the Regulating of matters between England and

Spain in America.

The Wednesday following Monsegnior Marescotti the Popes Nuncio, had his first Audience from their Majesties with less pomp and splendor then was expected, he being not pleased to spend over much time in preparation for that folemnity, which would have kept him longer then he defired from entring into the possession of the Court, which was till his Audi-

ence enjoyed by the former Nuncio.

Tuesday the 4th instant, being the Festival of Sr Charles, the Kings Patron, was observed at the Court with much solemnity, where their Majesties and the principal Nobility, were divertised with the Bull sports, which began at three in the afternoon, and continued three hours, and was managed by three Gentlemen on horseback, whereof one was in the first encounter dismounted, and obliged according to the rules of that sport, to set upon the Bull on foot with his fword, which he did with more courage then fortune, he being tost by the Bull, and forced to leave the place, much bruised, and in some danger. A 2d was likewise unhorsed, but quitted himself with more success, and came off without hurt. But the 3d received a slight hurt in his hand; the sport concluded with the death of Nine Bulls, and the general applause of the valor and dexterity of the Three Gentlemen.

On Thursday the 6th instant, being the Kings birthday, his Majesty was complimented by all the great persons of the Court, and by the Ambassadors and other publick Ministers: in the afternoon the new raised Regiment was drawn up and mustered . beforethe Palace, where Don Luis Enriquez, second-son to the Admiral of Castille, took possession of a Company refigned to him by his Brother the Conde de Melgar, who is preferred to the Com-mand of a Spanish Tertia in Milan.

The 7th instant in the evening, arrived here Segnior Garlo Contarini, Ambastador from the Republick of Venice, and on Sunday the 9th, the Marquis de Gouea, Ambassador from the Prince of Portugal came to a house provided for him near Caramanchel, about a League diffant from this place, where he intends to continue till the house which he hath taken in this City can be furnished and made fit for his

reception.

Ratisbonne-Nou. 13. The Count de Windisgratz who is to be fent Amballador from his Imperial Majesty to the French Court, is daily expected here on his way, to receive such farther instructions as the States of the Empire shall think fit to give him upon the account of the affairs of Lorrain.

The Counts of Nassau Sarbruck have lately written a Letter of thanks to the States of the Empire, for the pains they were pleased to take in giving them the puffession of the County of Saermerden, and the Castle of Hombourg, desiring they would be further pleased to give order for the payment of the moneys to the Duke of Lorrain, which were duc to him upon his furrender of Hombourg, Which was formerly mortgaged to him.

Hambourg, Nov. 17, From Stockholm we are informed, That the Baron de Bafferode, the Emperors Resident in that Court, died there the 29 past, and that his body would be in few days embalmed and fent from thence to Amfterdam; and from thence to be conveyed to the place designed for its Interment.

Their Majesties returned from the Countrey to Stockholm the twentieth past, and on the twenty seven gave audience to Monsieur Werden, Envoye Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain.

A warm report having been spred about, of some unusual effects of Witchcraft in the Province of Dalinto the matter of fact, with power to proceed to the punishment of such persons as shall be found

guilty.

From Copenhagen they write, that the Resident from the States General of the United Provinces hath had his audience from His Majesty of Danemark; in which, amongst other things, he hath defired in the name of the States his Masters, That the difference between His said Majesty, and the States General, may be amicably composed among themselves, without any appeal to the Decision of France; notwithstanding their former agreement of submitting them to the Arbitration of the Most Christian King. It is believed His Majesty will signific His Resolution in this point, by His new Resident, the Heer Justinus Hench, whom he is sending to the States in the room of the Heer Gioe, who was defigned to pals from Holland into England with the same Character.

Monsieur de Tressen, the French Ambassador in that Court, hath made a present from the King His Master, to Prince George, of a rich Sword, set with Precious Stones, to the value (as is supposed) of 16000 Crownes. He hath lately forborn to make toe frequent visits to the Court, as formerly, upon some diffatisfaction, that he was refused admittance into the Kings Cabinet, where he was entring, without

first demanding audience.

Paris, Nov. 26. On Saturday next the King is expected here, and on the Monday following, his Ex-cellency the Heer de Groot, Ambastador Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, may have his second Audience, and his most Christian Majesties answer to the many complaints he has made of the great impositions upon the Merchandises and Manusactures of Holland.

Yesterday the Duke de Montauzier conducted the Dauphin to the Old Louvre, from whence he is this day to be removed by Madam ta Mareshalle de la Motte, to an apartment prepared for him in the
