



to the Governors of all the Places in Hungary to receive His Majesty with all possible Demonstrations of Honour, and to furnish him with Guards as Occasions required.

Ratisbon, September 17. N. S. The Diet of the Empire will be assembled in Form, and enter upon Business immediately after the arrival of Prince Lowenstein, and the Director of Mentz, who are expected here within a few Days. We have received advice from Baden, that Prince Eugene and Marschal Villars arrived there on the 5th Instant. On the 7th they went to the Place of the Congress, in order to Sign the Treaty of Peace between the Empire and France. As soon as the full Powers were exchanged, and some other Points settled, the Doors were opened, and all Persons were admitted to hear the Articles of Peace read by the Secretaries of the two Ambassies: After which, the Treaty was Sign'd, and Count Rabutin was dispatch'd with it to the Court of Vienna, and the Marquis du Luc to that of France. The same Day all the Foreign Ministers, except those of the Italian Princes, were Entertain'd at Dinner by the Imperial Ambassadors, and the Day after by those of the most Christian King. On the 12th Prince Eugene, Count Goes, and Marschal Villars set out for their respective Courts.

Hague, September 25. N. S. On the 19th Instant the Duke d'Osuna and the Marquis de Monteleone, Plenipotentiaries of Spain, came hither from Utrecht to wait upon the King, and the next Day they had a private Audience of His Majesty. The Count de Tarouca, and Don Lewis d'Alcuna, Plenipotentiaries of Portugal, Monsieur Palmquist, Envoy of Sweden, and all the other Foreign Ministers, have likewise had Audiences of His Majesty. On the 21st the States of Holland and West Friesland separated for a Fortnight. The same Evening the King, with his Royal Highness the Prince, went to the Countess of Strafford's Assembly, where His Majesty play'd at Ombre, and was afterwards Entertain'd with a Ball, at which all the British Nobility and Gentry, and several other Persons of Distinction assisted. The next Morning the Earl of Strafford received some Instructions from the King, since which his Excellency hath been frequently in Conference with the Ambassadors of France, Spain, and Portugal. The King's Baggage being sent on Board the Yachts, they are this Day gone from Rotterdam to the Briel, where His Majesty intends to embark for Great Britain as soon as the Wind permits. The Deputies appointed by the States-General to regulate their Barrier in the Spanish Netherlands, have been informed of the King's Intentions upon that Subject, and are preparing to set out for Antwerp, in order to meet Count Coningssec, the Emperor's Plenipotentiary, who is already arrived at that Place.

Brussels, September 26. N. S. Count Koningsec, the Emperor's Plenipotentiary for regulating the Barrier in the Low Countries, came hither on the 21st from Antwerp, and the next Morning he returned to that Place. He hath writ Circular Letters to the States of the several Provinces in the Netherlands, requiring them to send Deputies without any Delay to inform him of their respective Interests, and to make Proposals for the Advantage of the Barrier, and Trade of these Countries. The Town-House at Antwerp is chosen for the Place of holding the Conferences with the Deputies of the States General, who are expected there very soon for that purpose.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices of Great Britain having ordered, that the Half-Pay Officers of the Earl of Hymaford's and Colonel Kerr's late Regiment of Dragoons, and Brigadier Grant's late Regiment of Foot, who are upon the Irish Establishment, do forthwith repair to North-Britain, to be under the Orders of Major General Whetbam, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's

Forces there, where they are to receive full Pay during their continuance in that Service; his Grace the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland does hereby order and require all Half-Pay Officers belonging to those Regiments, who are now in this Kingdom, to take notice thereof, and accordingly to repair thither without loss of Time.
