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Vienna, May 23. N. S.

THE Empress has been inform'd that the House she had order'd to be prepared for her at Baden, where she intends to drink the Waters, is not yet in a readines to receive her, upon which her Majesty has put off her Journey to that Place till the Tenth of next Month. Monsieur Schunck, the King of Prussia's Secretary, who was sent some time ago with a Commission to this Court, is returned to Berlin. A Courier is arrived here from France, with some Dispatches relating to the Congress of Baden, but the Contents of them are not yet certainly known. The Battalions of Bevern, Taun, and Lancken, are expected here very soon in their way to Hungary. They write from Buda, that there was a Band of Robbers assembled thereabouts, that they had put the Country under Contribution, and were grown so numerous and powerful, that it was thought the Government would be obliged to send a Body of regular Troops to suppress them. Letters from Turkey bring an Account, that the King of Sweden continued still at Demir Toeca, but Preparations were making for his Majesty's departure, which it was thought would be very soon, and he had determined to return through Poland into his own Dominions. The late Hospodar of Valachia was brought to Constantinople under a strong Guard, and immediately after his arrival he was committed to Prison.

Gottorp, May 26. N. S. On the 20th General Scholten set out for Tommingen, from whence he is since gone to Staden, in order to review the Danish Regiments lately arrived from the Low-Countries. The King of Denmark continues still at Fredericksbourg, and he has not yet fixed on a Day for his departure from thence. His Troops in this Country are to remain in their former Quarters till the arrival of his Majesty, who intends to review them in Person. Count Van der Nath, Minister of Holstein, is gone into Pomerania. Letters from Copenhagen bring an Account, that a Squadron of Seven Men of War, under the Command of Monsieur Tamisen, was preparing to set sail from thence, with Two of the Czar's Frigats, in order to join the Muscovite Fleet on the Coasts of Finland, and it was thought the King of Denmark's whole Fleet would be in a readines to put to Sea in a short time.

Leipsick, May 27. N. S. On the 24th King Augustus set out for Dresden, accompanied by Count Vitzdum, his Great Chamberlain, and several other Officers of the Court. The Ministers that staid here after his departure, were yesterday in Conference with Count Flemming, who went this Morning, together with Count Wackerbart, towards Brunswick, in order to be present at the opening of the Congress, and the Ministers of the Republick of Poland are likewise expected there very soon. The Prince of Furstenberg is gone to Wernsdorff, and the Prince of Radzevil to his Seat in Lithuania. The Primate of Poland has again writ to his Majesty, in the Name of the whole Republick, to desire he will give effectual Orders to prevent the raising of Contributions in the Palatinates of that Kingdom. We have receiv'd advice from Ukrain, that the Cossacks under the Command of Count Mattiwie, had been defeated by a Detachment of the King's Army, and

those who escaped in the Action were afterwards obliged to surrender themselves Prisoners at discretion.

Hamburg, June 1. N. S. We are inform'd, That the Counts Wackerbart and Flemming are arrived at Brunswick, and it is thought the Conferences will begin very soon, unless his Imperial Majesty and the Allies of the North should consent to have the Congress transferr'd to some other Place, as the Swedes have desired. Monsieur de Brosse, Envoy of King Augustus at the Court of Denmark, has received Orders from his Master to return home, and no other Minister has been yet nam'd in his Place. Baron Sparr and Monsieur de Rottenbourg have made some new Proposals to the Court of Prussia, in favour of Sweden and Holstein, but tho' they are said to be much more advantageous than the former, it is doubted whether his Prussian Majesty will agree to them. They write from Stockholm, that an Account was brought there of an Engagement between the Swedish and Muscovite Fleets near the River Corpo, in which the former had Taken and Sunk above Thirty of their Enemies Ships, and Admiral Wattrang was preparing to Attack them a Second Time, as soon as the Bomb-Vessels were arrived. The principal Conditions of the Treaty of Peace lately concluded between King Augustus and the Ottoman Port, are these: His Majesty and the Republick of Poland oblige themselves to observe the first Article of the Treaty made the 13th of June, 1713, by the Muscovite and Turkish Ministers, as far as relates to the Affairs of that Kingdom. The Grand Signior is to give proper notice to the King and Republick, in case his Swedish Majesty should resolve to return into his own Dominions through Poland, and Commissioners are to be appointed to settle the manner of his Passage, which is to be Secure and Free, with a Retinue suitable to his Rank.

Cologne, June 1. N. S. The Electoral Prince of Saxony went from hence this Day towards Aix la Chapelle, extremely pleas'd with the Respect that has been shewn him during his continuance at this Place. There have been frequent Robberies committed of late upon the High Ways in this Electorate, but by the Diligence that has been used in apprehending the Malefactors, and bringing them to Justice, it is hop'd those Disorders will soon be at an end. The States of Munster, that have been assembled for some time in that City, are now separated. It is said the King of Prussia intends to take some of the Troops of Hesse Cassel into his Service. The Burgher-Masters of the Town of Huy have made great Complaints to the Imperial Council at Liege, of their being obliged to give Lodgings in their Houses to the Forces in Garrison there.

Hague, June 5. N. S. On the 2d Instant, the States of Holland and West-Friesland separated for three Weeks. Yesterday the Earl of Strafford was in Conference with the Great Pensionary, as also with Prince Kurakin, Ambassador of the Czar, upon the Affairs of the North. General Hompefch is appointed to be Governor of the Town of Namur, in the room of Count Tilly, who has obtained the Government of Bois le Duc, and that of Luxembourg, is conferred upon General Keppel. Monsieur Gossinga, one of the Ambassadors of the States General to the Court of France, is expected here very soon,
