HE Affairs of Poland continue still in great Diforder, but it is hoped the arrival of King Augustus at Warfaw will restore Tranquillity to the Kingdom. His Majesty intends to fet out very foon for that Place, and hath already fent Directions to the Great General of the Crown to redrefs those Grievances, which have raifed the greatest Discontents in the Minds of the People. There hath been hitherto no Commotion except in the Palatinate of Lublin, where the Nobility have taken up Arms, but those of the other Provinces have only agreed to prefent their Complaints in Wri-ting to the King, and to defire him to convene a general Diet, as the only Method to fecure the Peace of the Nation. Signor Grimaldi, the Pope's Nuntio, Count Denhoff, General of the Army of Lithuania, and Count Ribinski, Master of the Ordnance in the fame Dutchy, are arrived here. The Archbishop of Guesna, Primate of Poland, is likewife expected here in a Day or two to pay his R efpects to the King. Two Regiments that were encamp'd for fome time near Bialenka in Mafovia, are now march-ing towards the Palatinate of Leopol. We have received advice from thence, that the Turks are building a magnificent Palace at Chocim for the Governor of that Place, who is to be a Bacha of the first Rank. Letters from Constantinople bring an account, that the time of the King of Sweden's depar-

ture from Demotica was still very uncertain. Drefden, Sept. 18. N.S. Count Vizdom, Great Chamberlain of King Augustus, is gone to Peterfbourg, where he is to refide on the part of his Majesty. Baron Lovendahl, Great Mareschal of the Court, hath obtained leave to go into Holstein, and he is accordingly preparing for his departure. We have received an Express from Reizen, with an account, that King Augustus intended to fet out to morrow for Warlaw, and that he would not return into this Country before the next Spring. The Palatin Potoski was arrived at Reizen, and had obtained his Pardon. General Smigielski was likewise expected there with fome other Officers, who had quitted the Interests of King Staniss. It is faid most of the Saxon Troops will be fent out of Poland into this Electorate, where Winter Quarters have been assigned them, and that they are to begin their march about the beginning of next Month. We are informed, that Baron Goertz is returned to Berlin, from whence he intends to fet out very foon for Vienna, and after he hath transacted fome Affairs at that Court, it is faid he will go to meet the King of Sweden. His Prussian Majesty having received the Homage of the States of his Kingdom, is expected on the 21st Instant as Stetin, and on the 24th at Berlin.

Hamburgh, Sept. 21. N. S. The Danish Minister hath acquainted our Magistrates, that the King his Mafter expected they should appoint Deputies to attend him at Copenhagen, in order to put an end to the Difputes which are still undetermined between his Majesty and this City. The King of Den-mark hath remitted a third Part of the Taxes which had been laid on the Nobility of Holftein. Those of the Dutchy of Sleswick have likewise defired an Abatement of the Contributions lately demanded of We are informed, that the King of them. Pruflia hath received the Homage of the States of that Country at the Cafile of Koningsberg, but the Polifh Nobility, which, by ancient Custom ought to have assisted at the Ceremony, refused to be prefent. King Augustus hath at last refolved to withdraw all his Forces out of Poland, except seven Regiments of Horse, and two of Foot. He hath fixed on the 20th Instant for his Departure to Warsaw, where he intends to pass this Winter. Letters from Revel bring an account, that the Mufcovite Fleet had fet fail from thence towards the Coafts of Finland, without waiting for the Reinforcement of eight Men of War, which were to join them from Copenhagen. They write from Wilmar, that a Veffel was lately arrived there from the Isle of Gothland, the Master of which reported, that he had left the Swedish Fleet in the Port of Wisby, where they were taking in Provisions. The Governor of Wilmar had received a Mellage from the King of Pruffia, that in cafe he did not forbear his Exactions in the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg, his Majesty would send Troops to protect that Country from his Infults. We have received advice from Conftantinople, that the Grand Signior had fup-plied the King of Sweden with a confiderable Sum of Money for the Expence of his Journey into his own Dominion.
