Berlin, January 16. N. S. The King continues still at Potsdam. Some Days ago the Hereditary Prince of Hesse went thither to take Leave of his Majesty, after which he set out for Cassel. Monsieur Jagozinsky, one of the Czar's Chamberlains, is arrived here, with some Instructions to the Muscovite Envoy, in relation to the Treaty concluded between the King of Prussia and Prince Menzikoff, at the Camp before Stetin, and it is said the Differences that arose upon it, are in a fair way of being adjusted. The States of the Dutchy of Cleves having sent a Deputy hither to make some Proposals to the King, his Majesty committed him to Prison, and the next Day ordered him to go home immediately and to acquaint the States, when they had any Complaint to make, that they should apply themselves to the Royal Regency at Cleves, to which they were subordinate.

Hanover, January 16. N. S. Count Reventlau, Minister of the Administrator of Holstein, is to come to this Place, and intends to continue here till the Congress is assembled at Brunswick, where he is appointed to be Plenipotentiary on the part of the Duke his Master. This Assembly was appointed to meet on the 20th Instant, and Count Schonborn is expected there at that time from Frankfort. But there is no probability at present that it will be opened so soon, and the Czar has not yet nam'd his Plenipotentiaries. An Express from the King of Sweden is lately pass'd through this Place, and brought us an account, that when he came away, his Majesty was at Demir Tocca, and intended next Spring to return into his own Territories. We have receiv'd advice from Gottorp, that the King of Denmark would raise the blockade of Tonningen, and restore the Duke of Holstein to his Dominions, provided he would not insist upon Reparation for the Losses he has sustain'd during this War, and it is thought the Two Courts will come to an Agreement in this Affair very speedily. It is said, the Preliminaries of Peace between

the Emperor and France, are Sign'd at Radstadt by Prince Eugene and Marechal Villars. Hamburg, December 19. N. S. There has been a Conference at Moorbourg between the Elector of Hanover's Ministers and the Deputies of this City, in order to make some Regulations in Trade, and to shorten the Quarentine to be performed by the Merchants, who are going to the Fair of Brunswick. But the Bill of Mortality being considerably encreas'd last Week, his Electoral Highness would not consent to have the Quarentine reduced. Some Days ago a Burgermaster of Wesel was dispatch'd to Berlin, with a Remonstrance from the Nobility of the Dutchy of Cleves and the County of Marck, in relation to the Taxes lately establish'd there, which they pretend are directly contrary to their Privileges. Upon his arrival he was immediately Arrested, and sent to Prison, where he was kept one Night; but the next Morning he was released, and order'd to return home without any delay. Preparations are making with great diligence at Copenhagen to fit out the Fleet, which is to consist this Year of Thirty six Men of War, and the Seamen are commanded to repair to their respective Ships by the 1st of April next, upon pain of forfeiting their Pay. The Emperor is in Treaty with the Danish Minister for Six thousand Men of the King his Master's Troops, and the Negotiation with the Czar for a Body of Fourteen thousand Men, meets with no other Obstacle, but that his Imperial Majesty absolutely refuses to let them be under the Command of Prince Menzikoff. They write from Ausbourg, that a Courier was pass'd through that Place in his way to Vienna, where he was going with the Preliminary Articles of Peace between the Emperor and France, sign'd by Prince Eugene and Marechal Villars at Radstadt. It is said the most Christian King has taken it upon himself to make the Elector of Bavaria amends for the Losses he suffered at Munnick, by paying him Four Millions of Livres yearly for four Years. The Prince's Regent and the Senate of Sweden, after several Debates, have at last determin'd entirely to abandon the Province of Finland, and have already sent Directions to withdraw their Forces which remain'd at Vasa, that they may be the better able to defend Scania against the King of Denmark, and to cover the Frontiers of Sweden against the Muscovites. It is thought the former of these things will



will require Twenty thousand Men, and Thirty thousand are to be employ'd against the Czar. The Swedish Squadron that was in Finland has escaped the Muscovite Fleet, and is return'd safely to Simmershaven. The Czar has declar'd to the Dutch Minister, that he will satisfy the Subjects of the States General for the Losses they suffer'd by the burning of three of their Ships at Helsingfort. They write from Warsaw, that the Great General of the Crown had received a Letter from the Palatin of Kiovia, to acquaint him, that if he might be assur'd of a Pardon from King Augustus, he would go to Leipstick, to throw himself at his Majesty's Feet, and that several of those who had adher'd to the Interest of King Stanislaus, were ready to follow his Example. The Polish Ambassadors had not then been admitted to an Audience of the Grand Signior, but they were order'd to follow him immediately to Constantinople. Letters from thence bring an account, that the King of Sweden was in good Health at Demir Tocca, where he resolved to continue for two Months, and in the beginning of the Spring to set out for Chocim, with a considerable Body of Turks and Tartarians. The same advices add, that the Bachas in Asia carried on their Rebellion with great Animosity and Vigour.

*Hague, January 23. N. S.* The States of Holland and West Friezeland continue still assembled. The Ministers of the King of Denmark, the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, and the Elector Palatin, have been in Conference with the Deputies of the States General. On the 19th, the Marquis de Chateaucuf, Ambassador of France, gave an Entertainment to most of the Persons of Distinction of this Republick. Monsieur de St. Saphorin, Minister of the Canton of Berne, who has resided here several Years, is return'd home. Letters from Radstad bring an account, that the most material Articles in the Treaty of Peace between the Emperor and France were adjusted, and would be Sign'd very soon.
