W E Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subyests, beg leave gratefully to acknowledge Tour Majesty's constant Care, not only in preferving and improving our prefent Happines; but also, in providing for the future Safety and Prosperity of Tour Kingdoms, and of the Protestant Succellion-in the Illustrious House of Hanover; by issuing to Seafonably a Proclamation, promising a Reward out of Tour Own Revenue, as an Encouragement for Apprebending the Pretender, when he shall Land, or Attempt to Land, in any of Your Majesty's Dominions; and by giving Tour ready Affent to the Billfor preventing the Growth of Schilm; and for the Security of the Churches of England and Ireland, as by Law Established.

by Law Effaorined. The Experience this City bath bad of Tour Majefty's Goodnefs and Concern for Tour People, is fuch, that (under GOD) they place their Dependence upon Tour Majefty; and do take this Opportunity bumbly to affure Your Majefty, That they will do the utmost that lies in them, to extinguish the Hopes of the Pretender, and of all his Open and Secret Abettors, and to abviate the Dangers that may arife from Popery or Schifth; and they will, with that Duty and Loyalty which becomes them, to the utmost of their Power, oppose all Attempts which may be made under any Pretence whatfoever, to weaken Tour Authority, which always has been, and we are confident always will be, imployed for the Good of all Tour Subjects, or to render that Reign Uneafy to You, which has been fo Happy to Tour People; the long continuance whereof, is the greateft Bleffing which we can ask of Heaven!

Baden, June 23. N. S. The Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor and the most Christian King, confer together fix times a Week, and for three or four Days past, they have been much longer than usual. They admit no other Ministers to their Meetings, but receive Proposals from them relating to the Interests of their respective Princes, and asterwards consider them at their private Conferences. The Imperial Plenipotentiaries have receiv'd Orders not to have any Communication with Monfieur de Mellarede, Minister of his Sicilian Majesty. The Prince de Chablais, Plenipotentiary of Spain, has been here for some time Incognito, and he has not yet been visited by any other Minister. The Bailiff of this City has ordered a Libel upon the last War in Switzerland, between the Cantons of Zurich and Berne, and the Abbot de St. Gall, to be burnt by the common Hangman. The Roman Catholick Cantons have defired a delay of eight Days, before they fend their Deputies to Frawensfeld, during which time they are to hold an Assentiation and themfelves at Lucerne. This has been yielded to by the Protestants, who intend in like manner to meet at Zurzach.

Hanover, July 3. N. S. His Electoral Highness is expected here in a fhort time from Pirmond. Most of the Ministers have taken the Opportunity of his absence to retire to their Country Houses. The Plenipotentiaries at the Congress of Brunswick have held no Conferences of late, for treating of a Peace in the North, and all publick Bufiness has been at a ftop there for fome time. The Counts Flemming and Wackerbart, Plenipotentiaries of King Auguflus, had promifed to come back from Drefden, but it is now thought the former will accompany the King his Master into Poland, and that the other will return to his Post at Vienna. We have receiv'd advice, that a Swedish Privateer had made a Defcent upon the Isle of Amar in Jutland, and had laid a Tax upon the Houses, carrying away four of the Principal Inhabitants as Hostages. They write from Principal Inhabitants as Hoftages. Stockholm, that the States of the Kingdom were again convened, in order to deliberate upon the Treaty of Marriage between the Princefs Ulrica Eleonora and the Hereditary Prince of Heffe Caffel. General Ducker had been very preffing with the Senate, to withdraw the Troops of Holitein out of Pomerania, that those of Sweden might be the better able to subfift there.

Paris, July 4. N. S. On the 23d past the King + returned from Rambouillet to Marli. The fame day 4 Marefchal Berwick fet out Post for Catalonia. Monfieur de Pontchartrain having refolved to pafs the reft of his Life in Retirement, hath relign'd his Employment of Chancellor of France, and Mionfieur de Voyfín, Secretary and Minister of State, is appointed to fucceed him. Some Days ago the Dutchefs of Bonillon died at Clichy near this Place, in the 64th Year of her Age. Monfieur Gollinga, one of the Ambaffadors of the States General, is gone from hence, in order to return to the Hague. On the 26th at Night a Fire broke out in the House of Monfieur d'Aguisseau, Councellor of State. This Accident has been attributed to the Negligence of his Secretary, who was unfortunately burnt in his They write from Perpignan, that the French Fed. Troops, defigned for the reduction of Barcelona, were arrived in the Province of Rouffillon, and were marching over the Mountains, in order to encamp at Figueras upon the Ter, where they are command-ed to wait for Mareschal Berwick, till whose arrival the Bombardment of Barcelons hath been difcontinued.
