PRESENT

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Hereas for the preventing much Mischief which had happened by Throwing, Casting and Fiting Squibs, Serpents, Rockets, and other Fireworks, by an Act made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, Intituled, An Alt to pre-went the Throwing or Firing of Squibs, Serpents and other Fireworks; it is provided, That if any Person or Persons of what Age, Sex, Degree, or Quality soever should Make, or cause to be Made, or should Give, Sell, or Utter, or offer to expose to Sale any Squibs, Rockets, Serpents or other Fireworks; or any Cases, Moulds, or other Implements for the Making of any such Squibs, Rockets, Serpents, or other Fireworks, Then every such Person so offending and being thereof Convicted, before one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate of the Place where such Offence should be committed, should for every such Offence forfeit the Sum of Five Pounds; and every Person who should permit or suffer any Squibs, Serpents, Rockets, or other Fireworks to be Cast, Thrown, or Fired from out of or in his, her, or their House or Houses, Shops, Dwelling, Lodging or Habitation into any publick Street, Highway, Road or Passage, or any other House or Place whatsoever, being Convicted as aforesaid, should forfeit for every such Offence the Sum of Twenty Shillings, to be Levied by Warrant from any fuch justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate; and every Person who should Throw, Cast, or Fire, or be Aiding or Assisting in the Throwing, Casting, or Firing of any Squibs, Rockets, Serpents, or other Fireworks in or into any publick Street, House, Shop, River, Highway, Road, or Passage, being thereof Convicted, as afore-

At the Council Chamber at St. James's, |fending should not immediately upon his, her, or their being thereof so Convided, pay to the said Justice of the Peace or chief Magistrate, before whom such Conviction should be made, the said Forseiture, That then every such Justice of the Peace, or chief Magistrate is thereby required, by Warrant under his Hand and Seal, to commit such Person to the House of Correction, there to remain to be fet and kept to hard Labour without Bail or Mainprize, for any time not exceeding a Month, unless such Offender should sooner pay such Forseiture. Which Act of Parliament was Perpetual and is now It is this Day Ordered by their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council, That for the preventing the Throwing of Squibs, Rockets, Serpents and other Fireworks contrary to the said Act upon the Day of His Majesty's Royal Entry; That the Lord Mayor of the City of London, and the Justices of the Peace thereof, and of the Counties of Kent, Surry, and Middlesex, and of the City of Westminster, and the Constables and other Peace-Officers within the respective Places asoresiid, do take care that the faid Act of Parliament be duly observed; and that if any Person or Persons shall presume to Offend contrary thereunto, that they be immediately apprehended and punish'd according to the Directions thereof. And it is further ordered. That this Order be forthwith Printed and Published, to the Intent that all Perfons may take notice thereof, and conform themselves accordingly.
