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Warsaw, July 14. N. S.

Several of the Senators are gone to meet King Augustus at Reizen. Count Denhoff, Chancellor of Lithuania, is arrived here with an Order from his Majesty to General Janus, to send eight Saxon Regiments of Horse and six of Foot from hence into their own Country. It is hoped these Directions will quiet the Minds of the Nobility and People, who have made great Complaints of the long continuance of these Troops in the Kingdom, and the excessive Contributions they were forced to pay for their Subsistence. A Turkish Minister is expected here very soon, to settle some Points in the Treaty between the Ottoman Port and and this Republick, that could not be adjusted with the Palatin of Mazovia, our Ambassador at Constantinople. We are informed, that the Muscovite Troops have quitted their Camp near Riga, and are marching towards the Ducal Prussia. They write from Caminic, that the Turks had augmented the Garrison of Chocim to Fifteen thousand Men. The Fortifications of that Place were carried on with great diligence, and it was thought they would be finish'd in a short time. The Seraskder Bacha had likewise caused Three hundred new Houses to be built there, and had promised great Privileges to all Tradesmen that would settle in the Town.

Vienna, July 18. N. S. The Emperor hath named Count Koningseck for his Ambassador to the Court of France, but he is to go first into Holland, in order to Treat upon the Subject of the Barrier with the Deputies of the States General. It is said Prince Eugene will set out for the Congress of Baden, as soon as he hath settled some Affairs with Baron Hundenim, the Elector Palatin's Minister, who arrived here on the 15th Instant. His Imperial Majesty hath sent to all the Princes of the Empire to come and receive Investiture of their respective Dominions. Prince Emanuel of Savoy is gone Post to Bohemia, and the Prince of Lichtenstein is returned hither from Moravia. It is said the Emperor will set out on the 20th of next Month for Presbourg, in order to put an End to the Diet of Hungary, and that the Empress will go about the same time to drink the Waters at Baden. A great quantity of Cannon, Mortars, and other Warlike Ammunition hath been lately embark'd on the Danube to supply the Frontier Places of Germany, where they were wanted. We have receiv'd an account from Transilvania, that the Workmen employed in the Fortifications of Weissenbourg had found several antient Medals and Coins of Gold, Silver and Brass, as they were digging the Ground. They write from Prague, that the violent Rains and Storms had done a great deal of Mischief in the Country thereabouts, especially in the District of Hoisback, where fifteen Houses in one Village, were blown down to the Ground, and fifty Persons killed by the Ruins. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, That the King of Sweden continued still at Demir Tocca, but that he was resolv'd to set out from thence about the middle of next Month, for which purpose he only waited for a Passport from the Ottoman Port, and it was said he would return home through the Emperor's Hereditary Countries.

Dresden, July 24. N. S. We are informed that King Augustus, accompanied by several of his Ministers, arrived on the 18th at Reizen in Great Poland. He was met there by the Great Chancellor,

and his Majesty hath since sent for several other Polish Senators, in order to hold a great Council upon the present situation of his Affairs, and particularly in relation to the Answer it may be proper to give the Tartarian Envoy, who is already on his way to Reizen. The Prussian Forces are assembled at Landsberg, where they wait for Orders from the King their Master. The Saxon Troops in Poland have built a new Bridge of Boats upon the Vistula near Thorn, in order to join those that are upon their return from Lithuania. Count Wackerbaert is gone from hence to the Court of Vienna, where he is to reside on the Part of his Majesty. Baron Goertz, Minister of Holstein, is expected in a Day or two at Leipzick from Berlin.

Paris, July 28. N. S. His Majesty hath appointed Monsieur Fagon, Master of the Requests, to be Intendant of the Finances, in the room of Monsieur de Monbuisson, who hath resigned that Employment upon account of his ill Health. The Algerines have sent hither Five and twenty Knights of Malta, whom they had taken Prisoners; upon which, the King hath ordered the Slaves of that Nation at Mariseilles to be likewise set at liberty. The Inhabitants of St. Lewis, and Notre Dame, have engaged to pay the Sum of Two hundred thousand Livres for a Bridge, which is to be built between those two Islands. They write from Catalonia, that on the 9th Instant, the Marquis d'Alligre discover'd a Fleet, consisting of Forty five Sail, laden with Ammunition and Provisions of all kinds, coming from Majorca: Whereupon he immediately prepared to Attack them, and after an Engagement that lasted several Hours, he took Twenty Vessels, sunk one, and put the rest to flight. Marschal Berwick arrived on the 9th at the Camp. On the 12th the Trenches were opened before Barcelona, and carried the same Night within One hundred Fathom of the advanc'd Works. The next Day the Besieg'd made two Salleys, but were repulsed each time with considerable Loss. The same Letters add, that the Spanish Infantry had been sent away, the Horse with the Walloons, the French Troops being thought sufficient to carry on the Siege.

Hague, July 31. N. S. The States of Holland and West-Friesland, before their Separation, order'd an Edict to be publish'd, forbidding, under very severe Penalties, the bringing of Cattle out of the Province of Friesland, where the Infection is very much encreas'd of late. Yesterday the Earl of Strafford was in Conference with the Great Pensionary Heinsius, The Squadron of Men of War designed for the security of the Dutch Trade in the Baltick, is preparing with all possible Expedition. Advice has been brought to Amsterdam, that Eighteen East India Ships were come within sight of the Texel. We are informed, that Prince Eugene and Marschal Villars will go to the Congress of Baden about the middle of next Month, in order to sign the Treaty in Latin, that was signed before in French at Rastad, both Parties being resolv'd not to consent to any Alterations.

Whitehall, July 24. Her Majesty hath been pleas'd to appoint the Right Hon. Francis Lord Guilford, Sir Philip Meadows, Senior, Kt. Arthur Moore, Esq; Sir John Hinde Cotton, Bar. John Sharp, Samuel Pytts, and Thomas Vernon, Esqrs; to be Her Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.
