'd to follow him, and was actually upon the Road to Copenhagen, but was afterwards countermanded; by which, it is thought, he intends to return very soon to Holstein. His Majesty has expressed great Dissatisfaction at the Treaty of Sequestration lately concluded, without his Privy, between the King of Prussia and Prince Menzickoff; and has given Notice, that if the like Agreement be made in relation to Wismar, he shall take it as an Injury meant to him, and resent it accordingly. It is said, a new Plan for the Affairs of Holstein has been projected at Berlin, by Count Flemming and Monsieur Goertz, that the Count intends to set out soon for Copenhagen, and the latter for Hanover, in order to acquaint those Courts with what has been concerted, and endeavour to gain their Approbation of it. The Administrator of Holstein is unwilling to have his Differences with the King of Denmark referred to the Assembly at Brunswick, and desires that the Affairs of his Country should be separated from those that relate to the North in general: But it is thought he will hardly succeed, since his Danish Majesty has resolved not to receive any more Proposals from the Ministers of Holstein, till a Treaty is begun for a general Peace. They write from Warlaw, that the Turkish and Tartarian Ministers acquainted King Augustus, in their last Audience, that the Grand Signior acknowledged him to be lawful King of Poland, and would not in the least violate the Treaty of Carlowitz: But that they were directed by the Port to intercede in behalf of King Stanislaus and his Adherents, and to desire his Majesty would receive them into Favour, To which the King replied, that as many of them, as made their Submission within a limited time should obtain their Pardon, and be restored to their Estates.

Hague, November 3. N. S. The States of Holland and West-Friesland have been Assembled for some Days, and are to separate to Morrow, after they have taken into Consideration a Project communicated to them and the rest of the Provinces, for Regulating their Military Affairs. Yesterday morning the Duke d'Osuna, Plenipotentiary of Spain, returned to Utrecht, and in a short time he will be followed by the Sieurs Randwick, Buys, and Van der Dussen, who came lately from thence, in order to receive new Instructions from the States-General their Masters. We have received Advice from Germany, that the Garrison of Fribourg had demanded to Capitulate for the Town, but Marschal Villars insisting that the Castle should likewise be surrender'd at the same time, no Agreement was made when those Letters came away.
