Venice, May 11. N. S.

N the 6th, Monfignor Aldobrandini, the Pope's Nuncio, made his publick Entry here with great Magnificence. He was met at St. spirito by Signor Morofini, accompanied by Sixty Senators in their Scarlet Robes, Fourteen Bi shops, and several other Persons of Distinction. The next Day he was Conducted, with the usual Ceremonies, from the Palace of the Nunciatura to the College, where he had his first Audience; after which he returned home with the fame Solemnity. Yesterday being Ascension-Day, the Vice-Doge, by reason of an Indisposition of the Doge, went on board the Bucentoro, and performed the Function of Marrying the Sea; at which the new Nuncio, together with the Regency, affilted. A fevere De-cree has been lately publish'd here against the Ex-cesses of Luxury. The Magistrate of Health has again diminish'd the Quarentine, and in a short time all the Passages will be opened into the Terri tories of this State. Prince Ercolani, the Emperor's Ambaffador, is returned here from Bologna, and intends to fet out in a few Days for Vienna. They write from Rome, that the Earl of Peterborough was gone through that Place in his way to Florence. Letters from Naples bring an Account, that the St. Gennaro and the Santa Barbara Men of War, which had convoy'd the Tartanes with the Spanish Soldiers on Board to Fiume, were returned from thence, and had brought back a large Quantity of Timber and other Materials for the Building of Ships.

Madrid, May 14. N. S. The King has granted Count Albert, Envoy Extraordinary of the Elector of Bavaria, the Privilege of entring into his Chamber. His Majefty has conflituted Don Joseph Terran and Monjaras, one of his Gentlemen, in confideration of his Services. The Marquis de Brancas has fent Orders from Paris to have his House and Family here discharged ; and it is faid, the Most Christian King will very soon name an-other Ambassaddor to this Court. The 17th is ap-pointed for celebrating the Funeral of the Queen, and it is thought his Majesty soon after will remove to Pardo. Two Days ago we receiv'd an Express with an account, that on the 30th path, Monlieur Orry arrived at the Camp before Barcelona, and that Don Feliciano de Bracamonte had defeated a Party of Miquelets commanded by the Marquis del Pual, and had taken feveral Priloners. Brigadier Solis had been in pursuit of another Body in the Plains of Tarragona, and had obliged them to retire for Refuge to the Mountains of Montblanc. We have receiv'd an account, that the Alcaide Hali, who had commanded above 15 Years at the Siege of Ceuta, was dead, and that the Emperor of Mo-rocco had fent one of his Sohs in his Place, with a confiderable Supply of Men and Ammunition. Upon this advice, a Reinforcement of Troops, and a great Quantity of all forts of Provisions necessary for a vigorous Defence, have been fent thither from Andelution Andalufia.

Berlin, May 19. N. S. Yesterday the King came hither from Potsdam, and reviewed the Regiment of Wartensleben in the Park. His Majesty intends in like manner to review the rest of the Forces

quarter'd in the Neighbourhood of this Place, before he fets out for Madgebourg, which will be towards the end of this Month. The Inhabitants of this City have complained that great Numbers of People have been frightned away by the violent manner of raifing Troops, and are withdrawn into other Countries, to the great decay of Trade: Whereupon his Majefty has order'd a Declaration to be read in the Churches to Morrow, that for the future no Perfon fhall be Prefs'd into the Service. Monfieur Girardi, an Agent of the Duke of Saxe-Weymar, having endeavour'd to perfuade feveral Manufacturers to remove from hence into the Duke his Mafter's Dominions, the King has fent him Orders to leave this Country within four Days.

Days. Hamburgb, May 22. N. S. The King of Den-mark is expected very foon in Holftein. His Majefty has Summoned the Swedish Officers, who were taken Prisoners with Count Steinbock, to appear within a Month at the, Places where they had been in Confinement, before they were releafed upon their Parole. They write from Copenhagen, that Sixteen Men of War were ready to let fail from thence upon the first Order. We are informed that the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel is arrived at Leipfick, where he has been feveral times in Conference with King Augustus, upon some Affairs that are to be treated of at the Congress of Brunswick. The Emperor not being pleased with the Refervations in the full Powers which had been fent him, to con-clude a general Peace at Baden, in the Name of the whole Empire, the Diet of Ausbourg hath fiace altered them in the manner his Imperial Majesty defired, and the Ministers of the several Princes have given him an account in Writing of the Pretensions of their respective Masters. It is faid, the King of Prussia is in Treaty with the Duke of Courland, for the Succession to his Dominions, in cale the Duke, who is yet unmarried, should happen to Die without lifue. The Czar has refused to agree to a Truce with the Swedes. Letters from Demotica; of the 10th paft, bring an Account, that General Lieven was upon his return to this Place, and that the King of Sweden his Master would likewife leave the Ottoman Empire in a few Days.

Henover, May 22. N. S. Monfieur Schleinitz, Envoy of Mufcovy at this Court, is appointed by the Czar to be his Second Plenipotentiary at the Congress of Brunswick. On the 17th Instant, the Imperial Regiment of Dragoons that was Quartered in the Dioceie of Hildescheim, began their March towards Newick near Coblentz. Monfieur de Frifendorf, who refided formerly at this Place with the Character of Envoy of the King of Sweden, arrived here a few Days ago from Berlin, and to Morrow he intends to fet out for Brunswick. We are informed that Count Welling, who was Governor of Bremen, and retired to Hamburgh when the Danes took Polfession of that Dutchy, has received full Powers from the King of Sweden to enter upon a Treaty of Peace with the Allies of the North. They write from Breslaw, that the folih Generals who arrived there fome time ago from Turky, in order to make their Submissions to King Augustus, had put off their departure to Drefden, upon account of the Uncertainty of the Affairs of foland, where the Nobility
