

# The London Gazette.

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Westminster, August 21.

**T**HIS Day the Lords Justices, appointed to Administer the Government till the arrival of His Majesty, came to the House of Peers, and sent a Message to the Commons by Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black-Rod, requiring their Attendance. The Commons went up accordingly, and the Lords Justices gave the Royal Assent to Three Publick Bills, viz.

*An Act for the better Support of His Majesty's Household, and of the Honour and Dignity of the Crown of Great Britain.*

*An Act for rectifying Mistakes in the Names of the Commissioners for the Land-Tax for the Year One thousand seven hundred and fourteen; And for raising so much as is wanting to make up the Sum of Fourteen hundred thousand Pounds, intended to be raised by a Lottery for the Publick Service in the said Year.*

*An Act to enable Persons now residing in Great Britain, to take the Oaths, and do all other Acts in Great Britain, requisite to qualify themselves to continue their respective Places, Offices and Employments, in Ireland.*

After which the Lord Chancellor, being One of the Lords Justices, in their Name made the following Speech to both Houses of Parliament.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

**W**E cannot but express our greatest Satisfaction, and, in His Majesty's Name, return you Thanks, for the convincing Proofs which you have given, in this Session, of your Duty and Affection to His Majesty, and of your Zeal for his Government.

We must particularly thank you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, for the Aids which you have granted to His Majesty for the better Support of the Honour of the Crown, and for preventing any Disappointment in the Supplies given in the last Session for the Service of this Year. You may be assured, that the Unanimity, the Chearfulness, and the Dispatch with which you have proceeded in Granting these Aids, will render them yet more acceptable to His Majesty. And you may depend upon our making a faithful Representation thereof to Him.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

All necessary Business being now happily concluded, it will be proper for us to put a speedy End to this Session. We think fit, at present, in His Majesty's Name, to desire you forthwith respectively to Adjourn your selves until Wednesday next.

St. James's, August 21. The following Address was delivered to the Lord's Justices by the Right Hon. the Earl of Carlisle, in order to be laid before His Majesty.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Gentlemen of the Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, with several of the Clergy, and other Gentlemen

of the County of Cumberland, at the Assizes held at the City of Carlisle, Aug. 10. 1714.

**W**E Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly crave Leave to represent to Your Sacred Majesty, the sensible Relief we find under the great Loss of our late Excellent Queen, by the happy and peaceful Accession of Your Majesty to Your Throne of Great Britain; which gives us the unspeakable Comfort and Assurance of having our Religion, Laws and Liberties, as now Establish'd, secur'd to us and our Posterity.

We thankfully adore the Divine Goodness, for this Seasonable Mercy; beseeching him, by whom Kings Reign, to multiply his Blessings, by a long Continuance of Your Majesty's Life and Reign, and an Uninterrupted Succession of Your Royal Heirs to the Imperial Crown of this Kingdom, so long as Time shall last.

Vienna, August 11. N. S. On the 7th Instant their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by several of the Ministers, went from hence to Newstad, where it is said they will continue till near the time of their departure to Presbourg. Some Days ago Count Miral, Colonel of the Regiment of Falkenstein, died here in the 53d Year of his Age. Prince Eugene is preparing to set out very soon for Baden, where Marschal Villars is likewise expected in a short time, and it is thought the Treaty of Peace between the Empire and France, will be Sign'd immediately after their arrival at the Congress. The Imperial Troops in Bavaria are ordered to be in a readiness to leave that Country within a Month. Count Reventlau is arrived here with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary of the Duke of Holstein Gottorp. Baron Spar, who came lately from Berlin, is gone to Baden, in order to recommend the Interests of the King of Sweden, his Master, to the Ministers at that Place. His Imperial Majesty hath held several Councils upon the Affairs of the North, but as yet there is very little appearance of putting an End to the War there, unless the Swedish Ministers will recede from some Demands they have hitherto made. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that the Grand Signior had at last sent the King of Sweden the Passports he desired, and that his Majesty was preparing to set out from Demotica, in order to return through the Emperor's Hereditary Countries into his own Dominions. The Turks continued to express great Uneasiness at the Imperial Troops incamping in Hungary, and they were resolv'd to send an Ambassador to this Place, in order to be better informed of the Designs of our Court.

Madrid, August 13. N. S. A Treaty of Marriage is concluded between his Catholick Majesty and the Princess of Parma, and it is said the Marquis del Balbaces, who is now at Genoa, will be appointed to Conduct the new Queen into this Kingdom. The Governor of Cadiz, by the King's Order, having demanded a Donative of all Merchants who have Houses and Families in that City, Sir Martin Westcombe, his Britanick Majesty's Consul there, hath presented a Memorial, desiring a Revocation of those Orders, as far as they relate to the Sub-  
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of Great Britain. Mr. Burch, the British Secretary residing at this Place, hath delivered in another Memorial to the same Effect. These Representations have been referred by his Catholic Majesty to the Junto, and it is hoped the Donative demanded of the Merchants of that Nation will not be insisted upon. Letters from the Camp bring an account, that the Siege of Barcelona was carried on with great Vigour, notwithstanding which the Deserters, who came daily out of the Town, reported, that the Inhabitants were resolved to defend themselves to the utmost Extremity, and were making new Intrenchments, which they hoped to perfect in short time.

*Hague, August 28. N. S.* On the 25th Monsieur de Chateaufneuf, Ambassador of France, by Order of his Court, made the Earl of Strafford the usual Compliments of Condolence upon the Death of the late Queen, of Blessed Memory, as also those of Congratulation upon His present Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne. This Morning his Excellency received a Letter from the King by a Messenger, who brings advice, that part of His Majesty's Equipage was to set out this Day, the remainder three Days hence, and that the King himself intended to begin his Journey, accompanied by the Prince, on Saturday or Sunday next. The Deputies named by the States-General to receive the King on the Frontiers of their Dominions, went Yesterday to Deventer, and those appointed by the States of Holland to meet his Majesty at his Entrance into this Province, are to go towards the middle of this Week for that purpose to Woerden. Count Tarouca, one of the King of Portugal's Ministers, is returned to Utrecht, after having been several times in Conference with the Earl of Strafford and the Plenipotentiaries of his Catholic Majesty, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace still depending between the Crowns of Spain and Portugal.
