WE the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, do, with great Satisfaction, attend Your Grace, to return Our most humble Thanks for Your excellent Speech from the Throne, and to Congratulate You upon the considerable Part Your Grace has had in the late Safe and Honourable Peace; which We are persuaded will derive many Benefits and Advantages to this Kingdom, under Her Majesty's happy Government, and Your Grace's wise Administration.

We are fully convinced, That the Preservation of Our CHURCH by Law established, Our Rights and Liberties, doth under GOD, intirely depend on the Securing the Protestant Succession in the House of Hanover.

As the best Means of preserving these Blessings to Us, We shall use Our utmost Endeavours to disappoint the Treacherous Designs of the Papists on one Hand, and the bold Encroachments of the Dissenters on the other, some of whose Leading Teachers, We beg leave to acquaint Your Grace, refuse to take The Oath of Abjuration; and yet, in Defiance of the Law, preach in Publick before numerous Assemblies.

We are perfectly satisfied, That Your Grace has nothing more at Heart than the good of this Kingdom, and that no Person is more capable of Promoting it than Your Grace, from the Knowledge We have of Your great Abilities, and the Integrity You have always shewn, in the many eminent Trusts Your Grace has Discharged under the Crown, in the Service of Your Country.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgessees in Parliament Assembled,

May it please your Grace,

WE Her Majesty's most Faithful and Loyal Subjects, the Commons in Parliament Assembled, do joyfully present our selves before your Grace, to return our most humble and hearty Thanks, for your Excellent Speech deliver'd from the Throne to both Houses of Parliament.

We are sensible we lie under the highest Obligations to Her Majesty, for the Continuance of Her Royal Favour to us through the whole Course of Her Glorious Reign, for the Assurances She has been pleased to give us, by your Grace's Speech, and for the eminent Mark of Her Goodness to us, in placing you in the Government of this Kingdom.

The many and important Trusts and Employments which Her Majesty hath conferred upon you, are the just Rewards of your Wisdom and Fidelity; and to compleat your Grace's Character, you have been also, in a most eminent Manner, instrumental in bringing about the Glorious Revolution in Sixteen hundred eighty eight; to which, under God, we owe the Preservation of our Religion, Liberties and Properties (in defence of which we are resolved to venture all that is most dear to us) and have since continued to act with the same sincere Regard to Interests of the Church, and Prerogative of the Crown, and Liberty of the Subject, as you did then when you appear'd so seasonably in Defence of them all.

Your ardent Wishes for our Welfare and Prosperity, your Concern for our Preservation against the Attempts of the great Number of Papists in this Country; Your declaring Her Majesty's Royal Intentions, That the Troops which are paid by this Establishment shall be sent over; That the Monies given by Parliament, as much as is possible, shall be spent among our selves; and, That none of the Publick Treasure shall be misapplied, are so many powerful Motives to encourage your Grace to this Kingdom.

In dutiful Return for these Instances of Her Majesty's Royal Goodness, we beg Leave to assure Your Grace, That we will effectually Support Her Establishment, and provide for the Honour of the Government; That we will, on all Occasions, demonstrate our Zeal for the Safety and the Preservation of Her Majesty's Sacred Person and Authority, the Church of Ireland as by Law Establish'd, and the Protestant Succession in the illustrious House of Hanover.

And we will endeavour, by our Temper, to deserve such a Representation of our Proceedings to Her Majesty, as may entitle us to the Continuance of Her Grace and Favour.

His Grace the Lord Lieutenant's Answer.

Gentlemen,

I Am well pleased to find that what I have said to you is so much to your Satisfaction: I will take Care to represent to Her Majesty the Zeal you express for Her Service, and shall think my self Happy if I can promote the Prosperity and Welfare of this Kingdom.

Venice, December 1. N. S. The Magistrates of Health have reduced the Quarentine to be performed by all the Vessels coming from the Levant, and the Venetian Islands, to Twenty eight Days. Three British Ships, the Victory from Cartagena, the Trial from London, and the Rialton from Norway, are arrived here. The Spanish and Italian Troops in the Emperor's Service, continue their March through the Territories of this State towards Germany, having hitherto observ'd an exact Discipline,



line, and follow'd all the Rules prescrib'd them by the Magistrates of Health. They write from Rome, that the 23d past was celebrated there with great Solemnity, upon account of the Pope's entring into the Fourteenth Year of his Reign: The mortality of Cattle in those Parts was very much abated.

Copenhagen, December 5. N. S. Some Days ago Count Steinbock arrived here, and was received with great Civility by his Majesty, at whose Expense he has been since entertained. The Guards are order'd to do the same Honour to him as to the Duke of Wirtemberg, Commander in Chief of the Danish Army, and he is attended by an Adjutant General, and a Colonel of the Horse Guards. The Muscovite Ambassador at this Court hath declar'd, that the Czar will send no Minister to any Congress for a general Peace in the North, till he is first inform'd of the Preliminaries. They write from Stockholm, that they had an account of the defeat of their Army in Finland by the Muscovites, upon which Orders were immediately sent to stop the Transport-Ships that were ready to set Sail with Eight thousand Men for that Province. The same Letters add, that the Princess of Sweden had taken her Place in the Senate, and had received the Compliments of all the Foreign Ministers upon it.

Berne, December 9. N. S. The Catholick Cantons have Summon'd a Diet to meet at Lucerne to Morrow, and it is said they will consider of some Method for re-establishing the antient Union between them and the Protestant Cantons. Letters from Roschach bring an Account, that the Deputies on each side had settled all Points relating to Tockenbourg, had form'd their mutual Demands upon each other, and it was not doubted but they would come to an Agreement.

Berlin, December 9. N. S. This Day the King came hither from Potsdam, having in his way review'd the Regiment of Grenadier Guards. Baron Goertz is gone from hence to Manover, and in a few Days Monsieur Bassewitz intends to set out for Petersbourg, whither he is going with a Commission from the Duke-Administrator of Holstein to the Czar. Letters from Stetin bring an Account, that most of the Saxon Troops in Pomerania had already left that Country, and the rest were preparing for their March to Poland. The Garrison of that Place was to be transported to Sweden, as soon as they were reliev'd by some Regiments of Holstein that were expected there every Day.
