Westminster, July 9.

HER Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in Her Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the Publick Bills following, *viz.*

An Act for laying additional Duties on Soap and Paper, and upon certain Linnens, Silks, Callicoes and Stuffs, and upon Sarch and Exported Coals, and upon Stamp Vellum, Parchment and Paper, for raising 1,400,000 l. by Way of a Lottery, for Her Majesty's Supply; and for Allowances on Exporting Made Wares of Leather, Sheep Skins and Lamb Skins; and for Distribution of 4000 l. due to the Officers and Seamen for Gun-Money; and to adjust the Property of Tickets in former Lotteries; and touching certain Shares of Stock in the Capital of the South-Sea Company; and for Appropriating the Moneys granted to Her Majesty.

An Act for raising the Militia for the Year 1714. altho' the Months Pay formerly Advanced be not repaid; and for rectifying a Mistake in an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, Intituled, An Act for the Regulating the Forces to be continued in Her Majesty's Service, and for Payment of the said Forces and their Quarters.

An Act for the better Maintenance of Curates within the Church of England, and for

preventing any Ecclesiastical Persons from Buying the next Avoidance of any Church Preferment.

An Act to prevent the Lifting Her Majesty's Subjects to serve as Solders without Her Majesty's License.

An Act for rendering more Effectual an Act made in the Third Year of the Reign of King James the First, Intituled, An Act to prevent and avoid Dangers which may grow by Popish Recusants; and also of one other Act made in the First Year of the Reign of their late Majesty's King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act to Vest in the two Universities the Presentations of Benefices belonging to Papists, and for Vesting in the Lords of Justiciary, Power to inflict the same Punishments against Jesuits, Priests, and other Trafficking Papists which the Privy Council of Scotland was Impowered to do, by an Act passed in the Parliament of Scotland, Intituled, An Act for preventing the Growth of Popery.

An Act for providing a publick Reward for such Person or Persons as shall discover the Longitude at Sea.

An Act for reducing the Laws relating to Rogues, Vagabonds, Sturdy Beggars and Vagrants into one Act of Parliament; and for the more effectual Punishing such Rogues, Vagabonds, Sturdy Beggars and Vagrants, and sending them whether they ought to be sent.

An Act to reduce the Rate of Interest, without any Prejudice to Parliamentary Securities.

An Act to Discharge and Acquit the Commissioners of Equivalent for the Sum of Three hundred eighty one thousand five hundred and nine Pounds, fifteen Shillings, ten Pence Half-penny, by them duly Issued out of the Sum of Three hundred ninety eight thousand eighty five Pounds, ten Shillings, which they received.

An Act for the speedy and effectual preserving the Navigation of the River of Thames; by stopping the Breach in the Leods of Havering

veringh and Dagenham in the County of Essex, and for ascertaining the Coal-Measure.

An Act to Explain and make more Effectual an Act passed in the Tenth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, for preventing Abuses in making Linnen Cloth, and regulating the Lengths and Breadths, and equal Sorting of Yarn in each Piece in Scotland, and for Whitening the same.

An Act for the Preserving all such Ships and Goods thereof which shall happen to be forced on Shoar, or Stranded upon the Coasts of this Kingdom, or any other of Her Majesty's Dominions.

An Act to Explain a Clause in an Act of Parliament of the Tenth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, for laying several Duties upon all Soap and Paper made in Great Britain, or Imported into the same; and upon chequered and striped Linnen Imported; and upon certain Silks, Callicoes, Linnens and Stuffs printed, painted or stained; and upon several kinds of Stamp Vellum, Parchment and Paper; and upon certain printed Pamphlets and Advertisements, for raising the Sum of 1,800,000 l. by way of a Lottery, and for other Purposes in the said Act mentioned, so far as the said Act relates to Lawns, Canvas, Buckrams, Barinus and Silesia Neckcloths.

An Act to explain part of an Act made in the Seventh Year of Her Majesty's Reign, for enlarging the Capital Stock of the Bank of England, and for raising a further Supply to Her Majesty for the Service of the Year 1709, so far as the same relates to Unwrought Inle Imported into this Kingdom.

An Act to continue an Act of the Sixth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, Intituled, An Act to enable Her Majesty to make Leases and Copies of Offices, Lands and Hereditaments, parcel of Her Duchy of Cornwall, or annexed to the same.

And to several Private Bills.

After which Her Majesty made the following most Gracious Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Progress which has been made in Publick Business, and the Season of the Year, render it both Conve-

nient and Necessary, that I should put an End to this Session.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I Return you hearty Thanks for all your good Services to Me and to your Country, and particularly for the Supplies you have given Me, as well to Defray the Expences of the Current Year, as towards the Discharge of the National Debts.

In our present Circumstances, it could not be expected, that a full Provision should be made on both these Heads.

What you have granted, shall be laid out with the best Husbandry, and to the greatest Advantage.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I hope early in the Winter to Meet you again, and to find you in such a Temper, as is Necessary, for the real Improvement of Our Commerte, and of all the other Advantages of Peace.

My Chief Concern is to Preserve to you, and to your Posterity, Our Holy Religion, and the Liberty of My Subjects; and to Secure the present and future Tranquillity of My Kingdoms. But, I must tell you plainly, That these desirable Ends can never be Attain'd, unless you bring the same Dispositions on your Parts; unless all groundless Jealousies; which create and foment Divisions among you, be laid Aside; and unless you shew, the same Regard, for My Just Prerogative, and for the Honour of My Government, as I have always expressed for the Rights of My People.

And then the Parliament was Prorogued to Tuesday the Tenth Day of August next.

Hamburgh, July 13. N. S. On the 7th Instant the King of Denmark arrived at Pinneburg, three German Miles from hence, and the next Day our Magistrates sent Deputies to Compliment him in their Name

Name, and to make him a Present on the Part of this City. Monsieur Pouillon, Minister of France, has likewise been to wait upon his Majesty, who continued three Days at that Place, and set out on the 10th for Bremen. The Dutch Resident here, hath sent his Secretary to Monsieur Ducker at Straisund, in pursuance of the Orders he received from the States General, his Masters, to demand the Vessels which have been taken from their Subjects by the Swedish Privateers. The King of Denmark hath given Directions to have thirteen large Men of War fitted out at Copenhagen with all possible Expedition. This Squadron is to join the seven Danish Ships that are now at Bornholm, in order to Attack the Swedish Fleet, and to force them from their advantageous Post at Hungo Udda, which will very much promote the Czar's Design on the other side of the Kingdom. Upon the last Memorial presented by the Ministers of Sweden to the Diet of Aufbourg, the Electoral College hath resolved to desire the Emperor, that all Affairs relating to the Swedish Provinces in Germany, may be treated of at the Congress of Brunswick. The College of Princes of the Empire hath only agreed to intreat his Imperial Majesty to take them into his own Consideration.

Hanover, July 13. N. S. On the 11th the Court returned from Pirmond to Herenhausen, where his Electoral Highness intends to continue during the rest of the Summer. Monsieur Verpope is sent into Holstein, with a Compliment from the Elector to his Danish Majesty. The Sieurs Rosenkrantz and Viberg, Plenipotentiaries of Denmark at the Congress of Brunswick, are likewise gone from hence, in order to meet the King their Master in Holstein. Monsieur Busch, Chamberlain of this Court, is appointed to notify the Death of the Electress Dowager to the Duke of Wolfenbuttel, who is lately returned into his own Dominions from Holland. They write from Swerin, That the Duke of Mecklenbourg had ordered a Compensation to be made of the Damage which had been done to his Country by the Troops of the Princes engaged in the

War of the North. It appeared that his own and his Subjects Losses amounted to One Million and six hundred thousand Florins; for which the Duke intends to demand a Recompence at the Congress of Brunswick. We have receiv'd advice, that the Swedish and Muscovite Fleets were so near one another on the Coasts of Revel, that it was thought they could hardly avoid coming to an Engagement.

Paris, July 14. N. S. Some Persons of the Earl of Peterborough's Retinue are already come to this Place, and his Excellency is expected here himself in a short time from Italy. We are informed, that the Queen Dowager of Poland is arrived at Marseilles, from whence she intends to set out soon for Blois, where the King has ordered a Palace to be prepared for her Reception. Letters from Spain bring an account, that the Inhabitants of Barcelona appeared very much dejected upon the News of Marechal Berwick's approach with the French Troops. All matters were preparing to Attack the Place in Form, immediately after his arrival. The Deserters reported, that there were not above Three thousand Men of regular Troops, remaining in the Town, and that a great part of them only waited for an opportunity to withdraw from thence. Monsieur Orry had left the Army, and was upon his way to Madrid, when he received an Express from Court with Orders to return to the Camp.

Hague, July 17. N. S. The Earl of Clarendon, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of Brunswick, arrived here on the 15th, and intends in a Day or two to pursue his Journey to Hanover. Monsieur Van den Bergh, Deputy of the States General at Brussels, is come hither from thence. The Emperor has appointed Count Koningseck to be his Plenipotentiary to Treat upon the Subject of the Barrier with the States General. Letters from Baden bring an account, That the Conferences between the Ministers of his Imperial Majesty, and those of France, were carried on with so much Success, that it was believed the Treaty would be concluded before the end of this Month.
