Dublin-Castle, August 7.

Yesterday in the Afternoon the Lords Justices received by Express a Letter from the Lords of the most Honourable the Privy Council of Great Britain, with an account of Her late Majesty's Death, and Directions for Proclaiming the King. Upon the receipt of this Letter their Excellencies and the Council met immediately, and signed a Proclamation, pursuant to that which had been issued to the same Effect in Great Britain; and about Seven of the Clock the same Evening the Lords Justices, and all the Lords Spiritual and Temporal now in Town, with the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, and other Officers attending the State, went through the City and Proclaimed His Majesty at the usual Places with great Solemnity. After which they returned to the Castle, and the great Guns were fired three Rounds, which were answered by Volleys of Small Shot from the Regiments drawn up in College-Green: And in the Evening there were Bonfires throughout the whole City.

The Lords Justices and Council have sent Directions for Proclaiming His Majesty in all the Cities and Towns of this Kingdom, and have also issued a Proclamation for Disarming the Papists, and Seizing their Horses.

Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God to Call to His Mercy Our late Sovereign Lady Queen Anne, of Blessed Memory, by whose Decease the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France and Ireland, are Solely and Rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George, Eleſtor of Brunſwick-Lunen- burg: We the Lords Justices of this Kingdom, and several of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being Assisted with those of Her late Majesty's Privy-Council, and Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of Dublin, do, with one full Voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince George, Eleſtor of Brunſwick-Lunen- burg, is now, by the Death of Our late Sovereign, of Happy Memory, become Our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lord, George, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. To whom We do Acknowledge all Faith and constant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection: Beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do Reign, to Bless the Royal King George with Long and Happy Tears to Reign over Us. And We do by this Our Royal Proclamation think fit to give publick Notice hereof to all His Majesty's Subjects, and do require all Mayors, Sheriffs, and other His Majesty's Officers, to cause the same to be Proclaimed in all the Cities and Towns Corporate, and Market Towns in this Kingdom, and all Officers both Civil and Military, and other His Majesty's

Subjects, are to be Assisting in the Performance hereof, with all due Solemnity.

God save the KING.

By the Lords Justices and Council of Ireland,

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Tho. Armagh, Con. Phipps, Canc.

Whereas by the Decease of our late Sovereign Lady Queen Anne, of Blessed Memory, the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France and Ireland, are Solely and Rightfully come to Our Sovereign Lord, George, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. For preventing Dangers that may arise at this Juncture from Papists or other Persons disaffected to His Majesty's Government, and for preserving the publick Peace of this Kingdom, We the Lords Justices and Council, do hereby strictly Charge and Require all Papists Licensed to keep and wear Arms, forthwith to deliver up their respective Arms, and all Ammunition in their Possession, to the next Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate where such Persons do reside, who are hereby required to give a Receipt for the said Arms and Ammunition, and to keep the same till further Ord.r.

And We do hereby strictly Command and Require all Justices of the Peace, and other Officers in this Kingdom, within their several Jurisdictions to Search for, Take and Seize all Arms, Armour and Ammunition of what kind soever which shall be found in the Possession of all Papists not Licensed, and all reputed Papists and other Persons suspected to be Disaffected to His Majesty's Government, or in the Possession of any other Person or Persons in Trust for them, or any or either of them, and to return a true and particular Account thereof to the Clerk of the Council, or his Deputy, of such Arms as they shall Seize pursuant to this Proclamation, with the Names of the Persons in whose Custody or Power they shall find such Arms, Armour and Ammunition. And if any Papist or Papists, or other suspected Person or Persons, shall presume to Carry or Keep Arms, Armour or Ammunition, contrary to the intent and meaning of this Our Proclamation, We do hereby Will and Require all Justices of the Peace and other Magistrates, to proceed against all such Offender and Offenders, and to put the Law in due and strict Execution.

And We further Charge, Command and Require all Justices of the Peace, and other Chief Officers and Magistrates, within their several Jurisdictions, to seize and take all serviceable Horses, Geldings, and Mares that shall be found in the Possession of any Papist, reputed Papist, or suspected Person, or in

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the Possession of any other Person or Persons in Trust for any Papist, reputed Papist, or suspected Person, and the same to keep according to Law; and strictly to Examine upon Oath all and every Person and Persons whom they shall suspect to conceal any Arms, Armour or Ammunition, Horses, Mares or Geldings belonging to any Papist, reputed Papist, or suspected Person, and to do all and every thing that is further required in and by the Laws of this Kingdom for the Punishment of such who shall Conceal the same.

God save the KING.

Berlin, August 14. N. S. Some Days ago the King went to Potsdam, and is expected again very soon at this Place. The four Squadrons of Gens d'Armes commanded by General Nazmer being completed, his Majesty intends to Review them on the 20th Instant at Landsberg, and from thence he will pursue his Journey to Prussia. On the 10th of the next Month, the States of that Country are to take the Oath of Allegiance at Koningsberg. The King hath commanded the Ministers of State not to hold any Correspondence with the Foreign Ministers, to whom this Order is to be communicated by the Marshal of the Court; and he is directed to acquaint them at the same time, That when they have any Proposal to make, they may either do it in Writing, or desire a Conference with the King's Ministers, appointed to take care of Foreign Affairs: His Majesty hath sent Monsieur Knyphausen to the Court of Denmark. Some Days ago an Edict was published, forbidding all Persons, of what Quality soever, to play at certain Games, under very severe Penalties.

Hamburg, August 17. N. S. Baron Knyphausen, Minister of Prussia to the Court of Denmark, passed through this Place Yesterday, in his Way to Holstein. His Danish Majesty hath consented that Monsieur Pouffin, Envoy of France to the Circle of Lower Saxony, may continue to send his own Letters by the way of Copenhagen to Stockholm. The Landgrave of Hesse Cassel is arrived at Rheinfels, where he hath Review'd some of his Troops which are ordered to be in a Readiness to March. It hath been reported, that they are designed for Pomerania; upon which, his Prussian Majesty hath commanded Lieutenant General Mutzmar not to suffer them to pass through his Dominions. King Stanislaus continues still at Deux Ponts, and is maintained out of the Revenues of that Dutchy. We are informed that the Conferences between the Imperial and French Ministers at the Congress of Baden have been carried on with so much Success, that the Treaty of Peace will be Signed immediately after the arrival of Prince Eugene and Marechal Villars.

Hague, August 21. N. N. The Sieur Van Borselle, Envoy Extraordinary of this Republick to the Court of Great Britain, having received his Instructions, and a Letter from the States General to the Lords Justices, went from hence on the 18th to Rotterdam, in order to Embark for England. The same Day the Earl of Strafford notified to the Great Pensionary the Death of the late Queen, and the Accession of his present Majesty to the Crown of Great Britain. Yesterday his Excellency made the same Notification to the President of the Assembly of the States General; upon which, he hath receiv'd the usual Visits and Compliments of Condolence and Congratulation from the President and Chief Members of this Republick. Last Night the Earl of Strafford received two Expresses by his Majesty's Messengers, one from Hanover with a Letter

from the King, directing him to continue to take care of his Majesty's Affairs at this Place. The other Messenger came from London, and his Excellency immediately sent him forward with some Dispatches for the King. The Duke d'Osuna, one of the Plenipotentiaries of Spain, is come hither from Utrecht; the Marquis de Monteleone, and the Ministers of Portugal are likewise expected here to Morrow. We are inform'd that an Express was arriv'd at Paris, with his Catholick Majesty's Ratification of the Treaty of Peace with this Republick, but that it was sent back to Madrid upon Account of some Alterations which had been made in the Treaty by that Court.
