

other French such of war were seen about the Gulf of Palma in Sardinia, whereof one had lost his Mass and intended to return home; they farther affirm, that Amurat Beys, who Commands in Tunis, marching towards Tabarca with a party to gather the usual Tribute, was set upon by the Moors, who killed many of his people, and his horse under him, but his son coming in opportunely with 500 horse, rescued him out of their hands.

Venice, Novem. 15. The Proveditor General Bernardo, presses hard to be recalled from his charge, and tis believed the Senate may in little time, gratify him in the Election of a successor.

The Senate has lately considered of the great want of able bodied men to row in their Gallies, and have found it convenient to give Order for the raising of 2000 men for that service; which are to be furnished by the several Companies of Trades, or at least an Equivalent in moneys to be paid in, to raise them elsewhere.

General Barbaro has lately written from Dalmatia, that the Bassa of Bosnia was gone towards Clissa, intending first to adjust all affairs concerning the Limits, before he falls upon any other business; his Excellency was therefore gone towards Clissa, intending from thence to know the Bassa's mind, about the time and place which was to be appointed for their meeting: He farther writes that the Bassa was attended by a considerable number of Souldiers, and therefore he thought it convenient to meet him in the like posture, and had for that purpose called to him the Militias of those parts, and particularly the Morlachs of Zara, Zebentga and other places.

The Senate has lately ordered to be sent away to the said General, the Present intended for the Bassa, consisting of Silks, and Cloth for Vests, and some other curiosities, with the sum of 20 thousand Ducats for the Generals own expences.

It is much doubted that the preparations made by the Grand Segnior for war, are designed against Hungary, many of the Rebels of that Country soliciting him for assistance; nor are there wanting in the Ottoman Court some enemies of the House of Austria, who watch for all opportunities of inviting the Visier to employ his forces that way.

Many Speeches have been lately made in the Regadi for the retention of the great Cause or Process against the Captain-General Morosini, that it may not go before the Great Council, nor fall under the cognizance of the whole body of the Nobility. The Advocate Carraro, who was his first accuser, seems much mollified, and tis believed the Inquisitor Ericcio, will be directed to suspend the Process till farther order.

Brussels, Nov. 14. Here is newly arrived Baron Butler, sent from the Duke of Lorraine to his Excellency the Count de Monterey, from whom we have this account of the late motion of the said Duke; that retreating from Hombourg, he marched with about 50 Nobles and persons of Quality towards Triers, where he was honourably received, but the Elector being then at Coblents, the Duke went thither to him, where he was treated with much state and civility, and after three days stay took his leave, all the Great Guns being Three times fired at his departure, both from the City and Castle: from thence the Duke went to Metz, where he stayed two days and was entertained with the like civility, and went thence to Frankfort, where he lodged one night in the Suburbs, but was not permitted to come into the City; and the next day passed thence to a little Town, a few Leagues distant from the City, where he intends to wait for an answer from the Emperour, upon the addresses of

the Count de Vandemont; the most considerable persons now with him are the Prince de Lisébonne, the Marquess d'Harcourt, the Count d'Alberty, the Marquess de Treschasseau, the Prince de Lixin, Monsieur de Begue, Monsieur de Wirimont, and Monsieur Jounoncourt; but a great part of the Nobility and Gentry in Lorraine are fallen off from him, and have sworn fidelity to his most Christian Majesty. The French Army in Lorraine are not at present above 15000 men, and are disposed of into their winter Quarters; the Marshal de Crequy continuing his residence in the Dukes Palace and apartment in Nancy.

Brussels, Novem. 23. His Excellency the Count de Monterey went hence on Friday last for Antwerp, to take order for the payment of the moneys returned thither from Spain, designed for the Swedes: to morrow he is expected from thence at Dendermond to view the new made Sluces, and may return hither the same evening.

From Lorraine we are advised, that forces arrive there daily from France and the new Conquests, so that the Army consists at present of about 25000 men. That the Marshal de Crequy has given order for the filling of his Magazines, with all sorts of Provisions, and has commanded the Country to furnish him with a thousand fat Oxen, which are to be salted up at Metz, and with a prodigious quantity of Corn, which is to be carried to the same place.

The said Marshal having found in the Archives of Lorraine, that the Archbishoprick of Triers had been for 500 years under the protection of Lorraine, has sent to the City of Triers, to summon them to take in a French Garrison, and has ordered 2000 French to quarter in that Country.

The French have demolished the Castle of Bar, and thrown down all the towres about the City; but the Townsmen have sent their Deputies to Paris, to Petition his Majesty, that he would please to spare their Walls.

Commissioners are sent to Longuy to take order for the demolishing the Castle there.

Marshal de Crequy has sent for his Lady to Nancy, where he continues his Residency, and has now the Title of Governor of Lorraine.

Hague, Nov. 25. Several ships have been lately cast away in the late storms, and amongst others Two Scottish ships lost upon the coasts neer Scheweling, the men of one of them were saved, but the other all perished: an English Pacquet boat passing on Friday last from Helvoet-Sluis, was also cast away, but the Men and Letters preserved; some other English Vessels are also lost, and particularly the Star of Yarmouth laden with Herrings, bound for Hambourgh.

On Friday last in the afternoon arrived here an Envoye from the Czar of Muscovy, with a Train of about 15 persons; he has been welcomed and treated by the States, but is not yet admitted to his Publick Audience. We have here a warm report that the Czars General has defeated Stepan Radzin the Leader of the Rebels in Muscovy, of which we expect Confirmation.
