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Lisbon, August 21. N. S.

THE Newcastle Man of War, commanded by Captain Leake, is arrived here from the Streights, and will set sail in a few Days for Great Britain. The Abbot de Mornay, Ambassador of France, hath already had a private Audience of the King and Queen. This Day the Court began to entertain his Excellency, and on the 24th he is to make his Publick Entry into the City. The young Prince is to be Baptized on the 27th, and Preparations are making here for a Bull Feast, which is to last five Days upon that Occasion. The Catalans have bought a Merchant Ship of eighteen Guns in this River, and it is said she will very soon be ready to sail with Provisions for the Island of Majorca. We have received advice from Gibraltar, that the Emperor of Morocco had agreed to a Treaty of Peace with Great Britain, and had promised to set the Slaves of that Nation at liberty: Whereupon the Ruby and the Port-Mahon were gone to Tetuan to receive them on Board. The same advices add, that the Emperor had resolved to send an Ambassador to the Court of Great Britain.

Warsaw, August 21. N. S. The Primate of the Kingdom is still very pressing with King Augustus to convene the great Council of Senators at this Place, but it is thought his Instances will have no effect, and that his Majesty will return directly from Reizen into Saxony, without holding a Diet, which would very much encrease the Discontents of the Nobility and People, who have long expected him here with great impatience. Six Regiments of Saxon Troops are already upon their march towards their own Country; and we are informed that others are coming from Lithuania, in order to pass the Vistula. We have received Advice, that Colonel la Mar was arrived at Leopold in his way to Reizen, where he was going to assure King Augustus, on the part of the Han of Tartary and the Seraskier of Bender, that they were firmly resolved to maintain a good Correspondence with his Majesty, and to give him no sort of Disturbance by their Neighbourhood. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that great Preparations for War were making there both by Sea and Land. It was reported that the Grand

Signior would remove very soon to Adrianople. The Ottoman Port had consented to let the King of Sweden return into his own Dominions which ever way his Majesty pleased to take.

Reizen, August 26. N. S. Some Days ago General Janus came hither from Warsaw, and Count Werthern from Saxony. Since their arrival the Ministers of King Augustus have held several Conferences upon the present Situation of his Majesty's Affairs, particularly in relation to the manner of disposing of the Saxon Troops in this Kingdom. It is said, Sixteen Regiments will be ordered to return home, and that the rest are to remain here under such a Regulation, as will give no sort of uneasiness to the People of the Country. The Tartarian Envoy hath had his Audience of Leave, and intends to set out very soon from hence, in order to give the Han his Master an account of his Negotiations at this Court. We have receiv'd Advice from Caminiec, that the Turks had considerably encreased their Army on the Frontiers, and that the last Body of Men which came from Albania and Bulgaria was composed of the best of their Troops.

Hamburgh, August 31. N. S. We are informed, that Baron Spar is arrived at Baden, and hath presented a Memorial to the Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor, and the most Christian King desiring that the King of Sweden, his Master, may be restored to his Dominions in Germany, in pursuance of the Treaty of Westphalia. The Ministers of France have returned him a favourable Answer, but those of his Imperial Majesty acquainted him, that they were assembled at that Place only to Treat of a Peace between the Empire and France, that the Emperor had conven'd the Congress of Brunswick to establish the Repose of the North, and as the Allies had no Ministers at Baden, it would require too much time to invite them thither; for which Reasons they would not enter into any Negotiation upon that Subject. The Troops of Hesse Cassel that were assembled some time ago near Reinfels, have received Orders to return to their former Quarters. A Train of Artillery is preparing at Copenhagen with all possible Diligence, in order to be embark'd on Board the Squadron which is to join the Muscovite Fleet in the Baltick. Another Battalion of Prussian



ian Troops is lately entred into Stetin by a Stratagem of Monsieur Borce, Cotumandant, of that Nation, by which means the King of Prussia's Garrison there is, at present, much more powerful than that of Holstein. It is said Count Golofkin, the Muscovite Minister at Berlin, hath received the Czar's Ratification of the Treaty lately concluded with his Prussian Majesty. The Primate of Poland hath written a Letter to King Augustus to excuse himself from waiting upon his Majesty at Rassinia, and to desire he would be pleas'd to convene a general Diet at Warlaw, and withdraw the Saxon Troops out of the Kingdom. Letters from Petersburg of the 10th bring an account, that the Czar continued still with his Army in Finland, and it was thought he would engage in no Enterprize before the arrival of the Danish Squadron, which was expected every Day. Prince Menzikoff was gone to Notebourg, in order to visit the Fortifications of that Place. We have since received advice from Stockholm of the 18th, that an Express was arrived there from Vice Admiral Watrang with an account, that the Muscovites, by the favour of a great Calm, had attack'd the Swedish Gallies on the Coast of Abo. The Engagement lasted several Hours with great Obslinacy, but at length the Swedes were obliged to give way to the superior Force of their Enemies. After this Action Three thousand Muscovites landed in Aland, and took Possession of that Island without Resistance, the Swedish Forces, which amounted to no more than Six hundred Men, being withdrawn before to save themselves from being made Prisoners of War. They write from Demotica, that the King of Sweden having received the necessary Passports for his Departure from thence, had sent Baron Groothusen to Constantinople to thank the Grand Signior for all the Favours conferred upon him, during his continuance in the Ottoman Territories, and it was thought his Majesty would set out for his own Dominions immediately after the return of his Minister.

Hague, September 7. N. S. On the 5th Instant the Earl of Clarendon arrived here from Hanover, and last Night Brigadier Breton, His Majesty's Minister at the Court of Berlin, came hither from the same Place. This Morning we receiv'd an Express from thence with advice, that the King intended to set out on his Journey to Great Britain next Monday, and that the Friday following he would be at this Place. Sir James Abercrombie, Commandant of Dunkirk, and Brigadier Preston, Governor of Nieupart, are come hither to wait upon His Majesty. The Duke d'Ossuna, and the Marquis de Monteleone, Plenipotentiaries of the King of Spain, intend to return to Morrow to Utrecht.
