*Turin, December 2. N. S.*

**T**HE Princes of Carignan are returned hither from Affi. The Government of this Cittadel, which has been vacant for some time, by the Death of Monsieur Leroche da Leri, is committed to the Commandant of the Town, till the King of Sicily thinks fit to appoint a new Governor. Letters from Milan bring an account, that the new Works at the Fortresses of Tortona and Novarra, were continued with great Diligence, and a considerable Sum of Mony had been demanded of the City of Milan, for repairing the Fortifications of that Place. The Mortality of Cattle was very great in the Provinces of Lodofan and Cremonese, and as the Distemper spreads itself towards the Frontiers of this Country, we are under great Apprehensions upon that account. They write from Palermo, that his Majesty had not yet appointed a Day for his Coronation, but it was thought it would be some time about the beginning of this Month.

*Vienna, Decemb. 9. N. S.* Yesterday Morning Count Schonborn set out for Brunswick, where he is to preside at the Congress as Plenipotentiary of his Imperial Majesty. On the 4th an Express arriv'd from Radstat, and brought the Emperor an account of the Negotiations between Prince Eugene and Marechal Villars, which are kept very private. The Contagious Distemper is quite ceas'd in this City, and the Persons appointed to take care of the Sick in the Arsenal, which was employ'd as a Pest-house, have been dismiss'd. We are inform'd, that the Mortality at Prague has been so great, that Thirty four thousand three hundred Persons died there in five Months of the Plague. They write from Warsaw, that King Augustus had constituted General Janus, Commander in Chief of his Troops in Poland, and had order'd him to enquire into all Complaints made against the Soldiers, and to redress any Grievances the People suffer'd upon their Account. The same advices add, that the Turks were retir'd from Chocim, but the Han of Tartary continued still encamped near that Place.

*Berlin, December 14. N. S.* We have received Advice from Roschach, that the

Treaty of Peace between the Cantons of Zurich and Berne, and the Abbot de St. Gall, was brought very near a Conclusion, and it was thought would be sign'd in a few Days. All the Articles relating to Tockenbourg were fully adjusted; and the only Point now in Dispute was about the Expences of the War, for which the Deputies of the two Cantons demanded to be reimburs'd, and on the other side the Abbot insisted upon reparation of the Damages his Subjects had sustain'd: But it is thought this Difference between them will easily be accommodated, and that neither Party will carry the Matter so far as to break off the Negotiations upon that account. The French Army being separated into Winter Quarters, our Troops are likewise order'd to return home from Basil.

This Morning arriv'd here the Milford,



Milford from Virginia; and the Tryal from Bilboa.

*Windsor, December 30.* This Day Francis Forbes and Joshua Sharpe, Esqrs. Sheriffs of London and Middlesex, came hither by Order of the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen, to enquire after the Queen's Health. Her Majesty was graciously pleas'd to admit them into Her Prefence, and to confer upon them the Honour of Knighthood.

*Windsor, January 1.* Her Majesty, God be prais'd, has had no return of Her Ague since Sunday last. She rests every Night so well, and recovers so fast, that it is not doubted but She will soon be restored to a perfect state of Health.
