THE following Addresses having been delivered to the Lords Justices, were transmitted by their Excellencies to the King.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of Your Majesty's City of London, in Common-Council Assembled.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, do with Joy Congratulate Your Majesty's happy Accession to the Crown of these Realms, and with Impatience wait for Your Royal Presence among us, to secure those invaluable Blessings which we promise our selves, from a Prince of such Illustrious Merit.

The sudden Loss of our late most Pious and Excellent Queen, affected us with a just Concern and Sorrow, which nothing could have allayed, but the Satisfaction we now have of seeing Your Majesty placed upon Her Throne in so peaceable a manner, with the concurring Inclinations and Affections of all Your Subjects: And we cannot but look upon these Prosperous Beginnings as a sure and auspicious Omen, That Your Majesty will continue to Reign Triumphantly in the Hearts of Your People, and with that Tranquillity which we shall always pray may attend Your Majesty's Government.

The perfect Confidence which all Your Subjects have already placed in Your Majesty's Gracious Intentions to preserve their Religion, Laws and Liberties, most plainly appears from the Advancement of Publick Credit.

Our Laws prescribe to us our Duty, and the Doctrines and Principles of the Church of England enjoin the strictest Observance of it: Those have always given us a zealous Concern for the Succession in Your Majesty's Illustrious House; and by these we shall be guided to do every thing which may contribute to make Your Majesty's Reign Happy and Glorious.

We Your Faithful Subjects will to our utmost Support Your undoubted Right to the Imperial Crown of this Realm, against the Pretender, and all other Persons whatsoever; and shall always think it our Glory to be the most forward, upon all Occasions, to set our Fellow-Subjects an Example of that Fidelity and Zeal which they owe to their Country, and to Your Majesty, the best of Princes.

And this Day the Lords Justices sent for the Lord Mayor, &c. and the Lord Chancellor, in their Excellencies Name, made the following Answer.

My Lord Mayor,

THE Lords Justices have transmitted your Address to His Majesty, according to your Desire.

We have it, in Charge from His Majesty to let you know, That the Address of the City of London has given Him great Satisfaction, and to return you His Majesty's Thanks for it.

We are expressly commanded to assure you, That it will be His Majesty's constant Care to promote the Happiness of the City, and to make its Trade Flourish.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, and the rest of Your Majesty's Commissioners of Lieutenancy for the City of London.

Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor and the rest of Your Majesty's Commissioners of Lieutenancy for Your City of London, truly sensible of the great Loss of our most Excellent Queen, of ever Blessed Memory, do most humbly crave leave to Represent to Your Majesty the Comfort and Satisfaction we have in Your Majesty's happy and peaceable Accession to the Crown of these Realms; by which we are fully assured of having our Religion, Laws, and Liberties, as now Established, secured to us and our Posterity.

We cannot better discharge the great Trust reposed in us by our late Gracious Sovereign, than in assuring Your Majesty, That we will, on all Occasions, Maintain and Support to the utmost Your Majesty's undoubted Right and Title to the Throne of these Kingdoms.

Loyalty and Obedience to Your Majesty are the Principles in which we (as Members of the Establish'd Church of England) have happily been Educated: And the Doctrine of Resistance, and Practice of Sedition in the State, are what we ever did and shall Disclaim.

We joyfully attend the happy Opportunity of Prostrating our selves at Your Royal Feet, that we may assure Your Majesty, We shall continue to exert that Power we, (as Your Majesty's Lieutenants) are invested with, for the Support and Defence of Your Royal Prerogatives of the Imperial Crown of this Realm, against the Pretender and all other Persons whatsoever.

The Lord Chancellor, in their Excellencies the Lords Justices Name, made the following Answer.

My Lord Mayor,

THE Lords Justices have transmitted to His Majesty the Address from the Lieutenancy of the City of London, as they desired.

We are commanded by His Majesty to let you know their Address was very acceptable to Him, and that He returns them His Thanks for it.

Brussels, September 12. N. S. The Council of State hath ordered all Persons throughout the Netherlands to go into deep Mourning for the Death of Her late Majesty. Circular Letters to that effect have been dispatch'd to the States of the several Provinces, as also to the Courts of Justice, and the Magistrates of the respective Cities. Count Koningsseg, the Emperor's



peror's Plenipotentiary for regulating the Barrier of the States General in these Countries, arrived here last Night from Cologn. He hath received the Compliments of the Regency and other Persons of Distinction, and to-Morrow he intends to proceed to Antwerp, the Place appointed for holding the Conferences on the Subject of his Commission. The Deputies of the States, appointed to assist at them, are likewise expected there in a few Days. Monsieur Coriache is lately returned from Gand; where he was sent by the Regency to demand the ordinary Subsidy of the Province of Flanders.

Hague, September 18. N. S. The King, with His Royal Highness the Prince, arrived here on Sunday in the Afternoon. Yesterday Morning the Deputies of the States General complimented His Majesty upon His Accession to the Crown, and His arrival at this Place. All the British Nobility and Gentry residing here, had afterwards the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand. In the Afternoon the King, accompanied by the Prince, took several Turns in His Coach round the Voorhout, where he was followed by a numerous Train of Coaches, and a great Concourse of People. This Day Monsieur de Chateaufeuf, Ambassador of France, had a private Audience of His Majesty, to compliment Him on the Part of the King his Master. The Captains of the Men of War are ordered to go to Helvoetsluys, and as soon as the Wind becomes fair, His Majesty intends to embark for Great Britain.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justice of Great Britain having ordered, that the Half-Pay Officers of Colonel Kerr's late Regiment of Dragoons, and Brigadier Grant's late Regiment of Foot, who are upon the Irish Establishment, do forthwith repair to North-Britain, to be under the Orders of Major General Whetham, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces there, where they ate to receive full Pay from the time of their Arrival, and during their continuance in that Service; his Grace the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland does hereby order and require all Half-Pay Officers belonging to those Regiments, who are now in this Kingdom, to take notice thereof, and accordingly to repair thither without loss of Time.
