## A PROCLAMATION,

For Publishing the Peace between Her Majesty, and His most Catholick Majesty the King of Spain.

A N N E R.

Whereas a Peace hath been Treated, and Articles of Peace and Commerce have been Concluded at Utrecht, the <sup>Second</sup> Thirteenth Day of July, and the <sup>Nine and Twentieth</sup> Ninth Day of November last, between Us and His most Catholick Majesty the King of Spain, and the Ratifications thereof have been since Exchanged: In Conformity therunto, We have thought fit hereby to Command, That the same be Published throughout all Our Dominions. And We do Declare to all Our Loving Subjects Our Will and Pleasure, That the said Articles of Peace and Commerce be observed Inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever, Strictly Charging and Commanding all Our Loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to Conform themselves thereto accordingly.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Eight and Twentieth Day of February, 1713, In the Twelfth Year of Our Reign.

Berlin, February 27. N. S. On the 24th, the King return'd from Potsdam to this Place, and to Morrow he intends to set out for Oranienbourg. Some Days ago Count Dhona was sent with a Commission from hence to the Emperor. Monsieur d'Er-lach has been confirm'd in his Employment of Marschal of the Court, which he enjoy'd in the late King's Reign. His Majesty has constituted several new Chamberlains, with a Yearly Salary of One thousand Dollars, and has likewise nam'd Twenty Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber. Monsieur Latorff is appointed to go Envoy to the Circle of Lower Saxony, and intends to set out soon for Hamburg, where he is to reside. The Marquis de Honsbrook is made Chancellor of the Principality of Gueldres. It having been represented to his Majesty, that Several of the Young Nobility and Gentry of his Dominions spend a great part of their Incomes in foreign Countries, he has publish'd an Edict, forbidding all his Subjects from travelling beyond the Limits of the Empire without his Special Permission. The Margraves of Bareith and Anspach were invited to this Court, but excus'd themselves from coming upon account, that their Presence was necessary at home to provide for the Security of their Countries, which they apprehended might be in danger of an Invasion, since the Conferences were broke off at Radstad. It is thought the King desired them to come hither, in order to settle the Succession of Bareith, which was resign'd to the late King of Prussia, by the Princes of Culmbach, who are next Heirs to the Margrave. It is said his Majesty intends to take some Regiments of Holstein Gottorp into his Pay, and that they are to serve upon the Rhine, as part of his Contingent. A few Days ago the Passage-boat going from hence to Franckfort upon the Oder, was cast away by a Storm, and the Passengers, to the number of Forty, were all drown'd.

Hamburg, March 2. N. S. The number of Persons that died here last Week amounts to no more than Sixty nine. We have received an Account, that on the 7th past Monsieur de Lowener, Aid de Camp of his Danish Majesty, desired a Conference with the Governour of Tonningen, in which he acquainted him, that Seven thousand Men were ready to Attack the Fortress that Night on all Sides; but nevertheless, if he would Capitulate, he should have honourable Conditions. Upon which a Council of War was call'd, and it was resolv'd to surrender the Place, which was reduced to great Extremity for want of Provisions. On the 10th the Garrison, consisting of Eight or Nine hundred Men, march'd out with the usual Marks of Honour, with two Cannons and two Mortars, and was Conducted to Eutin. It is thought the King of Denmark will order the Fortifications to be Demolish'd as soon as the Season will permit. The Preparations for fitting out the Danish Fleet are continued with great Diligence, and the Czar has engag'd to bear half the Expence of subsisting the Seamen, upon Condition that the Admiral be directed to obey his Orders. The King of Prussia has sent Count Dhona to Vienna, to receive Investiture in his Name of the Fiefs his Majesty holds in the Empire. The Duke of Mecklenbourg has ratify'd and confirm'd the Treaty of Succession concluded between the King of Prussia and the late Duke his Brother, and his Majesty, in return, has obliged himself to protect the Dominions of that Prince against all Violences, as well of the Swedes, as of the Confederates. The Emperor has sent Orders to the King of Sicily's Minister at the Diet of Ausbourg, to leave that Place in two Days, and to depart out of the Territories of the Empire within a Week. They write from Petersbourg, that the Council of War, appointed to examine into the Conduct of Vice-Admiral Cruys in his last Expedition at Sea, had condemn'd him to die, together with Monsieur Rees, Commander of a Man of War, but the Czar had chang'd their Sentence, and sent them into Banishment to Tobolsto in Siberia. Monsieur Schultz, Governour of Wilmars, has received Orders from the King of Sweden his Master, not to enter into any Conference upon the Subject of Sequestering that City, and to receive no Foreign Troops into the Garrison, but to defend the Place to the utmost Extremity in case he should be attack'd. For which reason, as he is not furnish'd at present with a sufficient Quantity of Provisions to maintain a long Siege, he has sent to the Nobility of Mecklenbourg to supply him for Six Months, upon pain of Military Execution.

Hague, March 6. N. S. On the 17th past, the Earl of Strafford arrived here from Brussels, and the same Evening he celebrated Her Majesty's Birth-day with a magnificent Ball, at which the foreign Ministers, and most of the principal Personages of this Republick, were present. On the 23d, the Ratifications of the Treaties of Peace and Commerce between Great Britain and Spain, were exchanged at his Excellency's House. On the 27th Mr. Harley landed at Rotterdam, and came in the Evening to this Place. In a few Days he intends to pursue his Journey to Hanover. The Spanish Ministers have receiv'd an Express from their Court with an account, that the Queen of Spain died on the 14th of last Month. Some Days ago Monsieur Rosenkrantz, Minister of Denmark, arrived here from England in one of Her Majesty's Yachts: On the 18 Instant, the Earl of Strafford was in Con-
