Westminster, August 21.

HIS Day the Lords Juffices, appointed to Administer the Government till the arrival of His Majelty, came to the House of Peers, and fent a Message to the Commons by Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black-Rod, requi-ring their Attendance. The Commons went up accordingly, and the Lords Justices gave the Royal Affent to Three Publick Bills, viz.

An A& for the better Support of His Majesty's Houshold, and of the Honour and Dignity of the Crown of Great Britain.

An All for relifying Mistakes in the Names of the Commissioners for the Land-Tax for the Year One thousand seven hundred and fourteen; And for raifing fo much as is wanting to make up the Sum of Fourteen bundred thousand Pounds, intended to be raifed by a Lottery for the Publick Service in the faid Ýcar.

An A& to enable Perfons now refiding in Great Britain, to take the Oaths, and do all other Alts in Great Britain, requisite to qualifie themselves to continue their respective Places, Offices and Employments, in Ireland.

After which the Lord Chancellor, being One of the Lords Justices, in their Name made the following Speech to both Houses of Parliament.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Wy Lords and Gentlemen, W E cannot but express our greatest Satisfa-thion, and, in His Majesty's Name, return you Thanks, for the convincing Proofs which you have given, in this Session, of your Duty and Af-fedion to His Majesty, and of your Zeal for his Gonernment

We must particularly thank you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, for the Aids which you have segranted to His Majesty for the better Support of the Honour of the Crown, and for preventing any Different in the Supplies given in the lat the Honour of the Crown, and for preventing any Disappointment in the Supplies given in the last Selfion for the Service of this Year. You may be af-fured, that the Unanimity, the Chearfulness, and the Dispatch with which you have proceeded in Granting these Aids, will render them yet more acceptable to His Majesty. And you may depend upon our making a faithful Representation thereof to Him.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

All necessary Basiness being now bappily concluded, it will be proper for us to put a speedy End to this Session. We think fit, at present, in His Ma-jesty's Name, to desire you forthwith respectively to Adjourn your selves until Wednesday next.

WE Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly craws Leave to support to support humbly crave Leave to represent to Tour Sacred Majesty, the sensible Relief we find under the great Loss of our late Excellent Queen, by the happy and peaceful Accession of Tour Majesty to Your Throne of Great Britain; which gives us the unspeakable comfort and Alfurance of baving our Religion, Laws and Liberties, as now Establish'd, secur'd to us and our Posterity.

We thankfully adore the Divine Goodnefs, for this Seafonable Mercy; befeeching him, by whom Kings Reign, to multiply bis Rleffings, by a long Conti-nuance of Your Majesty's Life and Reign, and an Uninterrupted Succession of Your Royal Heirs to the Imperial Crown of this Kingdom, jo long as Time fall last.

Vienna, August 11. N.S. On the 7th Instant their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by several of the Ministers, went from hence to Newstad, where the Miniters, went from hence to Rewitad, where it is faid they will continue till near the time of their departure to Presbourg. Some Days ago Count Miral, Colonel of the Regiment of Falkenstein, died here in the 53d Year of his Age. Prince Eu-gene is preparing to set out very soon for Baden, where Mareschal Villars is likewise expected in a forst time and it is thought the Treasur of Bases fhort time, and it is thought the Treaty of Peace between the Empire and France, will be Sign'd immediately after their arrival at the Congress. The Imperial Troops in Bavaria are ordered to be in a readine's to leave that Country within a Month. Count Reventlau is arrived here with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary of the Duke of Hol-flein Gottorp. Baron Spar, who came lately from Berlin, is gone to Baden, in order to recommend the Interests of the King of Sweden, his Master, to the Ministers at that Place. His Imperial Majesty hath held feveral Councils upon the Affairs of the North, but as yet there is very little appearance of putting an End to the War there, unlefs the Swedifh Ministers will recede from some Demands they have hitherto made. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that the Grand Signior had at last fent the King of Sweden the Paffports he defired, and that his Majesty was preparing to set out from De-motica, in order to return through the Emperor's Hereditary Countries into his own Dominions. The Turks continued to express great Uneafiness at the Imperial Troops incamping in Hungary, and they were refolv'd to fend an Ambaffador to this Place, in order to be better informed of the Defigns of our Court.

Madrid, August 13. N. S. A Treaty of Marriage is concluded between his Catholick Majefty and the Princess of Parma, and it is said the Marquis del Balbaces, who is now at Genoa, will be appointed to Conduct the new Queen into this Kingdom. The Governor of Cadiz, by the King's Order, having demanded a Donative of all Merchants who have Houses and Families in that City, Sir Martin Westcombe, his Britanick Majesty's Conful there, men of the Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, hath presented a Memorial, defiring a Revocation with feveral of the Clergy, and other Gentlemen of those Orders, as far as they relate to the Subiefts

JoAs of Great Britain. Mr. Burch, the British Se-A de Jocs of Great Britain. Wir. Burch, the Britin Se-ter ary refiding at this Place, hath delivered in another Memorial to the fame Effect. These Re-presentations have been referred by his Catholick Adjesty to the Junto, and it is hoped the Donative commanded of the Merchants of that Nation will not be infilted upon. Letters from the Camp bring an account, that the Siege of Barcelona was carried on

with great Vigour, notwithstanding which the De-ferters, who came daily out of the Town, reported, that the Inhabitants were refolved to defend themfelves to the utinoft Extremity, and were making new Intrenchments, which they hoped to perfect in fhort time.

Hague, August 28. N. S. On the 25th Monsteur de Chateauneuf, Ambassador of France, by Order of his Court, made the Earl of Strafford the ulual Compliments of Condoleance upon the Death of the late Queen, of Bleffed Memory, as also those of Congratulation upon His present Majesty's happy Accession to the I hrone. This Morning his Excellency received a Letter from the King by a Meffenger, who brings advice, that part of His Majefty's Equipage was to fet out this Day, the remainder three Days hence, and that the King himself in-tended to begin his Journey, accompanied by the Prince, on Saturday or Sunday next. The Deputies named by the States-General to receive the King on the Frontiers of their Dominions, went Yesterday to Deventer, and those appointed by the States of Holland to meet his Majefty at his Entrance into this Province, are to go towards the middle of this Week for that purpose to Woerden. Count Tarouca, one of the King of Portugal's Ministers, is returned to Utrecht, after having been feveral times in Conference with the Earl of Strafford and the Plenipotentiaries of his Catholick Majelty, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace fiild depending between the Crowns of Spain and Portugal.
