## St. James's, April 10.

HIS Day was prefented to Her Majefly the humble Addrefs of the Epifcopal Clergy of the Diocefe of Aberdeen, by the Reverend Dr. James Garden, and Dr. George Garden, attended by feveral other Clergymen, and introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Mar, One of Her Majefly's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Addreis of the Barons and Heretors of the Shire of Argyle, of the Name of Campbell, and others, was likewife prefented to Her Majefty by Duncan Campbell, of Lochinell, being introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Mar, One of Her Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Both which Addreffes Her Majefty received very gracioufly, and was pleafed to confer the Honour of Knighthood on the faid Duntan Campbell.

Vienna, April 4. N. S. The Emperor hath ap-pointed Prince Eugene, Count Goes, and Count Seilem, to be his Plenipotentiaries at the Congress at Baden; and it is faid the two latter will fet out for that Place in a few Days. The Treaty of Peace between the Emperor and France has been made publick, and feveral Copies of it are fent to the Ministers of the Princes of the Empire. Cardinal Schotenbach is gone from hence to Rome, and Ge-neral Palfi to Hungary, from whence we are informed, that Count Lowenbourg died on the 16th paft at his Government of Great Waradin. Letters from Turky bring an Account, that the Ambaffador of Poland had been in Conference with the Grand Vizir, who defired to know of him what Orders he had received in relation to the Ceffion of Ukrain; declaring, that in cafe that Province was not refign'd to the Ottoman Port, the Han of Tartary fhould enter into it, and lay wafte the whole Country. The Ambaffador return'd Answer, That he had no Instructions to yield up any Place, but only to demand that the Treaty of Carlowitz should be obferved; That he would fend an Express to inform King Augustus and the Republick of the Pretensions of the Port, and that in the mean time the Poles were prepar'd to defend themselves against any Invasion. The same Advices add, that the Bachas in Afia continued their Rebellion with great Animofity, and, by the Support of the Arabians and Persians, they made a vigorous Resistance to the Army the Grand Signior had fent to reduce them to their Obedience.

Berlin, April 7. N. S. Yesterday Monfieur d'Ahlefeld, the Danish Envoy, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and in a few Days he intends to set out for Copenhagen. This Day the Court went into Mourning for the Duke of Wolfenbuttel. The Government of the Abbey of Qued, limbourg, which was lately conferr'd upon Monsheur Poladosky, has been fince given to Monsseur Hamrath, President of the Regency of Halberfladt, and Monsseur I osadosky is to be Director of the Chamber of Finances of Magdebourg. The Counts Hemming and Wakerbart are expected very foon from Dressen, and after they have transacted some Affairs at this Court they are to proceed to the Congress at Brunswick. Letters

from Petersbourg bring an account, that the Mufcovites have lately deteated a Body of Eight thoufand Swedes in Finland, in which Aftion the latter are faid to have loft Five thoufand Men.

Hamburgh, April 13. N. S. His Prussian Maje-fly hath writ a fecond Letter to the King of Denmark, defiring him to forbear the Demolition of Tonningen in the Mirority of the Prince, to whom it appertains. A Memorial in the Name of the young Duke of Holftein, hath likewife been pre-fented to the Affembly of Brunfwick, imploring the Affiftance of the Ministers there upon the same Subject, and they have accordingly agreed to use their Interceilions with his Danish Majesty, not to pro-ceed in ruining the Fortifications of that Place. Notwithstanding this, Orders are given to blow up the Arfenals, the Store-houfes, and the Barracks; and the Demolition of the Works is continued with great diligence. The Queen Dowager of Denmark is to buried on the 25th Instant. The King intends to affist in Person at her Funeral, and afterwards he will fix on a Day for his departure to Holsein. Two Muscovite Men of War of Seventy Guns each, are arriv'd at Copenhagen, and Eight more are expected very foon, to reinforce the Danish Fleet. Monsieur Hagen, who was fent by the Administrator of Holstein to Stockholm, is returned to Stralsund, having receiv'd a fevere Reprimand from the Senate, in relation to his Master's concerning himself in the Affairs of Swecen, particularly in the Sequestration of Stetin. Major General Eckebladt is likewife arrived at the fame Place, and has brought an Order to General Ducker to go immediately to Stockholm, but it is thought he will hardly comply with it, fince he has received contrary directions under the King of Sweden's own Hand. It is reported, that the Czar has lately entertained some Suspicions of the Court of Poland, and has made great Com-plaints against King Augustus for Ratifying the Treaty of Stetin, for accepting the Mediation of France, and confenting to the Restitution of Livo-nia, even before a Peace is made in the North. It is faid, that Prince and the King of Denmark are To much diffatisfied at the Behaviour of Count Flemming, that they will Proteft against his admis-fion to the Congress of Brunswick, and call their own Ministlers from thence, in case King Augustus, his Mafter, refolves to employ him in Quality of his Plenipotentiary. We are affur'd, that the Czar will give Leave to the Swedish Officers, whom he has taken Prifoners, to return home, provided they will oblige themfelves by Oath, not to ferve against him or his Allies, during the Course of the present War. They write from Stockholm, that an account was brought there of the Defeat of the Swedifu Troops in Finland, which had occasioned a great Confiernation among the People, and Orders were given to raile fome new Forces for the Defence of that City. Notwithstanding the King's Command, the States of the Kingdom had refus'd to feparate, and were extreanily prefling with the Princefs-Regent, to conclude a Treaty of Peace upon the best I erms she could procure.
