THIS Day was presented to Her Majesty the humble Address of the Episcopal Clergy of the Diocese of Aberdeen, by the Reverend Dr. James Garden, and Dr. George Garden, attended by several other Clergymen, and introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Mar, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Barons and Heretors of the Shire of Argyle, of the Name of Campbell, and others, was likewise presented to Her Majesty by Duncan Campbell, of Lochinell, being introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Mar, One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously, and was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on the said Duncan Campbell.

Vienna, April 4. N. S. The Emperor hath appointed Prince Eugene, Count Goes, and Count Seilem, to be his Plenipotentiaries at the Congress at Baden; and it is said the two latter will set out for that Place in a few Days. The Treaty of Peace between the Emperor and France has been made publick, and several Copies of it are sent to the Ministers of the Princes of the Empire. Cardinal Schotenbach is gone from hence to Rome, and General Palfi to Hungary, from whence we are informed, that Count Lowenbourg died on the 16th past at his Government of Great Waradin. Letters from Turky bring an Account, that the Ambassador of Poland had been in Conference with the Grand Vizir, who desired to know of him what Orders he had received in relation to the Cession of Ukraïn; declaring, that in case that Province was not resign'd to the Ottoman Port, the Han of Tartary should enter into it, and lay waste the whole Country. The Ambassador return'd Answer, That he had no Instructions to yield up any Place, but only to demand that the Treaty of Carlowitz should be observed; That he would send an Express to inform King Augustus and the Republick of the Pretensions of the Port, and that in the mean time the Poles were prepar'd to defend themselves against any Invasion. The same Advices add, that the Bachas in Asia continued their Rebellion with great Animosity, and, by the Support of the Arabians and Persians, they made a vigorous Resistance to the Army the Grand Signior had sent to reduce them to their Obedience.

Berlin, April 7. N. S. Yesterday Monsieur d'Ahiefeld, the Danish Envoy, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and in a few Days he intends to set out for Copenhagen. This Day the Court went into Mourning for the Duke of Wolfenbuttel. The Government of the Abbey of Qued, Jimbourg, which was lately conferr'd upon Monsieur Poládofsky, has been since given to Monsieur Hamrath, President of the Regency of Halberstadt, and Monsieur Iofádofsky is to be Director of the Chamber of Finances of Magdebourg. The Counts Flemming and Wakerbart are expected very soon from Dresden, and after they have transacted some Affairs at this Court they are to proceed to the Congress at Brunswick. Letters

from Petersbourg bring an account, that the Muscovites have lately defeated a Body of Eight thousand Swedes in Finland, in which Action the latter are said to have lost Five thousand Men.

Hamburg, April 13. N. S. His Prussian Majesty hath writ a second Letter to the King of Denmark, desiring him to forbear the Demolition of Tonningen in the Mirority of the Prince, to whom it appertains. A Memorial in the Name of the young Duke of Holstein, hath likewise been presented to the Assembly of Brunswick, imploring the Assistance of the Ministers there upon the same Subject, and they have accordingly agreed to use their Intercessions with his Danish Majesty, not to proceed in ruining the Fortifications of that Place. Notwithstanding this, Orders are given to blow up the Arsenals, the Store-houses, and the Barracks; and the Demolition of the Works is continued with great diligence. The Queen Dowager of Denmark is to be buried on the 25th Instant. The King intends to assist in Person at her Funeral, and afterwards he will fix on a Day for his departure to Holstein. Two Muscovite Men of War of Seventy Guns each, are arriv'd at Copenhagen, and Eight more are expected very soon, to reinforce the Danish Fleet. Monsieur Hagen, who was sent by the Administrator of Holstein to Stockholm, is returned to Stralsund, having receiv'd a severe Reprimand from the Senate, in relation to his Master's concerning himself in the Affairs of Sweden, particularly in the Sequestration of Stetin. Major General Eckeblatt is likewise arrived at the same Place, and has brought an Order to General Ducker to go immediately to Stockholm, but it is thought he will hardly comply with it, since he has received contrary directions under the King of Sweden's own Hand. It is reported, that the Czar has lately entertained some Suspicions of the Court of Poland, and has made great Complaints against King Augustus for Ratifying the Treaty of Stetin, for accepting the Mediation of France, and consenting to the Restitution of Livonia, even before a Peace is made in the North. It is said, that Prince and the King of Denmark are so much dissatisfied at the Behaviour of Count Flemming, that they will Protest against his admission to the Congress of Brunswick, and call their own Ministers from thence, in case King Augustus, his Master, resolves to employ him in Quality of his Plenipotentiary. We are assur'd, that the Czar will give Leave to the Swedish Officers, whom he has taken Prisoners, to return home, provided they will oblige themselves by Oath, not to serve against him or his Allies, during the Course of the present War. They write from Stockholm, that an account was brought there of the Defeat of the Swedish Troops in Finland, which had occasioned a great Consternation among the People, and Orders were given to raise some new Forces for the Defence of that City. Notwithstanding the King's Command, the States of the Kingdom had refus'd to separate, and were extremely pressing with the Princess-Regent, to conclude a Treaty of Peace upon the best Terms she could procure.
