*Vienna, May 5. N. S.*

ON the 28th past, their Imperial Majesties removed from hence to Laxemburg, where they intend to continue for six Weeks. The Emperor has conferred the Government of Mantua upon Prince Philip of Darmstadt. Some Days ago an Express arrived at Court with the Resolution of the Diet at Augsbourg, by which the Emperor is empower'd, upon certain Conditions, to Conclude, Sign, and Ratify the Peace at the Congress of Baden, in the Name of the whole Empire. Whereupon Count Goes and Count Seilern, were ordered to repair to Baden without any delay, and to Morrow they intend to set out accordingly. Monsieur Smeuck is arrived here with a Commission from the King of Prussia, but the Contents of it are not yet known. On the 29th past, the Countess of Oetting-Wallenstein, Groom of the Stole to the Emperis, died here in the Fifty First Year of her Age, and most of the Nobility assisted at her Funeral, which was performed with great Pomp. Letters from Turkey bring an account, that the Bachas in Asia carried on their Rebellion with great Obstinacy. The Port had threatned the Polish Ambassador, to invade the Kingdom with an Army of 100000 Men, in case their Pretensions were not complied with, notwithstanding which, the Ambassador persisted in his demand of having the Treaty of Carlowitz observed. The Hospodar of Valachia had been arrested Prisoner with his three Sons, and his Estate was confiscated.

*Berlin, May 8. N. S.* The King intends very soon to go to Brandenburg, Madgeburg, and Halberstadt, in order to review the Troops which are Quarter'd at those Places. Baron Sparr, a Lieutenant General in the Service of the Most Christian King, is lately arrived here, and has had a private Audience of his Majesty. It is thought, he has some Proposals to make from the Court of France, in relation to the War in the North, having passed by Hamburgh, where he was several times in Conference with Count Welling, and Monsieur Trilendorff. Baron Knyphausen is appointed to reside at Paris on the Part of his Prussian Majesty, but it is not yet known whether he is to go with the Character of Ambassador or Envoy. We have received advice from Poland, that the Turkish Commissioners were arrived in that Kingdom, in order to regulate the Frontiers with those of the Czar, who were likewise expected very soon. Great numbers of the Inhabitants of Ukrain had left their Abodes, and put themselves under the Protection of the Grand Signior, who had promised to grant them considerable Privileges. The Seraskier was at Chocim, and employed near Thirty thousand Men in the Fortifications of that Place.

*Hamburgh, May 11. N. S.* Baron Sparr is arriv'd at Berlin, and hath been several times in Conference with Monsieur Ilgen, Minister of the King of Prussia: But we are inform'd, that the Proposals he hath made hitherto have been rejected, and

it is thought his Prussian Majesty will not concern himself in the Affairs of the North, nor declare openly in favour of the House of Gottorp, as well upon account of the Engagements he hath enter'd into with the Imperial Court, as also because he seems very unwilling to proceed to a Rupture with the Czar. The King of Denmark hath deferred his Journey to Holstein, till his whole Fleet is put to Sea, which it is thought will hardly be before the end of this Month. His Danish Majesty hath received an Express from the Czar, with an account, that he designs to enter into Sweden very soon with an Army of Fifty four thousand Men, and that Four thousand were already gone before, in order to build Bridges over several Rivers, which he must necessarily pass. The Danish Ministers have been very much press'd by those of Wolfenbittel to treat upon the Affairs of Holstein; but they have return'd answer, that they could not enter into any Conference, till after the arrival of all the Plenipotentiaries of their Allies. Several Swedish Officers, who were taken Prisoners with Count Steinbock, are lately gone from hence to Wismar. Two Men of War belonging to the Czar, that were sailing towards Petersbourg, have been obliged to put into Copenhagen Harbour, not daring to pursue their Voyage, for fear of being taken by a Swedish Squadron which is now at Sea. It is said, Major General Lieven, who was sent by the Princess and Senate of Sweden to the King at Demotica, hath perswaded him to leave the Dominions of the Ottoman Port, and we expect every Day to hear of his Majesty's departure from thence.

*Cologne, May 11. N. S.* The Electoral Prince of Saxony returned hither on the 8th from Dusseldorp, and intends to continue at this Place for some time. The Troops of this Electorate that were in Winter Quarters at Andernach, Lintz, and other Places on the Rhine, are order'd to be in a readiness to take possession of Rhinberg and Keyserwert, as soon as they are Evacuated. The Commissary General of the Imperial Forces is gone from hence to Saurland, in order to review the Regiments of Dragoons commanded by Prince Eugene and by the late General Felts, which are to march towards the Upper Rhine. The Prince of Holstein-Beck intends to set out very soon for Aix la Chapelle. There is to be a Congregation of Prelates held within a few Days in this City, for the Election of a President.

*Paris, May 15. N. S.* On the 10th the Heart of the Duke of Berry was carried from the Louvre to Val de Grace, and placed among those of the Royal Family by the Bishop of Seez, his first Almoner. To Morrow his Body is to be Interred at St. Denis with great Pomp. The King has declared his Household shall be continued, in case the Dutchess of Berry be delivered of a Son, The Prince of Conti is dangerously ill of a Fever, which has lately carried off great numbers of People. Whereupon Monsieur d'Argenson, Lieutenant General of the Police, has given Orders for visiting all the



The Houses in the several Quarters of this City, and for removing every thing that may corrupt the Air, or spread Infection. Letters from Madrid bring an Account, that his Catholick Majesty had made a new Regulation in the Councils of State, of War, and of Justice, and had named several new Counsellors. The same advices add, that the Inhabitants of Barcelona being reduced to great Extremitie for want of Provisions, had offered to Surrender the Place upon certain Conditions: But the Duke de Popoli would not agree to any Articles, till after the arrival of Monsieur Orry, who was expected every Day in the Camp.

*Hague, May 18. N. S.* On the 12th, Baron Heems, the Emperor's Minister, received an Express from the Court of Vienna, after which he was in Conference with the Deputies of the States General. The same day Prince Kurakin, Ambassador of the Czar to this Republick, and One of his Plenipotentiaries at Brunswick, returned from thence, and intends to continue at this Place till the opening of the Congress, which, it is thought, will not be in some time. The Duke d'Offuna is gone from hence to Utrecht, and Monsieur Hymmen, Chancellor of the Dutchy of Cleves, is return'd to that Place, where he expects to meet the King of Prussia his Master very soon. On the 16th the Earl of Strafford had a long Conference with the Deputies of the States General, upon the Affairs of the Netherlands, and yesterday he had another upon those of the North with Monsieur Palmquist, Envoy of Sweden. Count Bergomy, the Duke of Modena's Minister, who had his Audience of Leave of the States some time ago, set out this Morning for his Court.
