Stockholm, March 18. N. S.

T is thought the States will continue affem-bled till they receive further Orders from the King. The Deputies of the Peafants have given Thanks to the Nobility for their Con-currence in declaring the Princess Ulrica, Regent of the Kingdom, with Authority to conclude a Treaty of Peace in his Majesty's absence. Monfieur Slippenbach and Adjutant-General Swerin are arrived here, to Treat upon an exchange of Count Steinbock and other Swedish Prisoners, for those we have taken of the Muscovites. Count Frenlick, a Member of the Privy Council, died two Days ago, after a fhort Indisposition. Monsieur Hagen, Minister of Holstein, is returned to Hamburgh, very much displeas'd at the ill Success of his Negotiations. Major General Ekeblad intends to set out to Morrow for Stralfund, where he is to command the Garrison, in the absence of General Ducker, who is expected here. Orders are given for disbanding some new-rais'd Forces, but the Pay is to be continued to the Officers, and the Men are to be incorporated into old Regiments. Monsieur Nommers is fent from hence with Instructions to the Governor of Wismar, it being supposed that the Danes will open the Campaign by the Siege of that Place. We have receiv'd advice from Finland, that the Muscovite Army was advanc'd near Vasa, where we have a Body of Five thousand Men, and as the Enemy is very much superior in Force, we are un-der great Apprehensions for our Troops in that

Madrid, March 19. N. S. The King continues still at the Palace of Medina Celi in persect Health. Letters from the Duke de Popoli's Camp bring an Account, that the Catalans, who kept the Town of Solfona block'd up, had received Intelligence, that the Marquis de Thouy was marchirg against them with a Detachment of his Majesty's Troops, upon which they fled away from thence, and faved themselves in the Mountains. The Inhabitants of Centellas had been twice attack'd by a confiderable Body of Miquelets, but they defended themselves with so much Reso-Intion and Courage, that the Enemy was obliged to retire with Loss. The Deserters that came every Day out of Barcelona reported, that the People of that Place suffer'd great Extremity for want of Provisions, but they were in continual expectation of a Supply from the Isle of Ma-

jorca.

Brunswick, March 22. N.S. On the 17th, all the Foreign Ministers met at the House of Count Schonborn, first Plenipotentiary of his Imperial Majesty, where it was unanimously agreed, that they should as-

semble twice a week in the Town-house. In pursuance of this Resolution the Congress was opened on the 20th, and the Conferences have since been regularly held, for restoring Peace in the North. sterday Morning the Duke of Wolfenbuttel died in the Eighty First Year of his Age. Mounsieur Rosenkrans is lately arrived here, in Quality of Plenipotentiary of the King of Denmark, and Count Reventlau is come with the same Character from the Elector of Hanover.

Dublin, March 30. This Day the Peace between Her Majesty and the King of Spain was proclaimed here with the usual Solemnity by Ulster King at Arms, accompanied by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Officers of this Corporation, in their The Cannon was thrice dis-Formalities. charged, and the Troops, which are quartered at this Place, fired three Volleys of Small Shot. In the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.

St. James's, April 2. This Day Monsieur le Baron Sohlenthall, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had a private Audience of Her Majesty, to notify the Death of the Queen Mother of Denmark; being Introduced by the Right Hon. William Bromley, Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.
